

Oretech Sticks To Ground In 25-12 Win Over Rebels

The Oregon Tech Owls tucked in their wings Saturday night and stuck to the ground to defeat the Dixie Junior College Rebels, 25-14 on Modoc Field.

The OTI backs displayed some of the hardest and fastest running of the season as the fine forward wall opened gaping holes in the Rebel line.

The Owls jumped off to a quick 12-0 lead, scoring on drives of 47 and 54 yards the first two times they took possession of the ball.

Attempting only three passes, completing none and one intercepted, they ground out 267 yards on the ground, while the Rebels picked up 159 yards on the ground and 49 yards through the air.

The OTI pass defense learned a lesson from the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders last week, who downed the Owls with their aerial game, by allowing the Rebels only three completions out of 15 attempts.

Regular quarterback Charlie Genter maneuvered the Owls for their first touchdown, but was taken out with an injured ankle shortly afterwards.

However, halfback Richard Pekala took over the quarterback slot in grand style and led the Owl offense for three more scores.

The Rebels were contained by the fine OTI defensive line during the first half of play and could not get rolling until early in the fourth quarter, when they pushed across their first touchdown.

The Owls first tally came with five minutes gone in the first quarter.

Quarterback Charlie Genter called on halfbacks Alfonso Everson and Richard Pekala and fullback Belton Ollison alternately to move 47 yards in 10 plays to jump out in front 6-0.

Forcing the Rebels to punt, the Owls took control of the ball on their own 46-yard line. Everson running hard and fast on a quick opening through the middle for 15 yards, Ollison picked up four more, and then Wally Wood went through a gaping hole in the middle of the line for 21 yards to the Rebel 14-yard line.

Fullback Ollison blasted for eight yards and Everson went six yards for the score but an offside penalty nullified the play and moved the ball back to the 11-yard line.

Wally Wood clicked off seven yards and three yards over the middle, with Pekala in the quarterback slot on a keeper went over for the score.

The Owls kicked off and recovered the ball when the Rebels muffed the catch. The Owls then proceeded to move the ball down field from Dixie 37 to the four-line but could move no more and lost the ball on downs.

In the second quarter the Owls score came with five and one-half minutes left in the half, as they stuck to the ground and moved 42 yards, with Everson carrying through a big hole over center and going over standing up.

The last OTI touchdown came in the third quarter after they held the Rebels on downs and took control of the ball on the Owl 27-yard line.

Again it was straight ground power that provided the scoring punch, with a 17-yard scamper by Ollison, a 23-yard trek by Everson picking up the big chunks of yardage before Wally Wood scampered around his own right end, and with a fine burst of speed went through the Dixie defense and 17 yards for the score.

Pekala tossed to end Norm Hooper in the end zone for the extra point.

The Rebels two scores came early in the fourth quarter, the first on a 64-yard drive, with quarterback Ferris Lynn literally diving over the Owl defensive line from the two-yard line.

Taking the kickoff after the score the Owls fumbled on third down and the Rebels recovered.

The Rebels threatened to score again in the final minutes of the game, and did cross the goal line

on a fine pass from Lynn to end George Varanakis in the end zone, but a holding penalty nullified the play and the Owls strong defense held them back until the buzzer ended the game.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Joe Gordon, who managed the San Francisco Seals to a Pacific Coast League pennant this past summer, can have the job of managing the Boston Red Sox-owned Minneapolis Millers if he wants it.

"Gordon was very successful with the Seals," Joe Cronin, Red Sox general manager, commented here Saturday. "If he would like to come back as manager of the Millers, we would be very happy."

Cronin said, however, that he had not seen Gordon.

"The grapevine tells me that Gordon would rather have a West Coast baseball job," Cronin commented.

Cronin is in San Francisco on Red Sox business and to settle the estate of his brother, Jim, who died last week.

The Red Sox purchased the Seals franchise two years ago but swapped it with the arriving San Francisco Giants for the Minneapolis American Assn. Club. The Giants will move the franchise elsewhere to make room for their own move from New York.

Gordon, contacted at his home in Sacramento, declared, "I'll have nothing to say until I talk to Cronin."

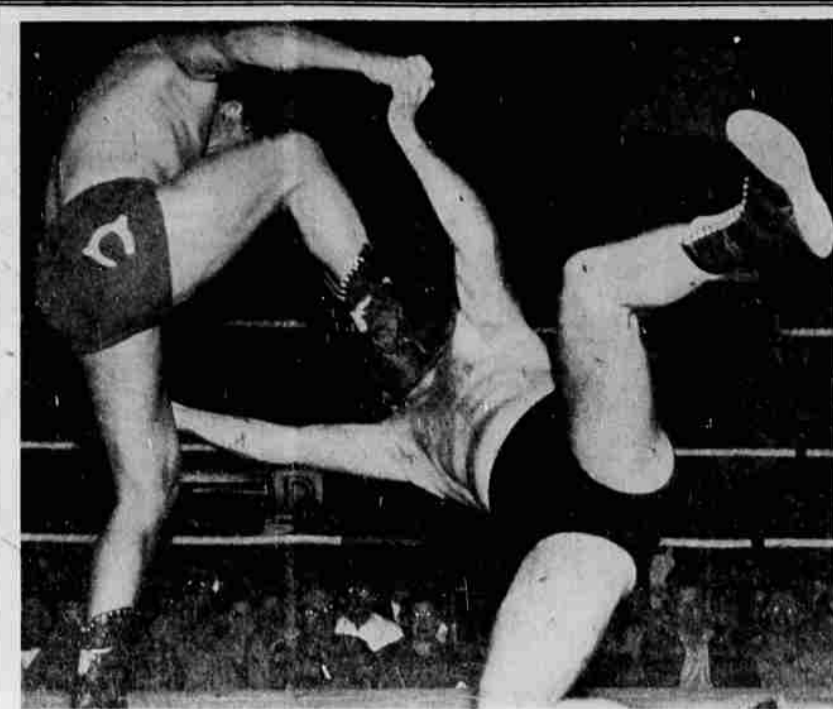
Gordon has previously said he would prefer a West Coast scouting job if he failed to get a managing job in the majors.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Oct. 27 (AP) — Ross Fichtner, Purdue's sophomore secret weapon in the Boiler-maker's upset of Michigan State last week, started again Saturday in a 37-6 victory over Miami of Ohio.

The lean 6-foot quarterback threw two touchdown passes to end Tom Frankhauser, for 12 and 13 yards, set up another score with a 42-yard pass play to Rich Barnes, and kicked an extra point.

Major Grid Powers Find Going Rough

Grandma may like to call it perspiration, but the old gal is wrong this time—that was plain old sweat that major powers such as Oklahoma, Iowa, Notre Dame, Michigan State and Army wiped off their brows after another round of college football Saturday.

Oklahoma, the nation's No. 1 team, had to rush from behind on a last period 8-yard run by Clendon Thomas and a conversion by

Michigan State, chopped down last week by Purdue, also had to sweep from behind, defeating Illinois 19-14. Army, expected to march over Virginia, had to hustle back before winning 20-12.

Three of the top 10 in this week's Associated Press poll didn't make it, although fourth-ranked and unbeaten Duke escaped with a 14-14 tie against 11th ranked North Carolina State. But Mississippi was socked for its first defeat, 12-6 by Arkansas, and Louisiana State lost to Florida 22-14. Ol' Miss was No. 6, LSU No. 10.

The second string powers, as a whole, had it a bit easier. Stanford shocked UCLA 20-6 and Ohio State needed a third period field goal for a 16-13 edge over Wisconsin, but Oregon stayed on the Rose Bowl trail by defeating California 24-6. Michigan struck fast for a 24-7 victory over Minnesota in a battle between two second-10 members for the Little Brown Jug. Navy, with Tom Forrestal tossing four TD passes, walloped Wisconsin Penn 35-7.

Iowa had itself a tussle in the mud at Northwestern before All-America tackle Alex Karras recovered an NU fumble on the Wildcat 33 in the final period. Randy Duncan then got off a pass that bounced off Kevin Furlong's chest, off a defender and back to Furlong — who took it over for a 31-yard play and retained Iowa's Big 10 lead.

Duke blew a 14-0 lead as NC State moved for the tying touchdown after a 53-yard pass interception return by center Jim Ododo. The Wolfpack stopped Duke a foot short of the goal late in the game, but the Blue Devils still look like a good bet for the Orange Bowl.

A pair of sucker passes, both by George Walker, caught Mississippi flat-footed, looking for rushing plays, in Arkansas' upset, while Walt Kowalczyk tore off a 36-yard scoring sprint in the final period to save Michigan State further embarrassment.

Elsewhere, Penn State knocked Syracuse from the unbeaten 20-12, and Dartmouth took over as the East's lone unbeaten, untied major team with a 26-0 job on Harvard.

Oklahoma Sooners Edge Buffs 14-13

NORMAN, Okla., Oct. 27 (AP) — No. 1 ranked Oklahoma, outplayed by Colorado for three quarters, pulled out a fourth period touchdown Saturday with a desperation drive to beat the underdog Buffaloes 14-13.

It was halfback Clendon Thomas' 8-yard slash around left end and a perfect conversion by quarterback Carl Dodd that gave Oklahoma the decision with 4 1/2 minutes gone in the last quarter. It was the 45th straight victory for Oklahoma.

Colorado, the nation's leading rushing team, came into the game a four touchdown underdog but led by its sterling halfback Bob Stransky, the Buffs never let up trying for the upset of the season.

The Big Eight Conference game kept Oklahoma on top of the standings with three league victories. The Sooners have now played 62 conference games without a loss.

Mistakes and penalties at crucial times hurt both teams but there was no doubt that Colorado was at its peak against a hard playing Sooner squad.

The partisan sellout crowd of 61,700 had come for a slaughter but instead was jerked into the reality that the Sooners were fighting for their football life.

Stransky, a hard-hitting halfback who jarred Oklahoma's line, teamed up with Eddie Dove, the other halfback, to collectively make 116 of Colorado's 213 yards rushing.

A new multiple offense used by Colorado this season for the first time also kept Oklahoma off balance in the game played in 42-degree weather.

The half ended with the 19-0 score and the Crusaders settled down in the second half to hold the Bonanza chargers in tow.

The game was nip and tuck throughout most of the second half, with Sacred Heart at one time getting as far as the Bonanza 18-yard line before running out of fuel.

Red Raiders Top OCE 21-19
ASHLAND, Oct. 27 (AP) — Fullback Larry Maurer scored three second-half touchdowns Saturday to lead Southern Oregon to a 21-19 football victory over Oregon College of Education.

The victory gave SOC first place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Southern Oregon was behind 19-0 when Maurer scored twice in the third period — on a four-yard run and an 18-yard gallop after intercepting a pass.

Maurer later dashed 64 yards for another TD. Two of the crucial SOC conversions were kicked by Lance Locke. Lee McGill ran the other for the winners.

Oregon College opened its scoring in the first period on a 33-yard pass from Ron Lolma to Wyman Gernhart.

In the next period Larry Buss and Don Lumgair each scored on short plunges.

Iowa 6 Northwestern 0
EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — Kevin Furlong scored on a fluke pass reception in the fourth quarter Saturday on a play good for 31 yards to give Iowa a 6-0 victory over Northwestern.

LAKEVIEW (Special) — In a game which was highlighted by 10 touchdowns, five of which were pushed across in the second quarter, the Lakeview gridders Saturday afternoon pushed back Alturas 33-32.

Lakeview took the lead early in the first period when Marv Tyler went 30 yards for the score. Tracy ran the conversion. Alturas knotted the count early in the second period when Estle Argabright went in from two feet out and the try for point was right down the middle.

In the opening minutes of the fourth period Alturas took the lead when an Argabright to Gloster pass was good for the score. At that point Alturas was on the long end of a 32-27 count.

The Lakeview winners put the lid on late in the fourth period after a perfectly executed flanker play had allowed a Tyler to Story pass to put the ball on the 12 with a 40-yard gain.
