

Merrill, Malin Vie For County Crown

The District 5-B football crown will be on the line at 8 o'clock tonight when the potent Merrill Huskies host the Malin Mustangs under lights.

Both squads enter the game with perfect marks, the Mustangs having won five and lost none, and the Huskies riding the crest of a 4-0 mark.

Coach Al Keck said this morning that his squad is strictly up for the game, and that Bud Maupin will probably fill in the offensive halfback slot which was hampered two weeks ago when power driving John Haskins was taken from the game with an injured knee.

Keck said Haskins will probably handle the defensive half slot and Bud Maupin will handle the offensive chores normally manned by Haskins. Keck added that David Andrew will move into the line slot normally handled by Maupin.

A completely optimistic report comes from the Malin Camp. "We have no injuries, we're working well, and we're looking forward to the game tonight," adds Malin mentor Jack McGoldrick.

In other county league tilts the Bonanza Antlers will invade Talent at 8 o'clock tonight and can clinch down third place in the league standings with a win. Coach Erwin Ellis said his squad is raring to go and should have an edge inasmuch as Talent has less game experience.

Talent has a little weight edge in the line, but Bonanza has the speed in the backfield and plans on sticking to the ground. Roberts has been handling the quarterback slot very well and has displayed a pot full of ability when mixing up the plays.

In the Saturday county league game the Chilquin Panthers will cross the mountain to go against the St. Mary's Crusaders on the Medford field. The game will be at 8 p.m. Coach Gordon Kuist adds that his Panthers are in excellent shape, and plan to open up with both passing and running games. It will be a homecoming game for the St. Mary's squad.

The other scheduled game between Jacksonville and Sacred Heart of Klamath Falls was called off because of flu.

Indians Ripe To Kill Ducks Rose Dreams

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The high-flying University of Oregon Ducks, who hope to reach the Rose Bowl city of Pasadena by New Year's, migrate through Stanford Saturday—and a hungry tribe of hard-throwing Indians is ready for 'em.

However, the Ducks aren't easy to hit when Coach Len Casanova's speedy backfield—sparked by racehorse Jim Shanley—has a good day. Washington State and Oregon State meet in the other.

Oregon is sporting a one game edge over Washington State in the Pacific Coast Conference standings, and Stanford trails the Cougars by half a game. California, the only other team eligible for the Rose Bowl, has a record of one win and two losses in conference play.

If Washington State wants to stay in the race, the Cougars will have to get by the defending champion Oregon State, who can't go to the bowl because of the "no-repeat" rule. But the Beavers have lost two straight games and will be out to shake their slump.

California plays UCLA in the Los Angeles Coliseum—and both teams have a lot of bouncing room. The Bears were beaten by Oregon, 24-6, last week, and Stanford trimmed the Bruins, 29-6.

Southern California, looking for its first victory in six games, goes against the Washington Huskies, who have only one win—but that was a 19-7 slunner over Oregon State last week.

The ninth member of the PCC, Idaho, goes against Montana State.

Other West Coast games include: College of Pacific at Marquette, San Jose State at Cal Poly, San Francisco State at Long Beach State, Nevada at Sacramento State, Humboldt State at Chico State, Laverne at Riverside.

Lew Burdette To Be Feted In Hometown

NITRO, W. Va. (UP)—A tired Lew Burdette who said that being feted around the country "gets to be work," will be given a tribute here tonight that promises to surpass anything seen in these parts since the end of World War II.

The entire town will join in a celebration of its native son, who has not visited here since 1935. At that time, the Milwaukee Brave hurler was en route to spring training and stopped to pick up his family.

This little town, which got its name from explosives produced in World War I, is prepared to go all out for Burdette, who tamed the New York Yankees three times in the World Series.

Burdette, a hero to millions, is still "our boy" to many residents here who remember his struggle up through the minor leagues. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Selva Lewis Burdette, still occupy the same house where Lew grew up.

In addition to Gov. Cecil H. Underwood, who will give Burdette his personal congratulations, a senator and two congressmen will be in tonight's parade.

Mayor W. W. Alexander has proclaimed "Lew Burdette Day" and for 24 hours, main street will be Lew Burdette Ave. The local weekly newspaper for the first time will have a special edition dedicated to an individual.

The parade will start at the town limits and will pick up momentum as it winds through this city of 3,500. A new sign at the Nitro city limits proclaims this as the "hometown of Lew Burdette."

The youngster who designed the best welcome poster will receive an enviable reward. He will sit in the lead car with Burdette, who only a few years ago drove a cab here in the off season to make ends meet while playing in the minor leagues.

In addition, about 200 Little League baseball players will have their gloves autographed by Burdette.

Yanks Given Fine Refunds

NEW YORK (UP)—Yogi Berra confirmed Friday that he and four other New York Yankees who were fined for a brawl in a New York nightclub last May have received a refund from the club.

Berra said he, Hank Bauer, Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Johnny Kucks had been repaid and "everything is fine now." All but Kucks were fined \$1,000. The young pitcher escaped with only a \$500 nick out of his salary.

Billy Martin, whose birthday party flared into the brawl, received his \$1,000 refund when traded to the Kansas City Athletics in mid-June.

The club, which never announced the fines, neither confirmed nor denied the refund.

Said Bob Fishel, Yankee publicity director: "We made no announcement of the fines at the time and we are making no announcement now. We feel it is a club matter."

Fishel added, however, that Martin received a refund "because he was leaving the club and wouldn't have a chance to earn it back."

Hank Bauer, arrested as a result of the brawl but cleared when a grand jury failed to return an indictment, said in a telephone conversation from his home in Kansas City that he understood he was getting the money back, but had not yet received it.

Wisner's Pigskin Forecasts

NEW YORK (UP)—Those six major schools with unbeaten records, Oklahoma, Texas Aggies, Iowa, Notre Dame, Auburn and Dartmouth, all go to the "football post" this week, and two of them, Iowa and Notre Dame, both face opposition that could end their victorious streak.

The Hawkeyes, top team in the Big Ten, face the Michigan Wolverines at Ann Arbor and Bennie Oosterbaan's team, playing better football every week with their eyes on the Rose Bowl, will beat the Hawks. It will be close, the margin a touchdown.

The tradition of a long-time rivalry, one of the nation's most colorful, gets an airing at South Bend. Your observer will be broadcasting the game, and we won't try to pick the winner. Both coaches, Eddie Erdelatz of the Mids and Terry Brennan, are crying the blues. But it could be the game of the year.

Oklahoma will have it easy with Kansas State; Auburn is too big and tough for Florida; and Texas Aggies have too much for Arkansas, but the Razorbacks will be stubborn. Dartmouth will beat Yale.

To try and change our forecast, luck, we're going to take things in alphabetical order this week.

Army over Colgate, 23 to 6; Baylor over TCU, 19 to 13; Brown will be beaten by Princeton, 20 to 12; Colorado to take Missouri, 20 to 7; Duke will recover from last week's tie and beat Georgia Tech, 14 to 7; at Illinois, the Purdue Boilermakers will surprise and win, 23 to 20.

Lehigh, unbeaten and as good as any team in the East, will trim Bucknell, 27 to 12; Minnesota will have a romp with Indiana, 35 to 13; Mississippi State over Tulane, 19 to 7; Michigan State over Wisconsin, 20 to 7; Mississippi over Houston in a hot one, 21 to 19; North Carolina State will beat Wake Forest, 13 to 6; Ohio State too good for Northwestern, 19 to 7; Oregon State will beat Washington State, 13 to 6; Penn will win from Harvard, 14 to 7; Pitt over Syracuse, 19 to 13.

Rice will beat Clemson, 20 to 12; South Carolina will lose to Maryland, 14 to 7; Texas will beat SMU, 19 to 12; Oregon over Stanford 18 to 13; UCLA will beat California, 21 to 13; LSU over Vanderbilt, 27 to 13; Washington to beat Sou. Cal., 14 to 12; and Dartmouth to take Yale, 21 to 13.

It's rough again among the professionals, but when the weekend is through Cleveland and San Francisco will still be on top. The Browns will beat the Washington Redskins, 17 to 14; the 49ers will beat the Detroit Lions, 24 to 21; the Chicago Bears will win from Los Angeles, 27 to 20; Green Bay will take the New York Giants, 23 to 21; the Colts will win from Pittsburgh at Baltimore, 27 to 24; and at Chicago the Cards will beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 35 to 21.

Any sparks flying off these type-writer keys result from the general incandescence that comes over me when word comes in of another big game guide, white hunter, or shikari lugged into a hospital for a reassembly job after being beaten up by some four-legged animal mislabeled by a two-legged hunter.

When a dude tries to start right out in the big leagues, and so manages to botch an encounter with a dangerous animal that the professional who has to cover for him or her is smashed up, there's considerable anger heat raised.

A British Columbia guide came near to making his wife a widow after this "sport" had insisted, on the guide's protests, in shooting at and wounding a grizzly out of range. An Alaskan came within an ace of being chewed and clawed to bloody rubbish because his dude couldn't—or at least didn't—hit a brown bear properly at 50 yards.

Two African white hunters have gone into a hospital because the safarists they were guiding fouled up the all-important first shot on Cape buffalo, the only shot which has any real shock effect. Thereby was set up the classical charging game-in-thick-bush situation in which somebody, certainly least of all the offending safarist, is likely to get hurt.

It has become a fetish among a certain set of big game hunters, by and large the least competent of the lot, that any of the dangerous game they shoot, the "Big Five" of Africa, the tiger, panther or sladang of India, the grizzly-type bears of our own continent, must be killed in a charge.

Preferably, for parlor story effect, their beasts must drop a few feet from the muzzle of the intrepid adventurer's rifle.

When they are in truth deliberate attacks by animals they have been provoked, usually by some stupid error of tactics or riftery on the part of said intrepid adventurer. Shooting at too great a range, putting a slug into an animal's guts instead of its shoulder, or getting into a tactical situation from which the animal can escape only by running over the hunters, these are what provoke attacks by dangerous game.

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Iowa-Michigan, Navy-Irish Headline College Football

College football's stay-at-home fans get a treat Saturday. They can sit by the television set and watch what should be the best game in the country—Iowa at Michigan.

This (NBC) nationally televised battle of strong defenses, rated a tossup by the oddsmakers, will affect the Big Ten race, the Rose Bowl and Iowa morale.

Since 1924, Michigan has 12 victories and one tie in 13 games with Iowa, an especially bitter pill for Iowa coach Forest Evanshewski who played for Michigan almost two decades ago. Iowa and Ohio State are tied for the conference lead with 3-0 records. Michigan (2-1) must win to stay in the running for the Rose Bowl.

The Iowa defense, best in the nation against rushing, must stop Michigan halfback Jim Pace, leading scorer in the Big Ten. Key-stone of the Iowa attack is Randy Duncan, a polished quarterback who rates with the best in the nation.

The United Press Board of Coaches ranks Iowa third and Michigan 12th.

In another meeting between high-ranked teams, Notre Dame is a five-point favorite over Navy. Notre Dame is ranked fifth and Navy is tied for 13th. Notre Dame, whose green sophomores of 1956 have matured into the surprise team of 1957, must stop the passing of Tom Forrestal and the running of Ned Oldham and Harry Hurst. The Navy game touches off a nightmarish month for the Irish who play Michigan State, Oklahoma and Iowa on the following three Saturdays.

Top-ranked Oklahoma, Iowa and Notre Dame all are unbeaten and untied. Oklahoma, winner of 45 straight, hopes to present Bud Wilkinson with his 100th victory as Sooner coach by whipping Kansas State. Oklahoma is a 30-point favorite.

Among other perfect-record teams, Texas A & M is favored by six points over Arkansas in the Southwest Conference. Auburn by eight over Florida in the Southeastern Conference and Dartmouth by three over Yale in the Ivy League.

President Eisenhower will watch the Army-Colgate game at West Point but probably won't get the thrills those two teams provided last year when Army won, 55-46.

Friday night favorites include Miami of Florida by 15 points over Villanova and Boston University by six over George Washington. Holy Cross is the choice over the Quantic Marines in a Sunday game.

Knox Retains Jerry Giesler

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Famed criminal attorney Jerry Giesler has been retained by suspended Chicago Bears quarterback Ronnie Knox to help settle his dispute with the professional football club.

Giesler admitted Thursday night to CBS West Coast television sportscaster Gil Stratton that he had been hired by Knox. The former UCLA football star failed to appear at practice and was suspended by George Halas, owner of the Bears.

The attorney declined to confirm a report that Knox had a \$100,000 suit ready to file against Halas. Giesler stressed that he was representing Ronnie Knox and not the quarterback's outspoken stepfather, Harvey Knox.

Knox had joined the Bears this season but played only a few minutes in a defensive role before his stepfather created a furor. He claimed the club had failed to pay his stepson more than "eating money" for exhibition games.
