Mountain Climbers Plunge To Death

BERCHTESGADEN, Germany (AP)—Five mountain climbers, including three young girls, plunged 600 feet to their death in the Bavarian Alps near here Friday night, police reported.

Bodies of four were recovered during the night from a crevasse into which they had fallen while trying to scale the difficult south wall of 6,201-foot Mount Unters. A fifth body is missing and snow and low hanging clouds made a search difficult.

A guide who saw the accident alerted rescue squads. It was believed to be the worst mountain accident in Germany since World War II.

Missionary Is Speaker

Miss Sara E. Perkins, R.N., former Presbyterian missionary nurse in China, will speak at Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church on November 5 at 7 o'clock.

Since her return from China in the fall of 1955, where she had been held in a Communist prison camp for four and a half years, Miss Perkins has been speaking in many parts of the United States, telling of her experiences.

Miss Perkins was superintendent of nurses at the hospital in Linhsien when the Chinese Communists entered the city. She has a service record of more than 30 years as a missionary in China.

Being held as a war hostage was not a completely new experience for Miss Perkins, however. During World War II, she spent some time in a Japanese internment camp, but was repatriated in 1943. In 1946 she returned to China to continue her work in Peking.
