Nation's Business Outlook Eyed By Officials At Meet

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (AP)—Softening of the business boom and a letup of inflation were foreseen by top industrial executives meeting here today with Secretary of Commerce Weeks.

Members of the Commerce Department's Business Advisory Council agreed generally that business is leveling off and that 1958, with possible minor ups and downs, will average out "about as good as 1957."

In talking privately with reporters, none used the word "recession." Some suggested the lull as "healthful," and few saw ill omens in the recent sinking spells of the stock market.

Several of the industrialists thought business activity might dip slightly after the year-end holiday rush, before resuming an upward march that has characterized the past 2 1/2 years.

The council scheduled a closed door, round robin discussion of the business outlook with Weeks and other officials including Chairman Raymond J. Sautner of President Eisenhower's Council of Economic Advisers.

Vice President Nixon was invited to deliver an off-the-record talk tonight.

The government values the economic appraisal of the BAC, for its membership includes the heads of more than 100 of the largest U.S. corporations. Eugene Holman, board chairman of Standard Oil Co. (New Jersey), is BAC chairman. T. V. Houser, board chairman of Sears, Roebuck & Co. heads the council's economic policy committee.

Houser, it was learned, brought to the session a report estimating that national output in 1958 will approximate 445 billion dollars.

This is about the production rate to which the economy has climbed in the present quarter. If this output is maintained, 1958 will be another "biggest year on record," even if business expands no further.

Houser's report is a consensus of a BAC advisory team of government and private economists. It indicates, informants said, that the long rise of consumer prices soon will level off.
