Seniors interested in college were presented with an introduction to various independent colleges when seven Northwest colleges presented their program October 18 in the Klamath Union High School Library.

A senior assembly, three half hour conferences where seniors visited representatives of the colleges of their choice and a 15-minute cleanup session were conducted between 9 and 11 a.m. for any interested seniors.

The colleges and their representatives were Lewis and Clark, Dr. Vergil S. Foggall, Linfield, Mr. Ward Danley, Pacific University, Mrs. Charles Trombley, Reed, Dr. Kimbark McMill, University of Portland, Father John Hooyboer, Willamette, Mr. Charles Paeth and Sacred Heart School of Nursing, Miss Mary Ikums.

Dr. Foggall, who was moderator for the group, stated that approximately six out of 300 high school seniors will go on to college, out of these two-thirds will enter the sophomore year. Of the students starting the junior year, very few drop out. On the average one out of 10 students beginning college will graduate.

For instance, Mrs. Helen Hoffman's Latin division has been exceedingly busy preparing scripts for the television series called "Come-In School." The first telecast, which was claimed an excellent one by many authorities, was presented over KOTI Monday, October 21. It was concerned with building a background of the interesting history, geography, and statistical data of our own Klamath County. Research for the project was done by the students themselves. They are also reading original German folk stories. This will be the fourth year German has been taught at Klamath Union High School.

This is Mr. Kuchler's first year at KUHS. He formerly taught at Condon High School in Condon, Oregon. He has his B.A. degree and will soon begin working on his masters degree.

The French and Spanish departments taught by Mr. Raymond Labos, who has been here for four years, are busy with their assignments and class work. Spanish is taught every year and French is staggered. If an unintelligible gibbering is heard while passing Room 201 fifth period, you will know that the French class is in session; Spanish will be the uppermost topic in the atmosphere the rest of the day.
