

## Sergeant Admits Selling U.S. Secrets To Reds

NEW YORK (AP)—A U.S. Army master sergeant has testified that he betrayed his country and turned informant for the Russians after a wild Moscow hotel party with two Russian girls.

A grin flickering on his angular features from time to time and speaking with a lisp, Sgt. Roy A. Rhodes, 40, testified in Brooklyn Federal District Court yesterday that he was paid for giving information to Soviet nationals in 1952.

Rhodes was testifying as a witness for the government in the espionage trial of Col. Rudolf I. Abel, 55, alleged master spy for the Soviet Union in the United States.

"The information you gave them was truthful or untruthful?" Rhodes was asked.

Rhodes said he arrived in Moscow June 22, 1951, and was put in charge of the embassy garage. He had been trained, he said, in code and cipher work in the Pentagon.

The sergeant traced his covert activities in Moscow to a drinking bout in December 1951. He said he was celebrating news that his wife and daughter had received permission from Soviet authorities to join him.

After a night's revelry with two Russian mechanics and two Russian girls, he said, he woke up the next morning in bed with one of the girls in a strange room.

"Five or ten weeks later," he said, the same girl called him at the garage and he arranged to meet her.

He said they met two men in the street, one the girl's brother, the other an English-speaking Russian introduced to him as Bob Day or Bob Smith.

Rhodes testified that he never saw the girl again after that day but met the English-speaking Russian several times.
