Aviation Experts Speak At Kingsley Field Meet

Earl Snyder, director of aeronautics in Oregon, Charles W. Drew, district airport engineer, Seattle office of the CAA; Bob Moore, representing commercial airlines; Gilbert Smith, president of the Sportsmen Pilots of Oregon; and others spoke October 23 at a meeting on aviation, held at Kingsley Field.

The session was called by a group of local pilots and aviation enthusiasts with George Flitter and Elbert Stiles as co-chairmen, to renew interest in private flying. Organization and plans for a flying program for the immediate future were approved.

Snyder talked on the need for stimulated interest in the air in this part of Oregon, particularly pleasure flying. Interest has been lacking over the state, he said, in the past several years in aviation. He mentioned that the State Board of Aeronautics was available for any help needed.

The possibility of securing federal aid for a new terminal building at the municipal airport at Kingsley Field was discussed by Charles Drew, who stated that it is not yet too late to be included for help for that project, in the 1958 federal aid program. He said, however, that construction of such a building should be a matter of community pride with the city and entire community supporting the plan.

Such a building is sorely needed to serve the traveling public, Bob Moore said. Moore also said that

this project was of paramount importance to Klamath Falls and should receive top priority in planning for airport improvement.

It was brought out by Smith, heading the Sportsmen Pilots of Oregon that this state-wide organization is the only group that promotes private flying in Oregon.

During an open discussion period it developed that slightly more than 50 per cent of the total cost of a new terminal building could be counted upon if a federal aid program were begun. Speaker on the cost question was Charles Drew. Harold Jones outlined a plan for securing federal funds in which he assisted when a new administration building was anticipated for Wenatchee, Washington.

Letters will be sent out to all Klamath Basin residents interested in aviation, before the next meeting on November 5, in the visitor's lounge at the airport, to be present if interested in forming a local chapter of the Sportsmen Pilots of Oregon.

If interest indicates, a committee will be appointed immediately and a charter sought for the chapter.

About 30 persons attended the meeting. The Klamath Air Service and the Linton Aircraft were refreshment hosts at the Airport Cafe following the meeting.

Speaker Airs School Needs

DUNSMUIR — Roger Ellis, elementary school superintendent, termed the school "big business" in speaking to the chamber of commerce at a dinner meeting at the Hotel Dunsmuir Wednesday night.

Seeking support for a \$135,000 bond issue in the November 5 election, which will enable the school to seek \$389,000 additional apportionment from the state for school construction, Ellis pointed out that education is an important industry in the town.

The elementary school has a \$240,000 yearly budget, he said, and education experts regard the school plant as about two-thirds efficient.

Containing the 1923 building is overcrowded and obsolete, Ellis said the school population has nearly doubled in the past 20 years and some classes bulge with as many as 39 pupils.

"There is no use to hire an additional teacher without an additional classroom," he said.

The bonding would be reflected in a tax raise of only about four cents on the dollar, Ellis said.

If the new school is built in north Dunsmuir, transportation costs would also be absorbed by the state after the district's initial outlay, Ellis explained.

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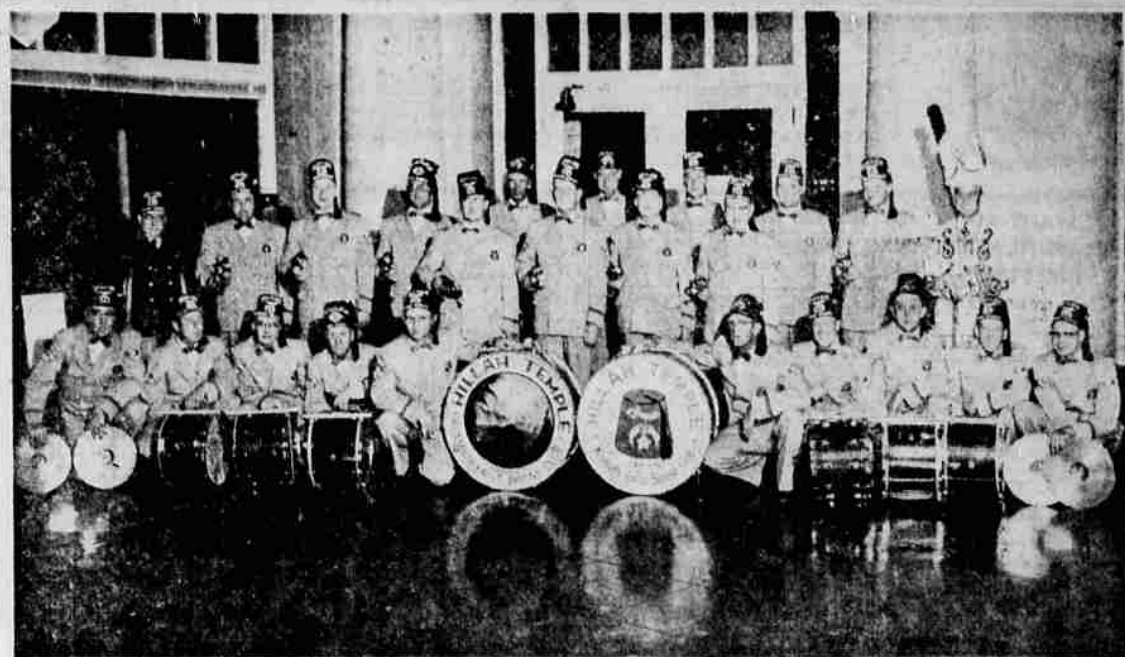
