A man termed "America's most popular repeat speaker," Robert Kazmayer, will address the Klamath Knife and Fork Club, Wednesday, October 23, at 6:45 p.m. in the main banquet room of the Willard Hotel. His talk will be on "New International Hotspots."

Kazmayer is a business analyst and publisher of a newsletter. "Place your finger almost anywhere on the world map and you have put it on potential trouble; double trouble," says Kazmayer.

"History," he continues, "never before has recorded an era so filled with intrigue and unrest, uprisings and revolts."

Kazmayer has maintained that there will be several of what he terms "little wars," as opposed to world wars, and states that this has been his contention since 1946.

Electrum is a natural mixture of gold and silver. He stated that the rarest U. S. gold coin is the \$5 gold piece of 1822, currently selling at \$15,000. His talk was illustrated with gold coins and gold coin jewelry from his own collection.
