Law Against Trees Related

It is against the law to plant an elm or a poplar of the cottonwood species in the city of Klamath Falls.

That point was brought out last night in connection with the discussion of what to do with a large elm tree at the corner of Pacific Terrace and Esplanade.

Reference was made to the ordinance by Bob Bonney, city park and recreation director. It was pointed out, however, that the ordinance has not been rigidly enforced.

The council decided to cut down the tree in question to eliminate further difficulty and to improve the vision at that particular corner.

Street lights for the residents in the Sunnyland and Old Orchard Manor areas of the city were discussed, and the California Oregon Power Company will be asked to have its engineers appraise the area to see where they should be located.

A minimum width requirement of 36 feet on all future paving projects was adopted, with the provision that any exception to this requirement would have to have council approval.

AF Crews Vie For Honors

ORLANDO, Fla. (UP)—Bomber crews of the Strategic Air Command early today completed the Air Force's annual precision flying and bombing tournament.

The host bomb wing, the 321st of Pinecastle AFB here, led the standings for the Fairchild trophy, awarded for bombing and navigation excellence.

But the hottest race was for individual bombing honors between two B47 Stratofortress crews commanded by Capt. Clyde W. Armstrong of Grand Rapids, Mich., representing the 321st, and the 384th Wing crew from Little Rock, Ark., commanded by Capt. Roy W. Howard of Salina, Kan.

Both the Armstrong and Howard crews took off for the final mission Monday night with Armstrong's group leading Howard only one point for individual bombing honors.

The keenly fought SAC competition involved two crews each from 43 U.S. Air Force bomb wings, most of them B47 outfits and two from the British Royal Air Force.

Going into the final round, the 321st led overall ratings with 1,719 points, with the 100th Bomb Wing, Pease AFB, N.H., second with 1,633.

The 321st also led the bombing competition with 1,285 points, a two-point lead over the 384th Wing from Little Rock, and was second in navigation with 434 points, only 23 points behind the 72nd Wing from Ramey AFB, Puerto Rico.

Scholarship Fund Urged

PORTLAND (U)—Most Oregon educators appearing before a U.S. House subcommittee on higher education here Monday, urged a federal scholarship program to aid students who cannot afford college.

One exception was O. Meredith Wilson, president of the University of Oregon, who spoke as a representative of the State Universities Assn., of which he is president.

Wilson said his organization does not favor federal scholarship aid at this time. He said such a program might divert congressional interest from the need for aid in supporting facilities and facilities, might curtail the private scholarship program, and might shift a number of the most qualified youths to certain special colleges.

But Richard H. Sullivan, president of Reed College, said "federal assistance is logical, appropriate and necessary."

May Darling, chairman of the education committee of the AFL-CIO Oregon State Labor Council, said labor favors federal aid to scholars who need it.

State Rep. Joe Rogers, chairman of the Oregon House Education Committee, opposed federal scholarships, arguing this would amount to a subsidy and might destroy initiative.
