

State Colleges Receive Funds

PORTLAND (Special) — Gifts for scholarships and fellowships amounting to \$72,728 for Oregon's state-supported colleges and university were presented to the state board of higher education for acceptance here Tuesday.

The funds are part of \$510,000 in gifts and grants for the eight campuses in the state system of higher education.

The scholarship funds include \$34,331 for Oregon State College from 64 individuals and groups and \$21,680 to the University of Oregon from 52 sources.

University of Oregon will also receive \$245,144 in grants, mainly for research. Grants totaling \$130,123 will go to the University of Oregon Medical School; \$32,169 to OSC, and \$2,300 to University of Oregon Dental School.

The board will also consider approval of final plans for three construction projects at two institutions. They include plans for a science classroom building, estimated to cost \$445,773, and a heating plant and tunnel, estimated at \$292,000, at Southern Oregon College, and a general arts building for \$230,000 at Oregon College of Education.

Funds for the three projects were appropriated by the 1957 Legislature.

Weir Jr., Dr. W. P. Wilbur, and Philip Quisenberry, Lakeview District No. 7.
