

Boys Attend Stock Sale

LAKEVIEW — Activities were crammed into the two days of October 16 and 17 for two Lake County boys, Larry Maxwell, 11, and Jerry Pitcher, 15, who attended the P-I Marketing Days at Portland last week.

Larry took a hog and Jerry a steer to participate in the program which was primarily designed to take 4-H and FFA members through the complete steps of marketing their animals. Accompanying the boys were Larry's father, Warren Maxwell, who supplied a car and pickup; Al Haslebach, 4-H Club agent, and Mrs. Leonard Pitcher of Silver Lake, Jerry's mother.

The animals were consigned to the Portland Livestock Exchange and the boys followed the complete buying and selling processes. They attended an evening meeting at the Hotel Imperial conducted by Bill Fowler, marketing specialist from Oregon State College. They toured the Swift packing plant; lunched with buyers; went through the marketing service and brand inspection offices, and toured the Safeway meat distribution center. They were also guests of the Meier & Frank Company at a banquet and theater party.

The prices received for the animals were 1/2 cent to 2 1/2 cents above market prices. Jerry received 23 cents a pound for his steer. Larry's hog suffered an injured leg just before leaving Lakeview and he received salvage price for him, but Larry was signaled for honor as the winner of a summer school scholarship for having the best hog record book which was judged there. The states of Idaho, Washington and Oregon competed.

Farm Bureau Holds Session

MONTAGUE — Approximately 50 members attended a meeting of the Shasta Valley Farm Bureau Center Tuesday evening, October 15, in the club room of the Montague Auditorium. New officers elected were Brice Martin, chairman; Roland Dexter, vice chairman; June Severns, secretary-treasurer, and Charles Phillips, delegate.

M. V. Maxwell, farm adviser of Siskiyou County, spoke on the spotted aphid which has been found in Shasta and Scott Valleys, stating that the only method of combating the infestation was by thorough spraying of all infected areas. He said it would not be necessary to spray until next spring. He also stated that Lahontan alfalfa was resistant to the insect.

E. D. (Babe) Taylor, Siskiyou County assessor, reported on valuation appraisals of properties in the county in the Montague, Weed, Long-Bell and McCloud areas. He stated his office has started appraisal of properties in Mount Shasta.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Alida Hogan and Mrs. Dinny Leavers, co-hostesses for the evening.

Land Open For Veterans

The local office of the U.S. Department of the Interior has announced that honorably discharged veterans of World War II and those men who served during the Korean campaign, may submit sealed bids for the leasing of agricultural and grazing land near the lower Klamath Lake. Bids will be received until 10 a.m. November 12.

One lot consists of approximately 750 acres and is to be leased for one year with an option to renew for 1959 and 1960. The other contains approximately 335 acres and will be leased for one year with an option to renew for 1959.
