

Pacific Coast Football Briefs

STOCKTON, Calif. (UP)—College of Pacific coach Moose Mayers says his team will beat the University of Cincinnati this week "if we can contain their quarterback, Morrison."

Accordingly, Myers put the Tigers through a stiff pass defense drill Tuesday. He also held an offensive scrimmage.

The game is in Cincinnati.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UP)—San Jose State worked on defense Tuesday, hoping to match last Saturday's performance when the Spartans held San Diego State scoreless.

Two first stringers, center Ron Earl and tackle Nick Sanger, sat out the practice with minor injuries. Both were expected to be ready for North Texas State Saturday, according to coach Bob Thichenal.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—Coach Skip Stahley returned to the Idaho practice field Tuesday after a one-day layoff with the flu and put the Vandals through a wet, cold, two-hour offensive practice.

Stahley said the squad should be at full strength for the homecoming game against Fresno State Saturday.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—Coach Len Casanova, armed with a report from scout Bill Hammer that California is the most aggressive team he has seen all season, Tuesday held a spirited defensive drill in preparation for Saturday's game here with the Bears.

End Ron Stover, who has been hospitalized with a bad chest cold, joined the workout.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Oregon State worked on offense Tuesday in an effort to retain its scoring punch against Washington Saturday.

The Beavers scored only one touchdown while losing to UCLA 26-7 last week. OSC coach Tommy Prothro said his team was "outplayed, outcoached, outstudied, outbodied and outnewsperated," in its first loss of the season.

STANFORD, Calif. (UP)—Stanford will have to shore up its defense if it is going to upset UCLA here Saturday, according to Indian coach Chuck Taylor.

Taylor said the Stanford offense looked good Tuesday with quarterback Jack Douglas hitting his targets like a pro. But he said the defense was spotty.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—Tackle Curtis Lauke and center Terry Jones were back on Stanford's first string Wednesday as coach Pete Elliott continued to look for his best combination.

The two linemen have been shuttled from first to second team all season. Elliott held his centers, guards and fullbacks overtime on Tuesday's practice to work on a couple of new plays designed especially for Oregon, the Bears' next opponent.

SEATTLE (UP)—Winless Washington was forced into the Husky fieldhouse for Tuesday's practice by rain and cold weather.

Coach Jim Owens divided the session between offense and defense tactics and some scrimmage. Owens said sophomore fullback George Pitt is the only Washington player on the injury list for the Oregon State game this week.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—UCLA's squad was almost at full strength for one of the few times this year Wednesday as the team practiced for the meeting with Stanford Saturday at Palo Alto.

Team doctors reported that co-captain Jim Dawson was well enough to resume practice. He twisted an ankle in Saturday's game with Oregon State.

Coach Henry (Red) Sanders

sent his team through a lengthy pass defense drill.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Southern California's Trojans drilled on pass defense Wednesday in hopes of finding the combination which would stop Washington State's big aerial game in the Coliseum Saturday.

Coach Don Clark shook up the squad, moving Ron Mix to first string right end and Walt Gursch to starting left guard.

Bob Boyd Bids For 6th Straight Win On TV Bout

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (UP)—Bobby Boyd, the comebacking Chicago middleweight, bids for his sixth straight victory Wednesday night in a televised 10-round bout against Germany's Franz Suzina at the War Memorial Auditorium.

Suzina is among the victims Boyd has counted up since he recovered from a broken jaw suffered in a TKO loss to Joey Giardello about a year ago. Boyd won a split decision in their first meeting, March 26 in Miami Beach.

At the time of the Giardello bout, Boyd was the No. 1 middleweight contender after impressive victories over such main event fighters as Gene Fullmer, Tony Anthony, Holly Mims and Eduardo Lause.

The injury put Boyd out of action until he started back up the middleweight ladder against Suzina. Since then he has beaten Willie Vaughn twice, Eddie Demars and Rocky Castellani.

Both Boyd and Suzina have good knockout records, with Boyd having stopped 22 and the German 28. Boyd has won 45, lost seven and drawn twice. Suzina, in 72 bouts, shows 41 wins, 18 losses and 13 draws.

COTTON BOWL SIZE DOUBLES

DALLAS (UP)—The Cotton Bowl, site of Dallas' annual New Year's Day football classic, has been nearly doubled since 1930 when it was built to seat 45,000 at a cost of \$400,000. Five times that amount has been spent in the last five years. The double-tiered stadium now seats 75,504 fans.
