SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—Three victims of an influenza epidemic returned to action with the University of Washington Huskies Tuesday, and had to work out in the rain.

Don McCumby, Don Armstrong and Dave Enslow, who missed last week's game, were on hand as Coach Jim Owens put the emphasis on pass defense and defense in preparation for Saturday's contest with Southern California.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—First string end Larry Aldrich will miss Saturday's game against Montana State because of a shoulder separation, so University of Idaho Coach Skip Stahley is sorting his reserves.

Texas' Roy Harris Decisions Besmanoff

HOUSTON, Tex. (UP)—Roy Harris, the quick-fisted school teacher from Cut and Shoot, Tex., added No. 22 to his unbeaten string Tuesday night with a unanimous 10-round decision over German heavyweight Willie Besmanoff.

Harris, ranked third among NBA heavyweights, told Besmanoff after handing him his fourth straight defeat in the U.S. "you sure know how to hit."

But Besmanoff emerged from the fight bloody from cuts over the right eye and nose, while Harris was unmarked. There were no knockdowns.

Tuesday the Indians went through a rugged defensive drill and then went to work on offensive blocking. Fullback Jim Byer, center Russ Steele and tackle Troy Barbe are still ailing, but may see action against the Ducks.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UP)—Halfback Harvel Pollard, who suffered a bruised back last week, may miss the San Jose State game Saturday with Cal Poly—but the rest of the Spartans will be ready for action.

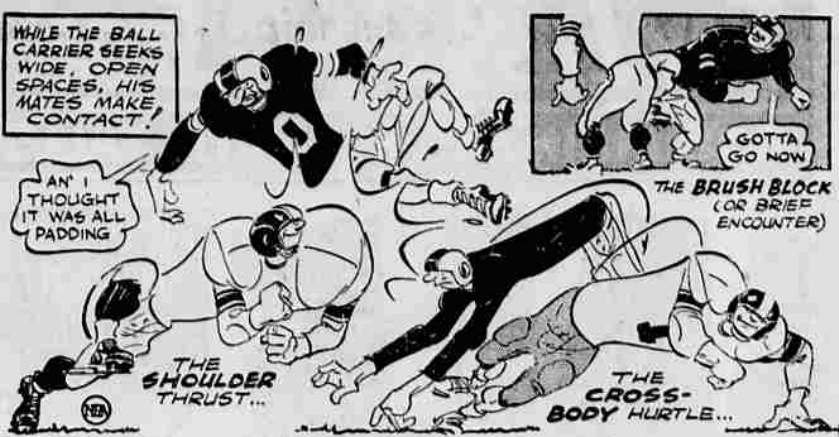

Sauer Selected Comeback Player Of National League

NEW YORK (UP)—Big Hank Sauer, 38, who hit 26 home runs to give the Giants a needed lift in their last season in New York, made the National League Comeback of the Year in 1957.

This was the verdict of the members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. who participated in The Associated Press annual poll.

Sixty-four of the 139 participating writers felt Sauer's recovery from a poor season in 1956 was the most noteworthy. Cincinnati third baseman Don Hoak was second with 29 votes.

Far back in third place was Giants' pitcher Ruben Gomez with seven votes. He was followed by first baseman Stan Musial of St. Louis with six and Brooklyn pitcher Johnny Podres with five.

Sauer embellished his 1957 home run output with 76 runs batted in. He batted .259 in 127 games. His 26 circuit blows increased his total for 13 big league seasons to 275.

The resident of Inglewood, Calif., was given his unconditional release by the St. Louis Cardinals at the close of the 1956 campaign. He was picked up by the Giants as a free agent.

Sauer's 1956 batting average was .298. But he played in 75 games, many of them as a pinch-hitter, and managed five homers and 24 RBIs.

Hank's best year was 1952 when he led the National League with 37 homers and 121 runs batted in for the fifth-place Chicago Cubs. He won the Most Valuable Player Award. He is the only member of a second-division club to have done so.

Mississippi and Kentucky have been football rivals since 1944.

Hoak also was helped by a change of uniform the past season. In 1956 he hit .215 for the Cubs. With the Redlegs he had a .293 average along with 19 homers and 90 RBIs. In 10 previous professional seasons—major and minor league—Don never hit more than seven home runs.

Gomez, who compiled a 7-17 record last year, won 15 games and lost 13 in 1957. He was the Giants' biggest winner.

Musial won his seventh league batting title with a .351 average after finishing with .310 the previous season. Podres, in his first season out of Uncle Sam's Navy, captured the earned run title with 2.66 and won 12 games while losing nine.

Slugging outfielder Del Ennis of St. Louis was named as the comeback player on four ballots. Red Schoendienst, Milwaukee second baseman, got three votes.

Players with two votes were first baseman Dee Fondy, shortstop Dick Groat and pitcher Vern Law of Pittsburgh, pitcher Curt Simmons and shortstop Granny Hamner of Philadelphia, third

baseball player of Philadelphia, third baseman Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee and first baseman Gil Hodges of Brooklyn.

Those who received single votes were pitchers Lew Burdette and Gene Conley, outfielder Wes Covington and first baseman Frank Torre of Milwaukee, outfielder Willie Mays of the Giants and shortstops Ernie Banks of Chicago and Alvin Dark of St. Louis.

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
