## Treasury Works To Stay Within U.S. Debt Limit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Treasury officials said today that, barring some unforeseen emergency—national or international—they have every hope and intention of staying within the 275-billion-dollar limit on the national debt.

And they emphasized they don't expect any congressional drive for increased defense spending to alter that plan.

The officials concede they're skating on thin financial ice, and they acknowledge the ice is going to get thinner in the coming months. The debt right now is about 900 million dollars short of the ceiling imposed by Congress—not much of a margin for a time of year when government spending traditionally outruns tax collections by a considerable amount.

The Treasury's problem is see-

ing that the spending doesn't dig too deeply into its four-billion-dollar cash reserve, require more borrowing and force the debt up to the limit.

Treasury projections indicate the debt will climb to within one or two hundred million dollars of the limit before corporation tax payments next spring start to take the heat off.

Even then they won't be out of the woods if there is an unexpected drain on the government's funds.

The 275-billion-dollar limit was imposed by Congress in 1946. For the fiscal years 1955 and 1956, however, Congress granted a temporary increase of six billion dollars. For fiscal 1957, which ended last June 30, the temporary increase was three billion dollars.

to a total of 278 billion.

Discussing military spending in his news conference yesterday, President Eisenhower noted Congress last session did not authorize another temporary boost in the limit, thus making it rough financial going during the winter months of low government income.

He might have added that former Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey said last summer he wasn't going to ask for even a temporary increase. His successor Robert B. Anderson, has said the same thing—both with the obvious knowledge and backing of the White House.

What happens if the debt goes over the limit?

"It just can't, that's all there is to it," a Treasury official said. However, there is one way the

Treasury can wriggle off the hook if things get too tight. It can ask other government agencies which now borrow from the Treasury to borrow money from the public.

Earlier this month, for instance, the Federal National Mortgage Assn., borrowed 750 million dollars with an issue of securities backed by the government. Part of that 750 million went to the Treasury to repay money FNMA had borrowed from the government earlier. Thus the Treasury

was able to show a stronger cash reserve, without increasing the debt which is subject to limitation.

A Treasury official said today that more such borrowing in the future is possible, but "not in the books right now."

"The Defense Department right now is about 400 million dollars over its expected rate of spending for the July-December period," the spokesman said.

**New Mexico Flu Cases Hit Record**  
SANTA FE, N. M. (AP)—The incidence of influenza continued to spiral upward in New Mexico as the State Health Dept. reported that the week ended Oct. 26 was the worst on record. A department spokesman said 5,003 cases were reported during the week. The previous record was 3,978 cases during the week ended Oct. 12. Department figures show 22,929 cases reported so far this year, compared with 3,293 cases a year ago at this time.
