Reds Rule Campus Club

RANGOON (AP)—Like many other schools Rangoon University Saturday found itself in the middle of an ideological contest to win minds. Mainly because of lethargy or disinterest in politics among some segments of the student body, the Communists have emerged as spokesmen for the majority. This does not mean that most of the 9,000 Rangoon students are Communists. It is doubtful if more than 200 hard-core Reds are on the campus. But aided by financial support from the Red Chinese embassy, the Communist-led Students' Union Front is the strongest organization on the campus. It seized on legitimate student complaints, used them as election issues and was able to tout itself as the popular champion of academic privileges. There had been student complaints about overcrowded dormitories, high entrance fees, lack of study space and short vacations. Knowing the financially drained university could not cope with these complaints, the Communists used them heavily during the campus election.

Insurance Racket Eyed

SELMA, Ala. (AP) — Authorities investigating the deaths of four persons have questioned a 36-year-old Negro woman who held 84 insurance policies which named her as the beneficiary. Mrs. Mary Perkins shot herself in the chest after she was questioned about the death of her 7-year-old son who died last week, a day after the mother increased a policy on his life from \$250 to \$1,500. Solicitor Blanchard McLeod said the woman, who underwent an operation for removal of the bullet Friday, is recovering. McLeod and Sheriff Jim Clark said the third and fourth bodies were exhumed for examination Thursday night. The bodies of Mrs. Perkins' son and husband had been exhumed earlier.

"Hero Medal" Won In Rescue Feat

BALTIMORE (AP) — Donald E. Maier was officially "hero of Baltimore" Saturday for saving the life of a Negro boy atop a moving freight train. The 16-year-old white boy received the hero's certificate Friday from Mayor Thomas D'Alesandro at City Hall. Maier was awarded for his Sept. 29 rescue of Johnny Powell, 19 in the Pennsylvania Railroad Yards. Witnesses said Donald climbed a freight car to rescue Johnny who had brushed against a high-tension wire while playing atop the car. Just then the car began moving and Donald held young Powell flat so he would not contract the wire again as the train passed through a tunnel. The train later was stopped at the city's outskirts. Johnny underwent a skin-grafting operation and was reported in satisfactory condition.

Desert Site Of Station

BEERSHEBA, Israel (AP)—A desert institute has been opened in this "desert capital" of Israel.

The idea is to centralize many of the arid zone research studies hitherto carried out by various scientific institutions in Israel. These efforts will be continued and coordinated at Beersheba, on the fringe of the Negev Desert, which covers about half of Israel. The further development of the Negev is the big hope of this nation, which plans to absorb thousands of additional immigrants during the coming years.

The first department of the desert institute will include a meteorological unit, an experimental plant for the exploitation of solar energy and another to desalt brackish groundwater.

A special section to be opened later will deal with research into Negev minerals. At the Sodom works, at the southern end of the Dead Sea, operations are under way to expand the potash and bromine production.

Beersheba—where the ancient Hebrews rested during their wanderings, where Abraham led his herds to pasture and Isaac built an altar in praise of God—is making great strides. The town has almost 40,000 inhabitants, most of them recent immigrants. It is being replanned for a population of 150,000.
