Women Must Learn Civic Awareness

NEW YORK (NEA)—A housewife who talks to the four walls of her home isn't helping her community.

"Women should be interested in what is happening outside the home. If they want safe streets, crime at a minimum and fewer slums, they must work for them," says Manhattan attorney Caroline K. Simon.

It was this belief in her role as a young mother of a son and daughter in the 1930's that has put her in the limelight today. Now a grandmother of three, Caroline Simon is Republican candidate for president of the city council of New York.

With silver-tipped hair and sharp blue eyes, she looks like a shampoo ad model. Instead she will be a pioneer in this city's political jungle in the November election as the first woman in New York City history to be a major party candidate for city-wide office.

Prior to this, Mrs. Simon was a powerful figure behind reforms in juvenile and women's court laws, child-labor laws and anti-discrimination action.

A native of Mount Vernon, N.Y., Mrs. Simon has been active in community and lawmaking affairs since 1926.

"I was fresh from law school"—which she attended after her marriage to attorney Leopold K. Simon—"and visited a women's

class in the U.S. Army, now stationed at Camp Hanford, Washington, will be discharged soon. Mrs. Ballard is employed at Whytal's. The young couple will leave Klamath Falls on December 24 to make their home in Fresno.
