Future Teachers Hold Meetings

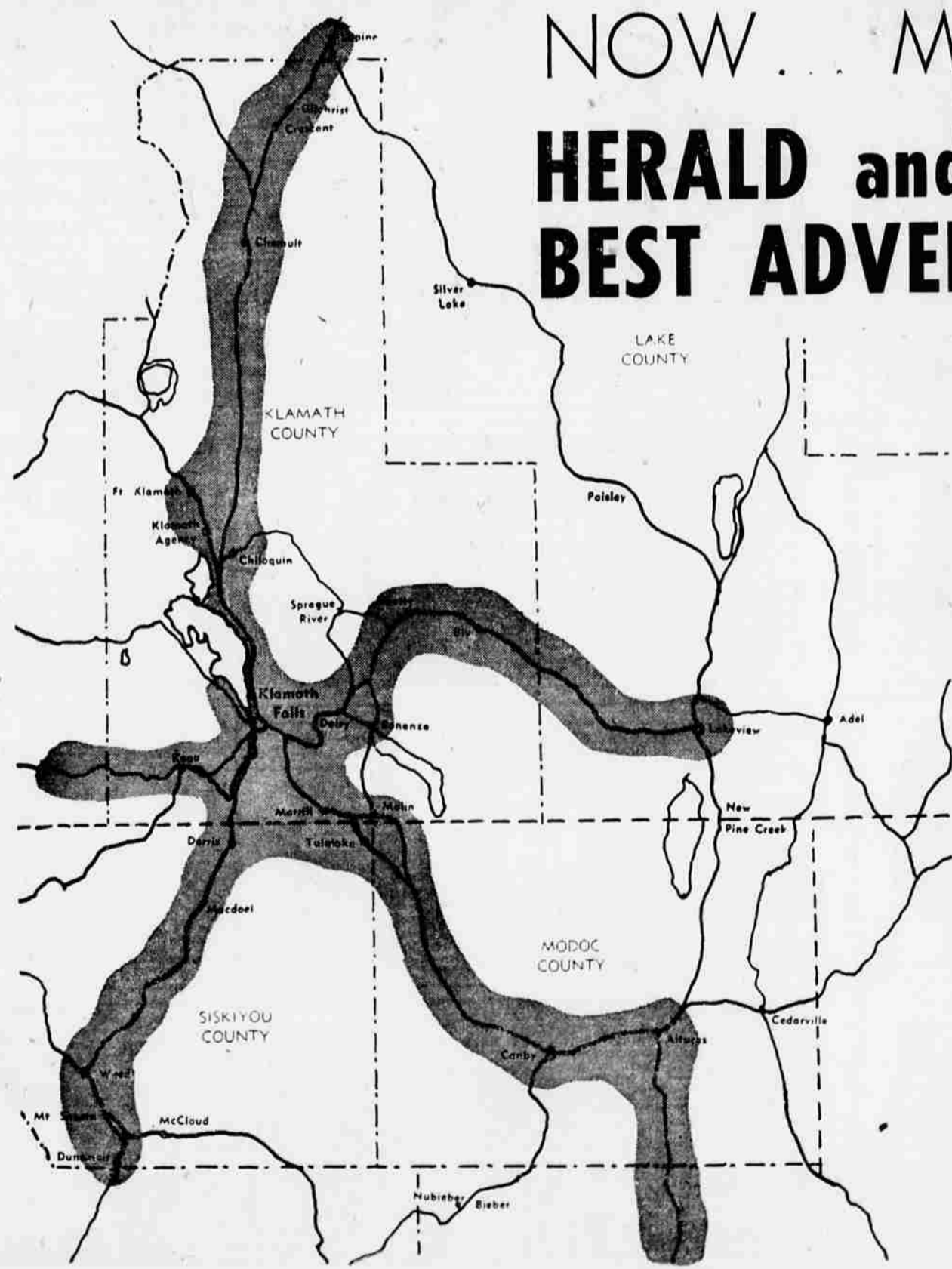
