

Lake Hearing On Beef Held

LAKEVIEW—A good representation of cattlemen reported for the beef commission hearing held Tuesday, in the Lakeview Court-house. Approximately 25 of the 30 persons present were livestock operators.

Oris Rudd, county extension agent, gave a brief explanation of what a commission is, what it can do and how it's formed. He then introduced Paul Rowell, representative of the State Department of Agriculture, who took over as hearings officer and further clarified many points touched on by the county agent.

Ted Hyde, Bly cattleman, and chairman of the beef committee for the Oregon Cattlemen's Association, presented the ideas of that group in favoring the formation of the commission. A discussion period followed during which ideas were expressed both for and against the proposal. Hyde reported the hearing as one of the best so far as to participation and interest. All sections of the county were represented except those of the extreme north end.

Any stockmen who could not be present but are interested can obtain literature from the county agent's office explaining the formation and workings of a commodity commission.

Town Using Atom Power

PLEASANTON, Calif. (AP)—The world's first all-privately financed atomic plant today poured enough electricity over Pacific Gas and Electric Co. lines in California to supply the needs of a town of 12,000 persons.

The plant, developed on a partnership basis with General Electric Co., began operating commercially yesterday.

H. R. Sutherland, president of PG&E which has invested \$572,000 in the project, said the electricity costs 50 per cent more than electricity produced by conventional means. But he said there will be a big savings if "we find ways of prolonging the life of the atomic fuel element."
