Speakers Set For Session

Dr. Dean Brooks, superintendent of the Oregon State Hospital, Salem; Miss Muriel Young, mental health nursing consultant, State Board of Health; Dr. Seth Kerron, Klamath County health officer and Miss Mildred Lowden, psychiatric social worker for the Klamath County Health Department, will be speakers at a meeting of the American Association of University Women on Monday, October 28.

The dinner session at which the speakers will conduct a panel on "Community Responsibility for the Mentally Ill," will be held at 7 p.m. at Reames Golf Club. Mrs. Leonard Surles, president of the AAUW, will preside.

Dr. Brooks, a native of Kansas, graduated in the study of medicine in 1942 after receiving his masters degree at the University of Kansas. He interned at the City Hospital, Akron, Ohio, then spent three years in active duty in the Naval Medical Corps. It was while in the Navy that he first became interested in the specialty of psychiatry.

Returning from overseas duty he was stationed at a naval hospital and was assigned to the psychiatric division. Following a period of service at the Veterans Hospital at American Lake, Washington, Dr. Brooks was appointed assistant superintendent of the Oregon State Hospital in 1949, became superintendent on January 1, 1955.

The social studies committee of AAUW, with Mrs. H. O. Juckeland as chairman, has had a study group on the subject of mental health for the last year as a part of a national program of AAUW, the most active field in the social studies program today.

Tests Slated For CS Jobs

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for public health adviser and public health analyst for filling positions paying from \$3,440 to \$11,610 a year in the Public Health Service and the Children's Bureau of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The jobs are located in Washington, D.C., and throughout the country.

No written test is required. To qualify, applicants must have had appropriate experience in the field of public health or pertinent college study.

Applications will be accepted until further notice and must be filed with the Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, U.S. Public Health Service, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington 25, D.C.

Driver Draws Term In Jail

DUNSMUIR — Clarence E. Mabrey, of Stockton, 22, was sent to the Siskiyou County Jail on Monday to serve a 40-day sentence in lieu of paying a \$210 fine. Mabrey was arrested by Dunsmuir police on a minor traffic offense and found to be driving with a suspended license.

Mabrey explained to Judge A. Smith that he had been involved in a automobile accident two years ago and had not had his license reinstated since it was revoked for lack of financial responsibility. Judge Smith also impounded Mabrey's car for 30 days in addition to the sentence.

Judge Smith noted an increase in drivers who do not carry licenses with them or drive with suspended or revoked licenses. "This is a serious offense," Judge Smith declared, saying he had tried six to eight similar cases this month.
