

AF Heads Visit Kingsley Field

Lt. Gen. Joseph H. Atkinson, commander, Air Defense Command, accompanied by Maj. Gen. Romulus W. Puryear, chief of staff, Air Defense Command, arrived at Kingsley Field Friday on their initial visit and tour of the 408th Fighter Group, commanded by Lt. Col. Raymond A. Thornton.

The general was met by Lieutenant Colonel Thornton, officers of the 408th Fighter Group, and civic officials. Coinciding with the general Atkinson's visit was the arrival of Maj. Gen. Hugh A. Parker, commander, Western Air Defense Force, Brig. Gen. Curtis R. Low, commander, 28th Air Division, and Col. James D. Mayden, vice commander, 28th Air Division, from Hamilton Air Force Base, California.

Lieutenant Colonel Thornton escorted the group on the inspection tour of the base facilities. Since this was General Atkinson's first visit to Kingsley Field, he was particularly interested in the proposed Capehart housing area and the overall housing situation in Klamath Falls.

Suspects Held For Burglary

DORRIS—Siskiyou County Sheriff Al Cottar of Yreka said Monday that the September 26 burglary of the Dorris Variety Store has been solved and two men are being held for Siskiyou County authorities at Belleville, Kansas.

The local variety store, operated by Mrs. Archie Brimmer and Lois Hirsch, was broken into and four woollen shirts of different sizes and two pairs of boots of different sizes, were taken from the premises. Sheriff Cottar took pictures of foot treads of the same make and sizes and obtained clear fingerprints at the scene in order to notify other points.

Lowest School Bid Revealed

Duncan Construction Company, P.O. Box 1088, Klamath Falls, submitted the low total bid for construction of a new Butte Valley High School at Dorris, according to Howard R. Perrin, architect. Acceptance of the award has been recommended by the board of the Siskiyou County Union High School to the California State Finance Department and final decision is expected about November 13, Perrin said.

The board accepted the five alternatives called for in the plans and specifications which include renovation of the present building and utilities for a new high school building. The plans call for construction of a 12,101 square foot structure to include three special classrooms, one regular classroom, kitchen, music room and cafeteria and a metal auto shop.

Total bids, including alternates, were: Duncan Construction Company, \$309,970; H. Barnhart, \$313,354; Brosterhouse Construction Company, \$325,562; F. P. Lathrop, Berkeley, California, \$328,525; and H. G. Carl, Salem, \$303,809.

Bids were opened by the school board on October 17.
