Treatment Funds Needed

Dwindling funds of the Klamath County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, that are insufficient to continue physical therapy care for two local polio patients, have necessitated return of Mrs. Donald (Jeanne) Baldwin and Dorothea Rose, to their homes here. Both have been patients at the California Rehabilitation Center, Santa Monica, California.

Marked improvement in the condition of both young women was recorded during their stay. Cost of treatment averages \$1,030 per month, according to figures released during the recent visit of Jack Major, Portland, Oregon, state chairman for the national foundation.

While funds are needed for continued research in the field of polio, much of the fund to be raised in the coming campaigns

will be needed to carry out rehabilitation treatment for victims of the dread disease. Jim Ray is Klamath County chairman for the national organization.

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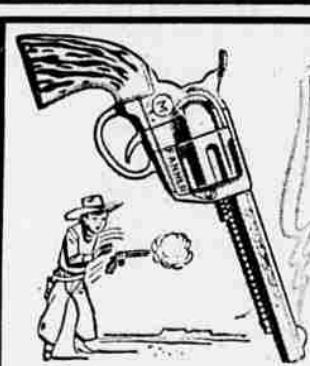
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
