Land Added To Refuge

A total of 13,757 acres of valuable waterfowl habitat has been added to the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge in Oregon by an order issued by Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton. The order also restored approximately 21,657 acres to the unreserved public domain. The lands previously had been withdrawn for classification as to their suitability for migratory bird refuge purposes.

The secretary's action brings the total acreage in the Malheur Refuge up to 184,062 which includes 427 acres of leased land. The new acreage is distributed around the fringe of the refuge.

Malheur National Wildlife Refuge is one of the most important areas in the Pacific Flyway as a resting and feeding ground for migratory waterfowl. Parts of the area are open to hunting at the discretion of the Department's Fish and Wildlife Service.

The value of Malheur for Wildlife was recognized as far back as 1908 when a bird reservation was established there by Executive Order. In 1935 the Malheur Migratory Bird Refuge was created and in 1940 its name was changed to the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge.

Traffic Safety Plans Listed

Recommendations for furthering the state's traffic accident prevention program have been submitted to members of the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission, the staff reported today.

The recommendations, which will be incorporated in a broad "action program for traffic safety," were based on an analysis of the state's 1956 efforts by the National Safety Council and other nationally recognized organizations.

The report contains recommendations for stepped-up activities in school traffic safety education, public support organization, driver licensing, engineering, enforcement and public safety education.

It was prepared by the commission's four-man operating committee, F. B. Crandall, State Highway Department; Edward Syring, Motor Vehicle Department; George Sirnio, Department of Education; Capt. Walter Lansing, Oregon State Police and the commission's former executive secretary, James R. Banks.

The recommendations have been under study since late July, the staff said. Details of the report's recommendations will not be announced until the entire commission considers them jointly at their next meeting.

Rural Road Traffic Down

Rural highway traffic in Oregon showed a statewide decrease of 1.4 per cent for September 1957 compared to September of last year according to the State Highway Department's monthly traffic count recorded at 33 automatic traffic count locations throughout the state.

All rural traffic counters in eastern and central Oregon showed decreased September traffic. Fire hazard conditions which delayed the announcement of deer hunting season and caused curtailment of logging operations probably contributed to the reduced traffic in those areas.

Although statewide traffic decreased, U.S. Highway 99 showed a definite increase and U.S. Highways 26, 30 and 101 slight increases.
