

OTI Owls Host Wolves In Homecoming Game

Orectech Draws Underdog Role In Battle For Second

The OTI Owls will take to Modoc Field Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock against the Oregon College of Education Wolves.

It will be the 10th annual homecoming game for the Owls and the team will attempt to vault from their underdog role to give the alumni a victory and at the same time notch second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Also the Owls will be out to break a nine game loss streak against OCE. An OTI football team has yet to post a single win over the Wolves.

Coach Rex Hunsaker reports the team is in good physical condition, with the lone exception of quarterback Charlie Ganter who is still hobbling on an ankle injury he received in the game last week against Dixie Junior College.

Richard Pekala, who shifted from halfback to quarterback last week when Ganter was injured in the first quarter, will again assume the starting signal calling role.

Pekala maneuvered the Owl game very effectively against the Rebels and added three touchdowns on top of the one Ganter called.

End Dale McCullough is off the injured list and will assume his end position, relieving Norm Hooper who may see some action at fullback.

Shifting into a starting slot at left halfback in place of Pekala will be little Wally Wood, who turned in a fine performance last week.

Up in the line it will be McCullough and Bill Edinger at ends, Jack Bitzer and Dick Hill at tackles, Frank Wilson and Allen Jones at guards and Armond Mayzell over the ball.

Belton Ollison will go as the starting fullback and Alfonso "Tiger" Everson again will be at right halfback.

Oregon Prep District Titles On The Line

At least four ties for Oregon class A-1 high school football district titles can be clinched in games Friday night.

The winner of the West Linn-McMinnville contest at West Linn, the feature game of weekend action, will be assured of nothing more than a tie for the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League (district 4) championship.

Both teams are unbeaten and untied. McMinnville is No. 11 in the Associated Press poll. West Linn is 14th.

Beaverton, No. 3, is favored to whip Parkrose and clinch a tie for the Metropolitan League (district 3) title.

South Salem, No. 2, can gain the same assurance in the Valley League (district 5) by beating Sweet Home, Milton-Freewater, undefeated and untied and 12th in the poll, needs a victory over the Dalles to tie down at least a tie for the Blue Mountain Conference (district 7) championship.

Powerful South Eugene, the state's No. 1 team, will play at North Bend, Springfield, tied with Grant of Portland at No. 6, will be host to Cottage Grove. A game between South Eugene and Springfield later will decide the Midwestern League (district 5) championship.

Marshfield, which had its string of 40 unbeaten games snapped by South Eugene last week, will meet Roseburg in another Midwestern League contest. Marshfield is tied with Jefferson of Portland for fourth in the AP poll.

In Portland city league games, Jefferson will play Franklin and Grant will clash with Madison.

Milwaukie, No. 10, and still in the Metropolitan League title running, will travel to David Douglas of Portland.

Grants Pass, No. 5, and tied with Medford for the lead in the Southern Oregon Conference (district 6) race, will go out of the district to play Tillamook. Medford will meet Ashland.

Undefeated and untied class A-2 teams will put their records on the line. Vale, 7-0, will tangle with Ontario. In other games, it's Willamina, 7-0, vs. Salem Academy, 4-0; Serra Catholic of Salem, 6-0, vs. Aurora; Glendale, 6-0, vs. Brookings; and Elmira, 6-0, vs. Creswell.

to a 20-point underdog. Hunsaker feels that with the spirit of homecoming and the importance toward the final standings in the OCC will make the game a little more even.

Both the Owls and the Wolves fell victim to the aerial power of the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders, OTI falling 33-12, while the Wolves were edged out 21-19.

The two teams will weigh out about even in the line, while OTI will come out on the long side in the backfield. But to make the scales tip more evenly the Wolves have the edge in speed.

The Wolves operate off the T-formation, have a fine passing game, and depend a lot on deception.

Dr. William D. "Bill" McArthur is in his tenth year at OCE and has yet to suffer a defeat at the hands of an OTI squad. He has led the Wolves to two undefeated seasons and has won the OCC four times and shared the leadership twice.

Starting for the Wolves will be Todd Sloan and Larry Gower at ends, Barry Adams and Wayne Osborne at tackles, Jim Atkins and Harry Nosack at guards, and Len Brewer at center.

Calling the plays for OCE will be his stellar freshman quarterback Jim Bowen, with Larry Buss and Wyman Gerhart at halfbacks, and Don Lungair in the fullback slot.

Conference play, falling to Ashland last week 19-12, scared Grants Pass by holding the Cavemen to a 19-12 victory, but were routed by Medford, 40-14.

Getting the starting nod offensively for the first time this season in the quarterback slot will be sophomore Blake Griegs, who has been looking very good in practice and in the junior varsity game he played last week.

Other than this change, the lineup reads the same, with Cox and Kranenberg at ends, Inxley and Vinson at tackles, Stillwell and Hancock at guards and Carlson at center.

Filling out the backfield will be Humphrey and Van Buskirk at halfbacks and House at full.

The Comets will depend on the evasive running of Allen Barnes, and he will be the boy the Pels

will have to stop if they hope to post their first conference win.

The Comets are a young club and are grooming their team for next season. They will start nine juniors and two seniors against the Pelicans.

Operating off the split-T formation the Comets will go with their speed and deception, while the Pelicans have been trying to come up with a tricky play or two themselves off the single wing formation.
