WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower may be risking a political black eye in his enthusiastic endorsement of Republican Malcolm Forbes in the New Jersey governorship race.

French Crisis Looks Better

PARIS (AP) — Felix Gaillard seemed to be making good progress Thursday in lining up preliminary support for his bid to end France's month-old governmental crisis.

However, many national assembly deputies have already left Paris for the long All Saints weekend and will not be back before Monday.

Gaillard, finance minister in the last cabinet, will go before the national assembly Tuesday to ask approval as France's 24th postwar premier.

Milk Price Fix Charged

PORTLAND (AP) — A federal grand jury Wednesday indicted nine firms on charges of conspiring to fix milk prices in this area.

Judge William East set Nov. 22 for arraignment of Safeway Stores, Inc.; Oregon Milk Distributors; and seven members of the distributors.

The indictment accuses them of agreeing "to fix prices paid to producers for raw milk, to fix distributors' prices for bottled milk . . . to establish non-competitive quantity discounts for bottled milk and eliminate competition among distributors in the sale and distribution of bottled milk."

According to the indictment, the nine firms accounted for 80 per cent of the 120 million quarts sold in the Portland market area last year.

The Justice Department started the Portland milk price investigation last April. In charge was Lyle Jones, chief of the San Francisco office of the department's anti-trust division.

A distributors' spokesman denied there had been violations of anti-trust laws or a conspiracy to fix prices. He said Portland area milk prices are the lowest of any major West Coast city.

Portland stores have been selling milk at 22 cents a quart.

Death Probed By Authorities

LAKEVIEW—Lake County authorities are investigating the death of Clifford Alvin Ramberg, 47, whose body was brought to the Ousley-Osterman Funeral Home here on Wednesday by District Attorney Julian Herndon and Everett Osterman, county coroner.

The officials found the body outside the man's cabin between Kirby and Bend, about 35 miles west of Burns and 250 miles from Lakeview in Lake County. Death occurred about 11 a.m. on Wednesday, according to Osterman's estimate. An autopsy has been ordered.

Herndon said Ramberg was employed by Oregon Uranium Corporation. Brothers in Portland have been notified.

Former Basin Resident Dies

George S. Stephenson, 75, a native Oregonian, born of a pioneer family of Jacksonville, and a resident here for many years, died October 27 in Medford. For 18 years Stephenson was manager of Swift and Company.

After leaving Klamath Falls the family lived in Ashland for a time, later moved to Medford where the family home is at 721 West Fourteenth Street.

Funeral services were held October 30 at 10:30 from the Chapel here. Final rites and interment were in Siskiyou Memorial Park.

Survivors include his widow, Laura Stephenson, Medford; one son, Ward Stephenson, Co. 1 at a Grove, Oregon; also two grandchildren, Gene and Shirley Stephenson. One son, George W. Stephenson, a Seabee officer, was the first casualty from the Klamath Falls area, in World War II.

Russ Threat In Syria Eyed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Top officials today forecast that vastly increased Soviet penetration of Syria would result from a newly concluded Soviet-Syrian economic aid agreement.

Russia will be in a position under terms of the accord, they said, to triple or quadruple the number of Soviet technicians in Syria with the excuse it is helping build up Syria's economy. An estimated 250 Russian technicians are there now.

The Soviet-Syrian agreement, announced Monday, promises about 200 million dollars in aid, including technical assistance.

Authorities who have studied the terms said that Russia has effectively hitched Syria's economy to that of the Soviet bloc. If the agreement is carried out, they said, Syria will be totally dependent on Russia and its satellites. Syria's exports of cotton, tobacco and wheat will go to the Communist countries for an indefinite period.

These officials expressed belief that Syria would find repayment of the promised Soviet favors far more difficult than it would seem on paper. The 2 1/2 per cent interest rate Russia is charging for aid, they said, may turn out to be a mirage once the fine print which allows for readjustments is consulted.

The aid agreement follows up but is separate from the secret military aid pact Russia already has signed with the Damascus regime. Under this, large quantities of military equipment have been delivered to Syria during the past 18 months.

Some officials feel that the action of the Syrian government in agreeing to such vast Soviet assistance shows that Syrian leaders seem anxious to become part of the Soviet bloc instead of sticking to their pledges to remain independent.

Syria has consistently rejected American aid with the explanation that it would interfere with its sovereignty as an independent Mideast country.

A citizens tax advisory council, to be appointed as a bipartisan group by the governor of Oregon and to assist in studying Oregon's tax programs, was urged recently by Mrs. Josephine Kittredge when addressing the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Kittredge suggested the following newspapermen as possible members of the committee: J. W. Forrester of the East Oregonian, Arden Pangborn or Tom Humphrey from the Oregon Journal, Herbert Lundy or Albert McCready of the Portland Oregonian, Charles Sprague of the Salem Statesman, Robert Frazier of the Eugene Register Guard, Vern McKinney of the Hillsboro Argus, and numerous others who are interested in and well informed along tax lines.

Mrs. Kittredge maintained that an advisory group of this type would do much to reassure the people of Oregon that the tax program of the state will be studied with an unbiased and nonpartisan eye. She added that a nonpartisan group such as that recommended would be invaluable when assisting in the selection of a professional tax study organization to appraise the tax program of Oregon.

"The state of Washington has a similar committee," she said, "and it has functioned quite satisfactorily since being appointed by Governor Rossellini.

NEW RED RECORD LONDON (UP)—Russia today claimed a world record for a new helicopter which is said to be capable of carrying up to 80 persons.

Moscow Radio said the helicopter, described as the first to be powered by two turbo-rotor engines, carried a record payload of 26,463 pounds to an altitude of 7,070 feet.

The broadcast heard here said the craft also can be used to transport tractors, bulldozers and other equipment.

Investigating police said the Gall car was apparently moving at about 10 miles per hour when the child and his sister darted into its path. The young girl was not injured. No citations were issued.

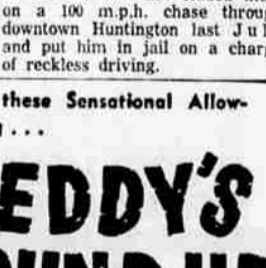
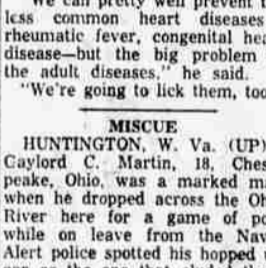
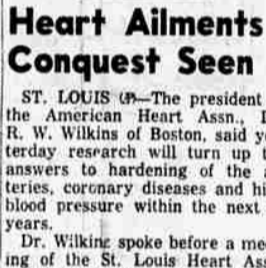
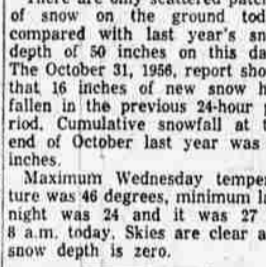
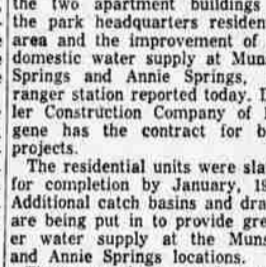
