New Power Line In Operation

LA PINE — Midstate Electric Lines to the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company camp 15 miles west of Silver Lake were energized Friday, October 18, according to George M. Larimer, manager.

The new Weyerhaeuser camp has 21 three-room bunkhouses, several storehouses, garages and shops. The modern mess hall, according to Larimer, has a 14 foot kitchen stove and a large walk-in refrigerator.

Twelve miles of power line were required to serve the camp, of which eight were new construction as three phase line and four miles were rephased from single to three phase. The substation at the camp site uses a bank of three 167 kva transformers. The line construction was done by the DeBell Construction Company of Eugene.

UF Campaign Gain Reported

CHILQUIN — Tuesday's report from Dr. Robert L. Kerwood, who heads the United Fund - Red Cross campaign for this portion of Klamath County, showed that nearly \$900 over the 1956 contribution has been collected and turned in. Collections are being continued, he added.

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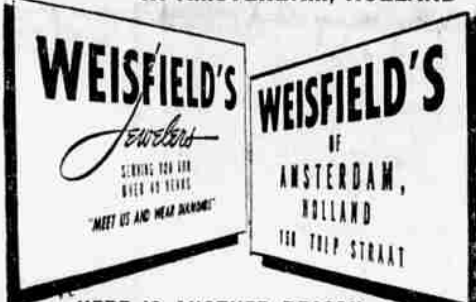
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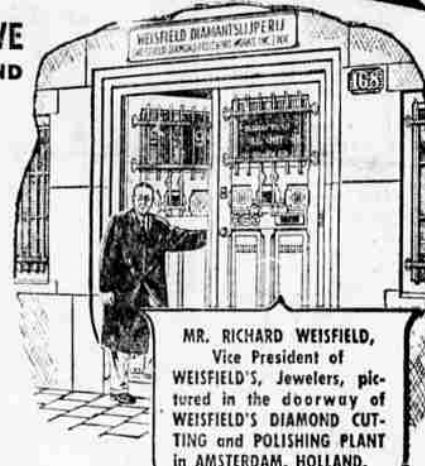
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
