

Stormy Session Promised At PCL Meet Next Week

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Realignment planning for the Pacific Coast League was narrowing Saturday.

Most of it still concerned hopes and prospects of cities which evidenced interest in becoming new members of the loop whose membership was cut by three when the Giants took San Francisco and the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles.

Franchises for those two cities plus Hollywood must be shifted if the PCL is to survive, as it hopes, as a triple-A Class minor.

Phoenix, Salt Lake City, Spo-

kane, Denver and Long Beach all drew mention in various ways.

Phoenix would appear set although PCL president Leslie O'Connor says the league itself has taken no action at all in regard to that Arizona city. The Giants, however, bought the Phoenix franchise with the expressed purpose of putting a PCL team there. Their plans need approval of six of the eight PCL members.

That, along with the other realignment business, comes before the PCL annual meeting in Sacramento on Friday. It promises to be a stormy affair since many of the owners aren't happy over

major league invasion of their territory.

Realignment will be studied along with the amount of damages to be sought for loss of the two metropolitan areas. The amount of damages to be asked appears contingent on what happens to realignment.

Support for a PCL team was growing in Salt Lake City. A group from the Sugarhouse Chamber of Commerce (Sugarhouse is a section of Salt Lake City) asked and received support from the chamber at Ogden, 40 miles to the north.

O'Connor has suggested in the past that a solution to minor league problems might lie in the cooperative effort of two cities in the same area.

Nick Morgan Jr., a Salt Lake City businessman who once tried to buy the San Francisco Seals, says he will attend the PCL meeting.

In Spokane, Curt Haggerty, former president of the community-owned Spokane Indians of the Class B Northwest League, said O'Connor had requested a check of local baseball leaders to see whether Spokane would be interested in a PCL franchise.

Northwest members of the PCL are Seattle, Portland and Vancouver. San Diego and Sacramento would be remaining California teams if they can make the grade against the major league competition.

Haggerty said he would start contacting businessmen in Spokane immediately. He added that O'Connor's request had been relayed through Dewey Soriano, business manager of the Seattle club. He quoted him as saying PCL officials feel Spokane is one of the most likely cities for a franchise in the realignment.

O'Connor was out of his office and not available for comment on that aspect.

In Salt Lake, Morgan said also, "we are very interested in seeing Denver into the revision."

However, in the Colorado city which now is a solid member of the American Assn., the club president, Bob Howsam, said, "as of now we're in the Association and there's no thought on our part of leaving."

Long Beach was mentioned as a possible transfer point for the Los Angeles Angels franchise which the Dodgers own. The suggestion was that games be played in Long Beach when the Dodgers are not playing home games.

Dressen Leaves Senators; May Join LA Dodger Squad

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Charley Dressen Saturday was mulling over three major league baseball offers—one from his home town club, the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The veteran baseball figure announced Friday night that he has quit his \$25,000-a-year job as assistant to president Calvin Griffith of the Washington Senators.

"I'd like to be more active in baseball, on the field if possible," Dressen said. He added that his job with the Senators was mostly staying on the West Coast last season watching Pacific Coast League teams.

During the World Series in New York, Dressen said, he was approached by three major league clubs. One was the Dodgers, but Dressen declined to identify the other two.

All the offers were "on the field positions, but none was a manager-ship," Dressen said.

"However, one club indicated the job would lead to the manager-ship in one or two years," Dressen said. He did not identify the club.

The Dodgers Friday night confirmed the club has been talking to Dressen about a job as assistant to Manager Walt Alton.

"There is nothing definite to announce yet," a Dodger spokesman said. "Charley is shopping around."

"I'm going to think things over this weekend and make my decision Monday," said the 59-year-old Dressen, who previously had

That left the job to Colorado, Northwestern, Pittsburgh, North Carolina State, Arkansas, Houston, Baylor, Illinois and Virginia if this is to prove another week of upsets.

A little guy named Fran Curci ran for a pair of Miami TDs and passed for another while quarterbacking the Hurricanes to four touchdowns in 15 minutes.

The Hurricanes, all square with a 2-2 record, gave up the Kansas TD when the Jayhawks partially blocked a punt and took over on the Miami 18. A personal foul moved the ball to the 3—and it then took Kansas three plays to get it home, finally counting on Wally Strauch's plunge.

The defeat left the Kansas with a 1-4-1 record. Their lone victory was a 35-34 Big Eight Conference decision over Colorado—the club that looked like No. 45 in top-ranked Oklahoma's record winning streak Saturday.

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's Torakichi Nakamura and Koichiro, using their putters like wands of magic, shot into an almost unsurmountable nine-stroke lead over the favored Americans Saturday. One round remains in the international Canada Cup golf tournament.

It appeared it would take a miracle for Sam Snead and Jimmy Demaret, the two tourney-toughened veterans of the U. S. circuit, to overtake the inspired pros of the host nation who show no signs of slackening their sub-par sweep.

Playing in occasional rain and stiff winds, Nakamura, business-like little Japanese Open champion added a five-under-par 67 to a previous brace of 68s for a 34-hole score of 203 which put him well in the lead for the individual championship.

His poker-faced partner, Ono, added a 68 to give the Japanese team an aggregate score of 414, nine strokes better than the Americans.

Struggling to regain the lead they held the first day, Snead and Demaret found the rain-soaked greens of the Kasumigaseki Country Club too puzzling for them. Each finished with a third round 71.

The American total was 423 for three days of medal play.

The Welsh team of Dai Rees and David Thomas, finding the blustery weather to their liking, moved into third place in the Canada Cup standing with a score of 428. Rees, captain of the British Ryder Cup team this year, shot a 72 and Thomas, youngest member of the British forces, a 70.

Albert's SF 49ers Meet Bears Today

San Francisco becomes the focal point on the National Football League map today when Frank Albert's surprising 49ers take on the regenerated Chicago Bears.

The 49ers, tied at 3-1 for the Western Conference lead with Baltimore and Detroit, undoubtedly will be the underdogs despite their last-second, 21-17 conquest of the Bears at Chicago two weeks ago.

The Bears, tabbed to repeat as division titleholders, lost their first three outings before roaring back last Sunday to whip Los Angeles, 34-26. Their sensational rookie, Willie (Galivating) Galimore, both-ered by a pulled muscle from the earlier games, scored four touchdowns to tie an all-time Bear record. The co-holders of that record — End Harlon Hill and Fullback

Rick Casares—both accomplished the feat against the 49ers in 1955 and 1956, respectively.

Galimore's brilliant running against the Rams made him the No. 3 ground-gainer in the NFL with 248 yards on 39 carries and a fine 6.4 average. The 49ers' Hugh McElhenny, although shackled by Green Bay, is still second to L.A.'s Tom Wilson with 60 carries for 331 yards and a 5.5 average.

But Johnny Gonzaga, a youngster without college experience, is getting more used to an offensive assignment after previously spending most of his time on defense. If desire and fortitude mean anything, Gonzaga can do the job.

The 49ers have been more successful against the Bears at Chicago than at home. The San Franciscans won games at Wrigley Field in 1952-53-54-55 prior to this year. But they've only beaten the Bears once at home—24-14 in 1953.
