Ortega Ends Kid's Welter Title Dreams

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The bongos drums boomed out a sad beat today for Kid Gavilan, possibly tolling the end of his dream of recapturing the world welterweight crown.

The 31-year-old Kid lost a split decision last night to 22-year-old Gaspar Ortega, 22, of Mexico in a 12-round fight at Wrigley Field. The winner was promised a match with another contender for the title, Vince Martinez, in an elimination series to fill the title vacated by Carmen Basilio.

Referee Frankie Van gave the decision to Ortega 115-113 on California's 10-point per round scoring system, and Judge Tommy Hart awarded it 115-112 for the lad from Tijuana. Judge Dynamite Jackson saw it Gavilan 117-113.

The Associated Press scored it 116-115 for Ortega. Most of the ringside writers, however, had Gavilan the winner.

The battle belittled with action and neither fighter could claim a round by more than a point. There were no knockdowns and neither fighter bore a mark at the finish. It was a crushed Gavilan who greeted visitors in the dressing room and it was his exultant manager Yamil Chade of Havana who supplied the dramatics.

Chade announced that the Kid's career was over at one stage. Then he tried to tear up Gavilan's California license, a sheet of paper enclosed in oilcloth and bound in heavy cardboard. The document wouldn't tear.

"My spirit, it is low. He no hurt me ever. I wait two years for this chance to get in title fight. Now chance, it is gone I think," said the sad Kid, a devotee of bongos thumping in his play period.

Gavilan said he thought he was well ahead after 10 rounds and merely played it safe in the closing rounds.

Most cards had the fight about even after 10 and it was Ortega's strong rally, notably when he finally went ahead in the final minutes, that earned him the nod.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Willie Pastrano goes back to the United States Wednesday after convincing Britons his chances are good of becoming the first all-out boxing stylist to capture the world heavyweight title since Gene Tunney.

The 21-year-old boxer from New Orleans earned British cheers with a 10-round decision over a 23-year old Welshman, Dick Richardson, Tuesday night in what may herald a new era in the heavyweight world where sluggers have reigned supreme.

A sellout crowd of 11,000 at London's Harringay Stadium hailed Pastrano's victory as one man.

They revelled in the way Pastrano left jabbed and boxed his way to victory against slugger Richardson.

Pastrano reduced Richardson to a blood dripping wreck at the end.

And he did it with a poking left hand and lightning speed around the ring that left British fans limp with admiration.

Richardson tried to land his payoff punch but Pastrano was never there.

It was a boxing treat for the fans and a lesson for the inexperienced Richardson.

Now Pastrano has just one aim—to get back home and jump into the ring again against Texan Roy Harris.

It was Harris who outpointed Pastrano in a 10-rounder in June.

Persian Prince Back Of Week

For his great all-around performance against Virginia Tech, James Abol Hassan Bakhtiar, an honest-to-gosh Persian prince who plays fullback for the University of Virginia, Wednesday was selected as The Associated Press Back of the Week.

Bakhtiar beat out a pair of Big Ten quarterbacks who engineered two of last Saturday's biggest upsets, Purdue's sophomore Ross Fichtner and Tom Haller of Illinois.

The 200-pound Virginia fullback, whose home is Abadan, Iran, equalled the Atlantic Coast Conference scoring record and missed tying the workhorse record by only three carries as he led the Cavaliers to a 39-7 surprise victory over VPI, a six-point favorite before the game.

Fichtner, an 18-year-old sophomore playing his first varsity game, pitched an important 49-yard pass to Tom Frankhauser and did a nifty job of quarterbacking as flurried Purdue stopped Michigan State 20-13.

Haller completed seven passes for 123 yards and teamed up with Bobby Mitchell, who came out of a hospital to gain 64 yards, to give Illinois a 34-13 upset victory over Minnesota.

Bakhtiar carried the ball 23 times, three short of his own record, and gained 153 yards. He scored Virginia's first 25 points and later added another conversion to tie the 20-point conference record Duke's Wray Carlton set against Virginia earlier this year. In addition he played a tremendous defensive game as linebacker and, punting for the first time in his three-year college career, got off a 57-yard quick kick that paved the way for a Virginia touchdown.

Grants Pass Cavemen Next For Klamath Falls Pelicans

The Klamath Union High School Pelicans travel to Grants Pass this weekend to take on their second 6-A-1 conference team so far this season, this time in the form of the 12th ranked Cavemen.

The Pels fell before the Black Tornado of Medford last Friday in their conference opener, 33-14, but the strong second-half play by the Pels brought them from the doldrums and should provide enough of a shot in the arm to better their chances against the strong Cavemen team.

Grants Pass is fresh from posting an impressive 41-6 win over Ashland in their second Southern Oregon Conference victory of the season, downing Central Point 20-13 the week before.

The Pels will assume their usual underdog role again, but coach Andy Knudsen feels that the fine showing the Whitebirds made after spotting Medford a 29-0 halftime lead and coming back to play evenly with the Medfordites in the second half will give the Pels a big boost when the two teams clash.

The Pelicans will be looking for their first win over a Grants Pass team since 1949 when the Pels defeated Grants Pass, 39-21. Since that time the Cavemen have chalked up seven straight wins.

Since 1936, as far as the H&N records date back, the Cavemen have posted 10 wins and the Pels have come out on the long side nine times, with no games having been played in 1947 and 1948.

Coch Knudsen said he felt the Pels played their second best ball game of the season against the Tornadoes, the best coming when they downed Redding, 7-6, and feels that the rivalry with Grants Pass is equal to that with Medford, if even not more.

It is this rivalry that will bring the odds favoring the Cavemen down a notch or two and help boost the Pels' spirits looking for the upset victory.

Knudsen unveiled a little razzle-dazzle, shifting the backs into a double wing, with three men handling the ball on a pass play that connected for both of KU's touchdowns.

If anything, the fans will probably see a different variety of plays when they tangle with Grants Pass, as the KUHS mentor keeps shooting for that conference surprise he talked about at the beginning of the season.

Also, quarterback Frank Ballard should be able to go full strength against the Cavemen, thus relieving Tom Ankeny for more running plays and adding additional versatility to the backfield.

The Cavemen will rely on the speedy and shifty running of backs Mike Rose, Jack Dean, Don Lowellyn and Marvin Terry to provide the running attack against the Pels.

Indiana Alums Favor Ousting School Prexy

INDIANAPOLIS (UP)—Some Indiana University alumni suggested today that Athletic Director Frank E. Allen be fired as the first step in the school's uphill battle for prominence in Big Ten football.

A group of high school coaches, most of whom played for the Cream and Crimson, were virtually unanimous in blaming Indiana's sorry plight on its athletic department.

One coach polled by United Press suggested that I.U. President Dr. Herman B. Wells "either run in the United Nations or run his university." Wells, for years active in governmental affairs, is a delegate to the U.N.

"It's about time Allen gets out," said some of the coaches. One said an athletic director has no business taking a "defeatist attitude."

Allen said in Chicago this week Indiana's football fortunes have reached the "dilemma" stage—"We are getting worse and worse."

Some coaches said they were reluctant to send their best players to I.U. because they can do "better" elsewhere.

All agreed Indiana's poor showing on the gridiron, which hit rock-bottom this season when the Hoosiers dropped their first four games by lopsided margins, is an administration and recruitment problem—not the fault of the coaching staff.

The season of 1957 was a baseball milestone for Milwaukee reserve first baseman Frank Torre. It was the first time he played for the team he had been with the previous season.



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
