

Monmouth Wolves Plow Under Orectech Owls 31-7

Everson Runs Wild For Lone OTI Tally

The Oregon College of Education Wolves kept their record against the Oregon Tech Owls clean Saturday and at the same time dampened the OTI homecoming festivities by racking up their tenth consecutive win over the Owls, 31-7.

Before a sparse crowd of approximately 450 homecoming fans, the Owls tried desperately to overcome a 13-0 deficit in the second quarter, when halfback Alfonso Everson went through a huge hole in the right side of the Wolves line, cut toward the sideline and all alone outran the Wolves secondary for 63 yards and the lone OTI touchdown.

Richard Pekala booted the extra point from placement.

The Owls were in scoring contention when they moved the ball to the Wolves' 13-yard line in the first quarter after moving the ball 74 yards but ran into a solid OCE defensive line and had to relinquish possession of the ball on downs.

The Owls came back in the fourth quarter to pose two more threats but were stopped by a fumble and the final gun.

The Owls took the ball on their own 10-yard line, were held and forced to punt. OCE quarterback Jim Bowlen misjudged the ball, fumbled, and OTI recovered on the Wolves 47.

Gary Riley picked up 12 yards in two plays and then Richard Pekala, who shifted from quarterback to halfback in the fourth period, scampered 21 yards through the middle on a perfectly executed quick opener.

But the drive came to a screeching halt on the next play when Riley bobbled the handoff and the OCE defense promptly recovered.

In the waning minutes of the game, the Owls alternated between the air and the ground to drive from their own 41-yard line to the OCE 15, where quarterback Charlie Genter tried four successive pass attempts, the last intercepted.

The OTI defensive line turned in a fine performance during the first half, but the OCE offense started moving in the second half. Offensively the Owls held their own on the ground, but aerial wise, they were completely outgunned by the Wolves, which proved to be the big difference in the scoring.

OCE jumped off to a fast 6-0 lead the first time they got hold of the ball, as quarterback Bowlen maneuvered the Wolves offense as they advanced 60 yards in eight plays for the score, with Bowlen passing nine yards to end Larry Gower on the goal line. Bowlen's pass for the extra point was incomplete.

After holding the Owls, the Wolves took the OTI punt on their own 28-yard line. Bowlen was stopped for no gain and Wyman Gernhart ticked off four yards.

But then Bowlen opened up as he tossed a short five-yard screen pass to halfback Don Lumgair after letting the OTI defensive line drift through.

The play caught the Owls completely flat-footed and Lumgair went down the field behind seven OCE blockers who easily cut down the two Owl defenders. Bowlen's try from placement was not good.

In the third period, a bad pass from center on fourth down gave the Wolves possession of the ball on the OTI 34-yard line and the Wolves exploded on two ground plays to romp into the end zone.

Bowlen on a keeper over his own right tackle picked up 16 yards and then halfback Larry Buss burst through the OTI secondary on some line deception by Bowlen and went 18 yards standing up for the score. This time Lumgair tried the placement but it was not good.

Bowlen, who played equally as well on defense as he did on offense, intercepted a Pekala pass to set up the next OCE touchdown.

After moving the ball to the Owl 29 from the 39, Bowlen on fourth down tossed to Gernhart on the five and he eked away into the end zone. Lumgair tried again from the placement but the kick was wide.

The Owl aerial attack again worked more for OCE than it did for them, as Bowlen jumped high in the air to take a Genter pass out of the hands of an Owl receiver on the OTI 35-yard line, cut toward the sideline and with

good blocking trapped over the goal line upright.

The victory placed OCE in second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference standings and dumped the Owls down into third place, with two conference wins against two losses.

The Owls were out to win the game as they showed some fine hard blocking and tackling, but the Wolves varied offense—plus the Owls lack of a passing attack—proved to much for the OTI team.

However the OTI running attack proved very strong, as they were still able to grind out yardage through the middle of the line, although OCE knew that that was the way the Owl offense had to move.

On the statistics side the Owls held their own with the Wolves, but could not break away their runners of connect with the passes to get the ball across the goal line.

PCL Beef Reported Improved

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 3 (AP) — Representatives of the Pacific Coast League, the Los Angeles Dodgers and San Francisco Giants Saturday reported "substantial progress" on the score subject of new cities for the PCL and damages to be paid for National League invasion of its territory.

PCL President Leslie O'Connor, who only Friday night termed the Dodgers-Giants first offer "humiliating" came out of the second day's closed door session saying, "We are not so far apart as we were."

Louis Carroll, National League attorney sitting in as counsel for the transplanted teams from New York and Brooklyn, agreed with O'Connor's appraisal.

Sacramento Bee baseball writer Tom Kane said an informed source reported:

The PCL's initial demand was 25 cents per admission for 10 years in return for surrender of the Coast franchises.

The Giants proposed 10 cents per admission for three years plus payments to cover expenses of realigning the Coast League.

O'Connor would not comment on these reports.

A three-member PCL subcommittee was named to continue the talks as soon as possible — perhaps early next week — with E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, vice president of the Dodgers, Horace Stoneham, president of the Giants, and their aides.

Stoneham and Bavasi participated in all meetings but designated Carroll to speak for them.

O'Connor voiced confidence that a realigned Coast League would be in business in 1958. He said, even though the PCL wants to settle realignment and damages questions as a package, it's possible that the league could start operating while the directors still dickered for invasion damages.

Hollywood, and possibly Sacramento and San Diego, in addition to the San Francisco and Los Angeles PCL franchises will be directly affected by the shift of the two National League clubs.

O'Connor re-emphasized that the PCL never has entertained any intention of trying to block the Dodgers and Giants from playing on the West Coast.

LA GRANDE, Nov. 3 (AP) — Eastern Oregon Saturday held unbeaten Southern Oregon to a 0-0 tie in an Oregon Collegiate Conference football game here.

Eastern Oregon now has a 6-5-1 record in the conference. SOC has a 3-0 record.

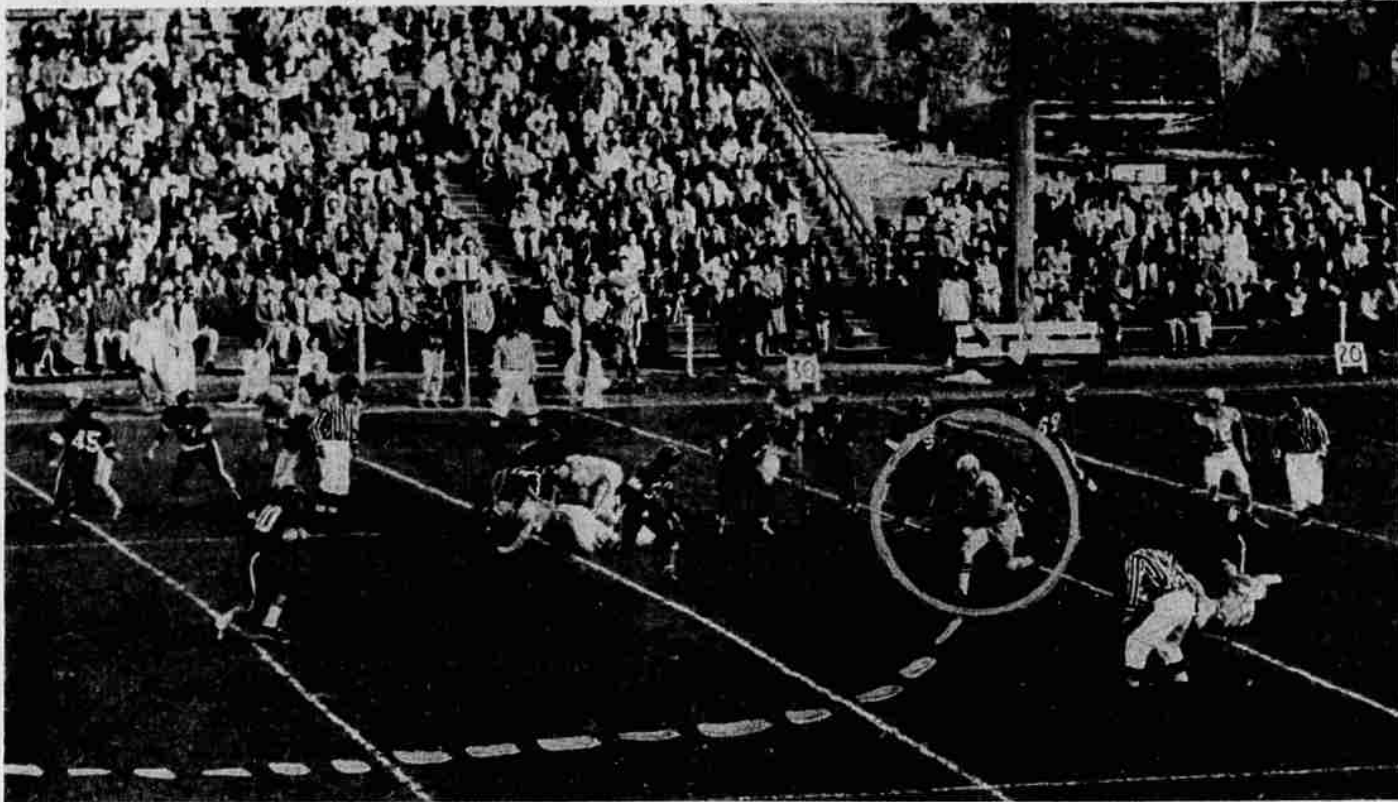
Southern Oregon drove to the EOC 5-yard line in the second period and was on the 20 when the game ended, but could not push across the goal line on either drive.

Major Prep Teams Roll To Easy Wins

All of Oregon's major high school football powers rolled to impressive victories, and six of them clinched at least ties for class A-1 district titles Friday night.

The six are South Salem and Beaverton, ranked No. 2-2 in the Associated Press poll; Jefferson of Portland, tied with Marshfield for No. 4 in the state; Grant of Portland, tied with Springfield for No. 6; McMinnville, No. 11; and Milton-Freewater, No. 12.

In addition South Eugene, the No. 1 team in the state, stayed unbeaten, untied and first in the Midwestern League. (District 3) race with a 43-12 victory over North Bend. Springfield, tied for sixth in the poll, retained its chance for the league title, de-

feating Cottage Grove, 42-6. South Salem maintained its lead in the Valley League (District 8) with a crushing 65-0 defeat of Sweet Home. It secured at least a tie for a title as did Beaverton in the Metropolitan League (District 3). Beaverton routed Parkrose, 32-6.

Jefferson whipped Franklin, 33-7, and Grant overwhelmed Astoria, 66-12. The winners will play what should be the deciding game for the Portland city league title next Friday night.

McMinnville routed West Linn, 51-25, to gain virtual assurance of the Tualatin-Yainhill Valley League (District 4) championship. And Milton-Freewater lowered The Dalles, 18-7, to nail down at least a tie for the Blue Mountain Conference (District 7) title.

Grants Pass, No. 8 in the poll, warmed up for its Southern Oregon Conference (District 6) championship game with Medford next Friday by rolling over Tillamook, 28-0. Medford downed Ashland, 13-6, in a league contest.

Marshfield, which suffered its first defeat in 41 games last weekend, got back into winning stride with a 42-13 triumph over Roseburg. Marshfield is tied for fourth in the poll.

The results leave South Eugene, and Milton-Freewater the only undefeated, untied class A-1 teams.

In class A-2, powerful Vale was hard pressed to defeat Ontario, 12-6, for its eighth victory without a defeat. Willamina also retained a perfect record in eight games with a 28-7 victory over Salem Academy. Elmira made its seventh straight, downing Creswell, 14-0.

North Marion of Aurora knocked Serra Catholic of Salem out of the unbeaten, untied ranks with a 26-13 upset.

Texas A&M, Oklahoma Still Tops

Texas A&M and Oklahoma, fighting right down to the wire for the mythical national collegiate football championship, both continued unbeaten Friday—if their performances can be taken as any indication, they will be vulnerable, indeed, the rest of the season.

The Aggies, leading the Southwest Conference, just nipped Arkansas, 7-6, on Lord Taylor's conversion, while Oklahoma had to sweat all the way to record a 13-0 triumph over Kansas State, the Sooners' 45th consecutive triumph.

It was a rocky day all around for the top teams in The Associated Press weekly poll. Not only did the Aggies and Sooners have their troubles, but third-ranked Iowa was tied, 21-21, by Michigan, fifth-ranked Notre Dame dropped a 20-6 decision to Navy (the Irish's first defeat of the year), and Duke, No. 7, was humbled by Georgia Tech, 13-0.

Fourth-ranked Auburn had no success with Florida, 13-0, and Michigan State, No. 6, trying to gain some of its lost prestige, halted Wisconsin, 21-7.

Only Ohio State and Army, Nos. 8 and 9 had easy chores among the Top 10. The Buckeyes clobbered Northwestern, 47-6 and the Cadets gave President Eisenhower a show of their power, crumbling Colgate, 54-7.

North Carolina State, 10th in the country, shut out Wake Forest, 19-0.

Like Notre Dame, Duke, the favorite to win the Atlantic Coast Conference title, lost its first game of the year. In addition, Iowa's tie with Michigan marked the first non-winning game for the Hawkeyes this year.

So now Texas A&M leads all the bigwigs with a 7-0 record. Auburn, making a bold bid for the tough Southeastern Conference title, and Oklahoma, each show a 6-0 mark.

Dartmouth, the class of the Ivy League, and the only other big-time previously unbeaten-untied in the country, could do no better than tie Yale at 14-14. Not only did the result spoil the Indians' perfect record, but it lost them a tie for the league lead.

Princeton, whose Coach Charlie Caldwell died Friday, edged Brown, 7-0, to take over the leadership of the Ivies.

In the Pacific Coast Conference, Oregon all but clinched a Rose Bowl bid by eking out a 23-26 verdict over Stanford. It was the Ducks' fifth straight PCC triumph.

Washington State, which was the only other team really in the running for the Rose Bowl spot, took it on the chin from Oregon State, 39-25.

Syracuse knocked off bowl-minded Pitt, 24-21, and in the process hurt the Panthers' chances of getting a post season game. It also just about knocked the Panthers out of contention for the mythical Eastern Championship.

The Forty Niners have fought their way into first place in the National Football League's Western Division, but every game has been either won or saved in the final minutes of play.

Detroit and Baltimore trail the San Francisco team by only a single game in the standings, so the Lions will be working to tie it up.

Both teams go into the game under additional pressure. The Forty Niners want the title as a tribute to President Tony Morabito, who died of a heart attack

during last week's game with the Chicago Bears. The Lions hope to end intra-squad bickering over charges that fullback Leon Hart has "dogged it" in recent games.

The Forty Niners will also have to contend with John Henry Johnson, a former member of what once was known as San Francisco's "fabulous" backfield. He was acquired by the Lions in an off-season trade.

Albert hopes to get his running attack in gear this week, but he can always fall back on the passing of quarterback Y. A. Tittle, and the receiving of Billy Wilson, Clyde Conner and R. C. Owens.

Head coach Ted Ammerman watched the Hornets from the sidelines as Fred Hess, the assistant grid boss, guided the Blue and Gold to their third win of the season. The Hornets have lost two and tied two and ended season play for this year.

Henley and Alturas played a scoreless first half, but the home-half kickoff and marched 73 yards in 14 plays to score with Ferguson capping the drive with a 2-yard plunge. Phil Swisher's placement kick was true and the Hornets led 7-0.

Late in the third period, a Swisher kick was returned 45 yards by Alturas' Dick Smith. Walt Arabright's PAT attempt was blocked by Ted Berry and that was all the scoring for the day.

In the fourth quarter, a 31-yard pass play from Arabright to Art Derby was nullified because of a penalty and the Hornets held on to their 7-6 victory. The defeat was the second in a row for Alturas. They now own a 5-2 season record.
