Sister Mary Aquinas, who proudly bears the nickname "The Flying Nun" is (we understand) unique among nuns for being a licensed pilot and an expert in aeronautical science.

The 62-year-old Franciscan Sister of Charity from Green Bay, Wisconsin, has framed her comprehensive knowledge into a new Air Age Science program now being taught in Catholic Grade Schools throughout the nation.

She uses a series of workshop projects to teach an estimated half-million young pupils the wonders of aviation. The use of this special teaching technique stems from her conviction that you learn best by doing.

Besides her private flying license, Sister Mary has a background that included enough radio know-how to introduce her own six-week course in radio.

but during World War II she realized the importance of subjects that would help her pupils when they entered the armed forces. So she added navigation to the high school curriculum and drew from her wide background in science and mathematics to teach it. Her story has convinced that a cloistered life isn't always a confining one.
