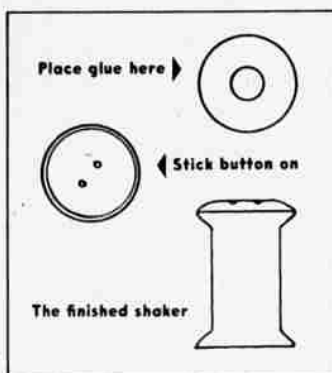

Ask Mother for two spools, then find two buttons the same size as the ends of the spools. Wash and dry them thoroughly. Spread glue on one end of each spool and place a button, flat side down, on the spool, being careful not to get any glue in the holes of the buttons. Press down and let dry. Now fill the center of the spools with salt and pepper and seal the uncovered ends with cellophane tape. Shadows on Parade

Remember that old stunt of making shadow pictures on a sheet? It will come in handy when you are planning a party and trying to think of something that will be real fun. Hang a sheet across a line stretched from one side of the room to the other. Place a bright light in back of the sheet in such a position that anyone crossing in front will be reflected in shadow on the other side. Be sure your group of players know one another and then have them parade one at a time behind the sheet. They can affect any kind of funny walk they want, providing they keep their heads in profile for part of the time. The crowd must guess who each one is and write their names on a slip of paper numbered in order of appearance. It is surprising how hard it is to recognize your friends' shadows. After the last one has paraded and the light has been turned off, the "shadows" walk in front of the sheet so the audience may check their scores.
