Time Granted For Appraisal

T. B. Watters and E. G. Favell, management specialists, announced Thursday that the secretary of the interior has approved a two week extension of time for the completion of the appraisal of Klamath tribal assets.

The extension was requested by the Western Timber Services, the independent appraisal firm engaged in making the appraisal. The report had been due on October 21.

The management specialists stated that the appraisers had advised them that the complexities of the appraisal had made it impossible to complete the printing and assembly of the appraisal report within the time that had been previously contemplated.

Under the newly granted extension, it is expected that the complete appraisal report will be delivered to the management specialists on or before November 4. The contents of the report will not be made public until the report has been reviewed and approved by the secretary of the interior.
