The exhibit will be open over the coming weekend at the Art Center at the following times: Friday, October 25, 7 to 9 p.m.; Saturday, October 26, 1 to 5 p.m. and Sunday, October 27, from 2 to 9 p.m. Refreshments will be served during the Sunday opening.

The weekend of November 23-24, and again on November 30 and December 1, a Christmas art fair will be held at the Art Center. Members and nonmembers are invited to take art items for sale. This does not include needlework. A committee will be present to accept the items for sale.

Association members are meeting several nights this month to create many handsome items for the sale including handscreened gift wrappings, candles, hand decorated place mats and other gifts. The usual Christmas greens sale will also be held.

During December a new exhibit of paintings by Vern Swansen will be shown. Swansen, a former resident of Klamath Falls, now lives in Santa Barbara, California, where he is an associate member of the Cheesman Architectural office, and is teaching a private class in painting. This month he was elected to membership in the Santa Barbara Art Association. A replica of one of his paintings was printed in the Santa Barbara newspaper when the announcement of his membership in the association was announced.

Construction Slows Traffic

The city engineer's office said Wednesday resumption of four lane traffic on the South Sixth Street overpass should begin within a day or two.

The overpass has been closed for the past several days while a Medford contractor has been installing an interceptor sewer line on Adams Street across South Sixth.

A department spokesman said delay was partially caused by the lateness of a preliminary survey on installation costs and the waiting for bids.

He added that the sewer line installation is under the supervision of the city and the overpass was constructed by the state.

The construction work, recently approved by a bond issue, should be finished in about 275 days, the time allotted the Medford firm to finish the interceptor work throughout the city.
