TOKYO (UP)— You can cheer, cheer for old Notre Dame or root for the glories of the Rambler Wreck from Georgia Tech but don't forget to remember that there's a lot of football being played today half way around the world from home.

It could have been Des Moines, Iowa, or Turkey Trot, Tenn., as the Johnson Air Force Base defeated the Yokota Raiders, 30-0. There were the high-stepping majorettes, the pretty cheerleaders

and the briskly marching band. It could have been except for the pagoda-like buildings in the background.

That, and the unusual enthusiasm marked the difference. Because to 250,000 military personnel in the Far East their 35 football teams — Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force — are a breath of home when the frost is on the rice paddies.

Enthusiasm was at fever pitch as Johnson won because the top Air Force team will qualify to meet the best Army team in the post-season Torri Bowl, named after the entrance gates to the Shinto Temples, while the Navy and Marine Corps winners square off in the Sukiyaki Bowl with the eventual winners playing in the windup Rice Bowl game.

Nor could you blame the Johnson supporters for rooting with all the frenzy of callous undergraduates. It isn't only that they have a non-commissioned officers quarterback club which chants, en masse: "Johnson, Y a n n o u s a r d s, you're our boys. You make the touch downs, we'll make the noise." But just about every guy in the outfit has all he can beg, borrow and soft-soap on the outcome of the game.

To an outsider who, just one week earlier, watched Notre Dame demolish Army at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium, it appeared at the start as if communications with home might have broken down. The Army band paraded onto the field playing the Notre Dame victory march and everybody applauded. It had to be nostalgic.

Johnson's team soon proved, however, that the kids back at West Point could have used some of the combination officer enlisted personnel talent performing on this Japanese gridiron.

Steve Crews from Atlanta, Ga., ripped off two touchdowns; Jim Small of Pittsburgh sprinted 90 yards for another, and Jack Owens of Rochester, N.Y., heaved a touchdown pass to Ed Conaughton of Winnetka, Ill. Walt Hynoski of Milwaukee kicked all four extra points and, just to put the icing on the cake, John Stewart of

Washington tackled Yokota's Orlando Simpson of Colorado Springs, Colo., in the end zone for a safety. It was fierce, hard-hitting football with all the trimmings and, as one officer explained, it was easy to understand why Johnson won. It had two Texans on its squad while Yokota only had one. He was a Texan.

But the real winners were the Air Force folks in the stands, from the commanding general all the way down to the smallest Army "brat." For a couple of happy hours they were back home again and only to a stranger did the pagodas in the background form a bizarre setting for what could have been a brisk fall afternoon in new England.

Danny Russo and Eddie (Pigeon) Lynch, a couple of New York welterweight prospects, who kicked up a storm in their first clash two months ago, collide in a return 10-rounder at New York's St. Nicholas Arena Monday night.

Russo, of Brooklyn, won a split decision in their first meeting at St. Nick's in a close fight. This one figures to be another tight battle. Lynch's west side fans, who usually let loose a couple of pigeons in the arena and toss firecrackers, heaved a few eggs around the club in addition after the verdict went against their hero.

Lynch, 22, a longshoreman when not fighting, has a 11-2 record. Russo's record is 11-3.

Veteran Kid Gavilan, the ex-champion hoping to get into the welterweight title tournament meets Mexico's 22-year-old Gaspar Ortega in a 12-round return bout at Los Angeles Wrigley Field Tuesday night. The 37-year-old Cuban upset the rangy Mexican at Miami Beach last July 31 to end a five-fight losing streak.

Another Tuesday night fight, this one in London's Harringay Arena, presents the unusual picture of an American boxer in the English style, Willie Pastrano of New Orleans, and a belting Briton, Dick Richardson. Usually the American is the slugger. Pastrano, fourth ranking contender, is the big favorite.

Richardson, 23, 6-3 and 203 pounds, was flattened in eight rounds by Cuba's Nino Valdes last Dec. 4. Pastrano is 21, 6 feet 191 pounds.

Middleweight Bobby Boyd of Chicago, winner of five straight this year, is favored over Franz Suzuzina of Germany at Syracuse, N.Y., Wednesday night. This is another return bout. Boyd beat the German at Miami Beach last March 26. Suzuzina has won four straight.

**Wrestling Returns To KF Friday Night**

Klamath Falls wrestling this Friday night will feature a world's championship midget tag team match, as well as the heralded return of Cowboy Carlson, one of the most popular wrestlers to ever perform in the Basin rings.

The midgets have been touring the world during the past three months, and won the world's championship in a New Zealand match during the late summer. The champion midgets, who will perform here, are Sky Low of Montreal, and Irish Jackie of Boston.

In the championship match Sky Low and Irish Jackie will go against Tiny Tim of Hollywood and Little Red Feather of Florida.

Sky Low is renowned as being the strongest man in the world pound for pound. Although weighing only 80 pounds, he has on more than one occasion lifted

weights of 400 pounds and more. The championship go will be a tag team, two out of three fall, one hour time limit match.

In the other one hour match will be featured the return of Cowboy Carlson. Since last appearing here about five years ago the Cowboy has been touring the East, as a headliner and has been touring Europe. In one main event at Madison Square Garden the Cowboy drew a \$50,000 house.

George Enderle, reserve tackle, suffered a bad ankle sprain that probably will keep him out this week. Starting end Dwayne Fournier also had a sprained ankle. Regular blocking tackle Ted Searle and reserve tackle Ed Kaeheloull had less serious injuries.

The Beavers, ranked No. 7 in the Associated Press poll, had no alibis for their first defeat of the season. They conceded that they were simply outplayed.
