

# 'Bad Boy' Teamsters Union To Plan Next Move At Talk

WASHINGTON (UP)—Suspension from the AFL-CIO puts the big Teamsters Union in the position of a naughty little boy put in a corner—he's got to decide whether he's going to be good or bad. Except perhaps a federation is wounded pride, nobody's been hurt yet in labor's corruption cleanup drive.

But the parent federation is ready to wield a spanking, in the form of outright expulsion in December, unless the truck driver union agrees to mend its ways and oust its president-elect James R. Hoffa.

Both the Teamsters and George Meany, the AFL-CIO's president, and the man calling the federation's shots in handling the Teamsters situation, have avoided doing anything so far that would end all hope of healing the breach.

The Teamsters executive board meets here tomorrow to decide what to do. Among rumors on what might happen are that Hoffa may agree to step out or that the union may decide to hold another convention to elect new officers.

But so far the effect of the Teamsters suspension status has

been to give the union's leaders time to decide their own fate so far as the AFL-CIO is concerned.

"Very frankly," Meany says, "we want to keep the Teamsters in this federation. We will not pay the price that the Teamsters evidently want us to pay, which was indicated by their actions at their convention."

"We want to keep them in, in compliance with the constitution, that is their decision and not ours."

Meany said he's holding up orders for the scores of state and city AFL-CIO groups to oust Teamsters from their memberships and official posts. He also has held up orders to cancel working arrangements by other AFL-CIO unions with Teamster units.

Hoffa said in Chicago yesterday that the Teamsters will support AFL-CIO unions, including their strikes, whether the union is inside or outside the federation.

"But I hope it will be inside," he added.

Neither Meany nor the teamsters want to talk about the scrap they might get into if expulsion comes.

# Mental Inmates End Revolt; 36 Hostages Returned Okay

MEDICAL LAKE, Wash. (UP)—Simmering unrest among criminally insane patients at the State Mental Hospital blew up into a dramatic nine-hour revolt that ended harmlessly last night for 36 hostages.

"It was all a misunderstanding and there will be no changes in the program," said Dr. Garrett Heyns, state director of institutions, in two radio broadcasts the rebels ordered him to make before they would give up.

Not until the inmates heard Heyns' voice over their radios in the big maximum security building would they release the guards and turn over weapons that included two makeshift knives, some razor blades and a tear gas riot gun.

Heyns, who raced to Spokane, 15 miles away, in a state patrol car to make the broadcasts over a commercial radio station, didn't say enough in his first statement.

An inmate then asked by telephone that Heyns also assure them that popular Dr. E. R. Hodgson would be retained as medical director of the security unit. Heyns went across the street to another station and added a promise about Hodgson in a second broadcast.

Only minutes after Heyns returned from Spokane, the inmates told the 17 guards on the night shift, waiting outside to get ready to come in, that the hostages would be released when they arrived at the door. They were.

The hostages came out the gate one by one and were greeted by tearful wives who had waited in the rain for hours, watching while

state patrolmen unloaded rifles and shotguns from their cars for a possible assault, and waiting while Heyns, Hodgson and Dr. G. Lee Sandritter, hospital superintendent, conferred with inmates inside.

Albert Hutchings, chief security guard at the building, resigned Monday at Heyns' request and the inmates had read newspaper accounts of it. Heyns said they apparently thought Hutchings' departure would change the treatment system.

Hutchings, dressed in civilian clothes, was called into the two-hour conference between inmate leaders and Heyns at the request of Edwin Thomas, serving time for second degree assault and rape from King County (Seattle).

Hutchings walked alone into the building, waving at an occasional patient he saw in the building. Heyns said he made "a very good presentation" and helped a lot. He didn't say he would be rehired

and Hutchings said he wouldn't go back.

Thomas, identified by guards as one of the ringleaders, was also a member in the 1955 revolt at the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla. He has been here six months for psychiatric treatment.

"We were very well treated, played cards and listened to the radio after the first tension wore off," said Guard Roger Blue. "We were fed and weren't awfully worried."

Other released guards agreed the inmates treated them well after herding them into rooms about 10:30 a.m. yesterday when two inmates pulled pieces of scissors on Guard Kenneth Berger and took over. There were 154 inmates in the building at the time. The most dangerous were locked in a

third floor wing with their guards from the beginning and took no part.
