

Coaching Changes In Sight In NFL After Season Closes

NEW YORK (UP)—Look for more upheavals in the coaching ranks in pro football after the close of this season, than we've had in quite a few years.

There'll be denials from every corner but there'll be a switch in the field boss at Los Angeles, where Sid Gillman now holds sway. At Green Bay, Lisle Blackburn, a native of high school and college coaching in the Badger State, is due to be let go. Hugh Devore is serving his last season with the Philadelphia Eagles.

There's anything but satisfaction in the ranks of the Chicago Bears and the Detroit Lions. Rumblings are continuous in Chicago about the fate of Paddy Driscoll. Detroit, named a co-recipient in the Western Conference has taken a pounding, and their 3-4 record is anything but impressive. And Webb Ewbank of the Colts is also in trouble.

Right now the San Francisco 49ers, behind the sensational play of Y. A. Tittle, are leading the league in points and have the best scoring punch in the NFL. In the east, the leading Browns are easily the defensive leaders. They've only had 65 points scored against them in six games, 31 less than the Giants who are in second place defensively.

It's going to be mighty hard to

stop either the 49ers or the Browns.

They're selecting the competing teams for the big bowl games in the press. Right now Oklahoma, the Texas Aggies and Oregon are the choices to represent their conferences in the Orange, Cotton and Rose bowls.

The Big Ten's representative in the Rose can be either Ohio State or Michigan State. Ohio State, unbeaten in conference play, has the best chance but still has to get by Purdue, Iowa and Michigan. Conference wise the Spartans face only Minnesota, and Duffy Daugherty's boys have only been beaten once. A tie and Georgia Tech are the bowl choices in the South with Mississippi also being in the picture. Auburn, the logical choice can't play. They're on probation.

Navy and Army, whoever wins their traditional affair, will also be bowlward bound.

Only three of the top 10 teams are still in the unbeaten charmed circle. Texas Aggies, Oklahoma and Auburn. Iowa was tied by Michigan and the Irish were sunk by Navy. Oklahoma is a cinch to stay alive, and Auburn, the best defensive college team, should also get by. The Aggies meet Texas in their final game on Nov. 28. Could lose that one.

ROME (UP)—Athletes such as Joe DiMaggio and Yogi Berra, an Italian said vehemently today, are better known abroad and actually are finer goodwill ambassadors than the big wheels in the State Department.

You hear this same approach to the subject in baseball-happy Japan. And certainly, here in the spaghetti and vino capital of the world, you'd have to give an edge to such fine local handles as DiMaggio and Berra.

Yet, when you inspect the scenic Tiber Valley where the Olympic Games are to be held in 1960, you can't be blamed for scanning such statements with a slightly suspicious eye.

This is not designed to provoke a debate as to whether the international games do anything to foster international good will. Nor is it meant to knock the slightly soggy slogan about the friendships formed on the field of friendly strife.

But there must be a moral of sorts somewhere in Rome's Olympic setting.

Rising tall and green beyond the playing fields is a mountain which forms a breath-taking backdrop. It slopes upward with a soft gentleness, undulating and reaching toward the sky, and atop its summit stands a commanding gold statue of Christ. It is a setting which, at first glance, gives the impression of a deep serenity.

Army's Versatile Anderson Being Touted Another Davis

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Football fans in this Quaker City are still talking about an Army halfback named Bob Anderson. They and countless others will be seeing a lot of him in the nationally televised Army-Navy game on Nov. 30. Anderson is the West Point second year halfback who, on Army's second offensive play, dashed 81 yards through Notre Dame's entire team for the longest scrimmage run in the 44-year history of the Cadet-Irish rivalry.

It is a known fact that at both the U.S. Military and Naval Academies the coaches normally put the soft pedal on any exploits turned in by servicemen just out of the plebe class. However, Anderson is one exception. Andy looked so great here that Army believes in giving him his due.

West Point coaches see Anderson as potentially one of the greatest athletes to grace the plains. He is being compared with three-time All-America Glenn Davis of a dozen years ago.

"Anderson has been our big man so far this season," says Earl (Red) Blaik who is coaching the future generals for the 17th season.

"He is the best sophomore back I have seen since the days of Glenn Davis."

Davis scored 20 touchdowns in nine games as a sophomore in 1944. Anderson scored six touchdowns in Army's first four games, gaining 410 yards in 60 attempts.

"Anderson also looks like a fine varsity pitching prospect for next spring," says Orvis Sigler who coached the plebe baseballers last spring. Like Davis, Anderson also is a basketball player and a trackman.

Anderson never has been out for the track team but like Davis it wouldn't be surprising to see him as a sprinter next year. He was a 10-second 100-yard dash man at Cocoa, Florida, High School where he also shot-putted and tossed the discus 145 feet. He won 15 varsity letters, four in football, four in basketball (he captained both teams), four in baseball and three in track.

Besides being a pitcher, he also plays first base or the outfield. In fact, if Casey Stengel had him

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Oregon State's bruising 39-25 victory over Washington State last weekend was a costly one that may send the Beavers shorthanded against California Saturday, according to Coach Tommy Prothro. Fullback John Horrillo suffered a knee injury and is out "indefinitely," and halfback Earnel Durden is on the doubtful list with a knee injury. Durden, Joe Francis and Nub Beamer gained 289 yards and accounted for five of six OSC touchdowns against the Cougars.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—The University of Oregon Ducks may have only one center available for action against Washington Saturday in a game that could assure the Ducks at least a tie for the Pacific Coast Conference title.

Coach Len Casanova said Dave Fish received a hand injury in the Stanford game and may miss the battle with the Huskies. Fish replaced co-captain Norm Chapman two weeks ago when Chapman broke an ankle.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UP)—Coach Jim Sutherland planned a full-scale practice for his Washington State Cougars today in preparation for Saturday's game with UCLA at Spokane.

Sutherland, who lets his team rest Monday, said he plans to stress defense against the Bruins single wing attack.

SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—The University of Washington Huskies spent two full hours going over fundamentals Monday, because Coach Jim Owens said they "botched up every possible way" in losing to Southern California last weekend.

Owens said he hoped to have Don Armstrong, a starting guard who has been out of action two weeks, ready to go against the University of Oregon Ducks Saturday.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—The University of Idaho Vandals, heartened by their weekend 31-13 victory over Montana State, held a rugged workout Monday in preparation for Saturday's game against Utah State at Logan.

Coach Skip Stahley said he was encouraged by news that star end Larry Aldrich may be ready to suit up against Utah State. He suffered a shoulder separation a week ago.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—Coach Pete Elliott has made a slight change in the starting lineup of the University of California Bears. He's moved the entire second string up.

Elliott said the Gabe Arrillaga-quarterbacked second unit looked so much better against UCLA last week that he planned to start them against Oregon State Saturday.

WVU HOSTS MEET MORGANTOWN, W. Va. (UP)—The West Virginia University's undefeated track team will host the Southern Conference cross country meet Nov. 18. William and Mary is the defending champion. West Virginia, which was fifth last year, last won the conference meet in 1953.

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L.A. Mayor Hurls Blast At San Diego

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Mayor Norris Poulson claims the millionaire brother of the owner of the San Diego Padres baseball team is a leader in a movement to block the Dodgers from moving to Los Angeles from Brooklyn.

Poulson Monday described oilman J.A. Smith as one of the "big money backers" of a referendum petition to put the city's deal with the Dodgers to a public vote.

Poulson said J.A. Smith is the brother of C. Arnold Smith, owner of the San Diego club in the Pacific Coast League.

The Padres denied they are conspiring to block the Dodger transfer. "We are not involved with J.A. Smith," a Padre spokesman said.

Jack Mulvaney, president of the San Diego club, said:

"It isn't logical that we would attempt to block the Dodgers' attempts to build a new stadium in Chavez Ravine when at this very moment we are attempting to negotiate a damage payment for ourselves and other members of the Pacific Coast League that would be based on the Dodgers' attendance."

"I'm sure that the Dodgers will be in a more generous mood to deal with the Pacific Coast League if the referendum fails."

The PCL reportedly is seeking a percentage of the Dodgers' and New York Giants gate receipts over a period of three to five years as compensation for damages caused the coast loop by the two National League clubs moving to Los Angeles and San Francisco, respectively.

J.A. Smith was not available for comment.

CARDS SIGN TAYLOR

CHICAGO (UP)—Jim Taylor, a 235-pound linebacker who played with the Pittsburgh Steelers last season, has been signed by the Chicago Cardinals. Taylor, who played collegiate ball at Baylor, was cut loose when Buddy Parker was named coach of the Steelers. His signing brings the Cards roster to 36, one over the limit.
