## Film Industry Leader Dies

**HOLLYWOOD (UP)**—Motion picture mogul Louis B. Mayer, immigrant son of an ironmonger who became America's highest paid executive, died early today from the lingering effects of severe anemia.

Mayer, who was 72, had been suffering from the blood disorder since early this year and had undergone several transfusions recently. The reaction was complicated by a kidney infection.

Death came at 3:35 a.m. e.s.t. in the UCLA Medical Center.

A rotund little man, Mayer—known to his intimates as "L.B."—was a one-man Horatio Alger story, starting as a seagoing junkman at the age of 14 and rising to earn a salary of \$1,296,503 in 1937, one of the largest individual paychecks ever reported by the U.S. Treasury Department.

At the height of his career as movie-maker and race horse owner, Mayer was acknowledged as the most powerful man in Hollywood. As boss of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios, the world's largest film factory, his merest whim was law to thousands and the elite of movietown respected his judgment.

He resigned from MGM in 1951 and in recent years had worked as an independent producer while he waged a behind-the-scenes battle to regain control of the vast studio property at nearby Culver City through the directorship of his parent company, Loews Inc. There had been some critics who complained he failed to keep pace with the entertainment times.

He was born Louis Burt Mayer in Minsk, Russia, July 4, 1885, the son of Jacob Mayer and Sarah Melzer Mayer. When he was two years old, his parents migrated to Canada's New Brunswick Province.

## Indians Hit U.S. Policies

**CLAREMORE, Okla. (P)**—Rep. Edmondson (D-Okla.) said Monday night the United States "must double and re-double its efforts in Indian education and health during the next ten years to accomplish an honorable termination program within the foreseeable future."

He spoke to the National Congress of American Indians' 14th annual convention.

Speakers at the convention Monday sharply criticized government Indian policies.

Joseph R. Garry, P I u m e n t, charged that the government is trying to accomplish termination through administrative policies rather than through legislation.

Garry, a member of the Coeur d'Alene tribe, said, "more than 1 1/2 million acres of individual lands have been sold in the past three years. The Indian Bureau has taken House Concurrent Resolution 108 as a mandate to liquidate Indian land."

He said HCR 108 was adopted in 1953 to free Indians of government supervision but that the "real result" has been to "disband American Indian tribes."

"There are less than 500,000 Indians in the U. S. today—a small percentage of the population," Garry said. "If any group is struggling for survival it's the Indians."

"Otherwise, I consider it mine." The find, Maynor said, consisted of 89 \$1,000 bills and the remainder in \$50 bills, all dated before 1946.

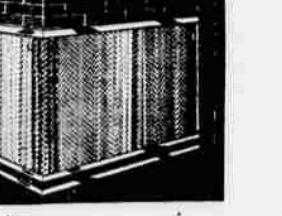
"It wasn't just lying around," Maynor said. "It was packed for protection." Police last night said they had no official report of the matter.

**Buenos Aires (P)**—Trumpeter Louis Armstrong says the U. S. government could "put its foot down" to stop race disturbances.

"but, you know, the government is run by Southerners."

Touring South America with his band, the famous Negro musician told newsmen after his arrival last night that American Negroes are beginning to refuse to be pushed around.

"We don't take that jive now," he said, adding "I'll tell the same thing to anyone I meet down here."

Armstrong after the Little Rock segregation riots announced he was rejecting a State Department invitation to take his band to Russia. Three weeks later he said he had changed his mind and would go if the State Department wanted him to.

The jazz player's arrival here for a two-week engagement touched off a near-riot as Argentine fans mobbed him at the airport. Undeterred by fire hoses, the crowd burst through police and fire lines and almost forced Armstrong to the ground in their welcome.

## GI Sentenced For Shooting

**SEOUL (P)**—U.S. Army Specialist J.C. Raymond L. Bailey of Brownsville, Ind., today was convicted of needlessly shooting and killing a 15-year-old Korean school boy and sentenced to nine months at hard labor.

An Army general court-martial also ordered a bad conduct discharge for Bailey, who was guarding a military train at the time of the shooting Oct. 3.

The sentence is subject to review by higher military authorities.

## INDIA PROCLAIMS AMNESTY

**NEW DELHI, India (UP)**—The government today announced a general amnesty for all Naga rebels convicted or under trial for anti-government activities. About 300 rebel tribesmen, including some of the head-hunting Nagas serving sentences for murdering other natives, were expected to benefit from the decree.
