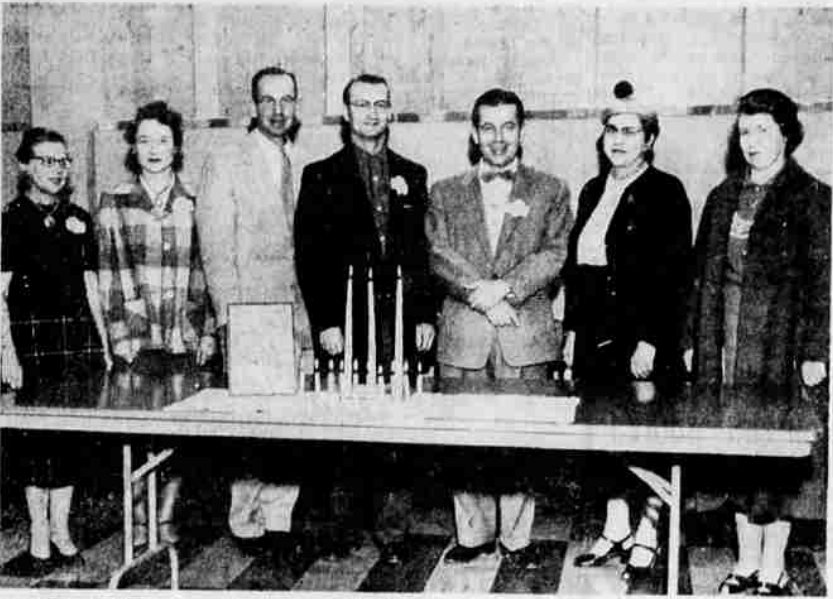

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Experts Speculate On Red Plans For Rocket To Moon

NEW YORK (AP)—Russia seems to have the ability to send a missile crashing into the moon any time she wants.

But many scientists doubt the Russians have the accuracy to hit Thursday's lunar eclipse over the Pacific Ocean—even for the propaganda glory of the Bolshevik revolution's 40th anniversary.

For one thing, the moon is buried totally in the earth's shadow for just half an hour—and that comes just west of the Mariana Islands, south of Japan, and well east of the Philippines.

Couple Observe 75th Anniversary

MIAMI, Okla. (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Green Berry Jenkins celebrate their 75th wedding anniversary today.

Jenkins, a farmer, mail carrier and miner before retirement, is 95. His wife is 93.

Jenkins says he has smoked cigarettes for 80 years and recalls that "someone told me tobacco would shorten my life."

It would be difficult for many persons to observe in this area—almost as difficult as it would be to time the missile shot so it hit within that brief space of time.

There has been speculation that the Soviets would seize on the eclipse to make a big show on their anniversary celebration.

It would appear likely the Russians would keep at least one space trick up their sleeves for Thursday's anniversary, but just what is speculation.

Earlier this week there was a chorus of scientific hunches that Russia could reach the moon.

Dr. Wernher von Braun, a leading U.S. missile expert who helped fashion Germany's pioneer rockets, said the Russians could send a 100-pound package to the moon.

His German former colleague, Willy Ley, now a college professor, said flatly the Russians would choose their anniversary date to do it.

There was some speculation that the Russians might make a bigger splash with their moon shot using nuclear bomb. However, a nuclear warhead is probably heavier than the 100 pounds that Von

Braun was willing to allow the Russians.

Other possibilities are perhaps more likely—that the Russians would pack their rocket head with a magnesium flare or possibly dye—to create their flash on the moon or stain it for the world to see.

The eclipse will actually begin

but will be barely visible over the western United States about 3:30 a.m. It will progress until it climaxes between 6:11 and 6:41 a.m. near the Marianas in the Pacific.

Then the moon will move back out of the earth's shadow, clearing about 9:23 a.m. as it moves toward the Atlantic between Africa and Europe.

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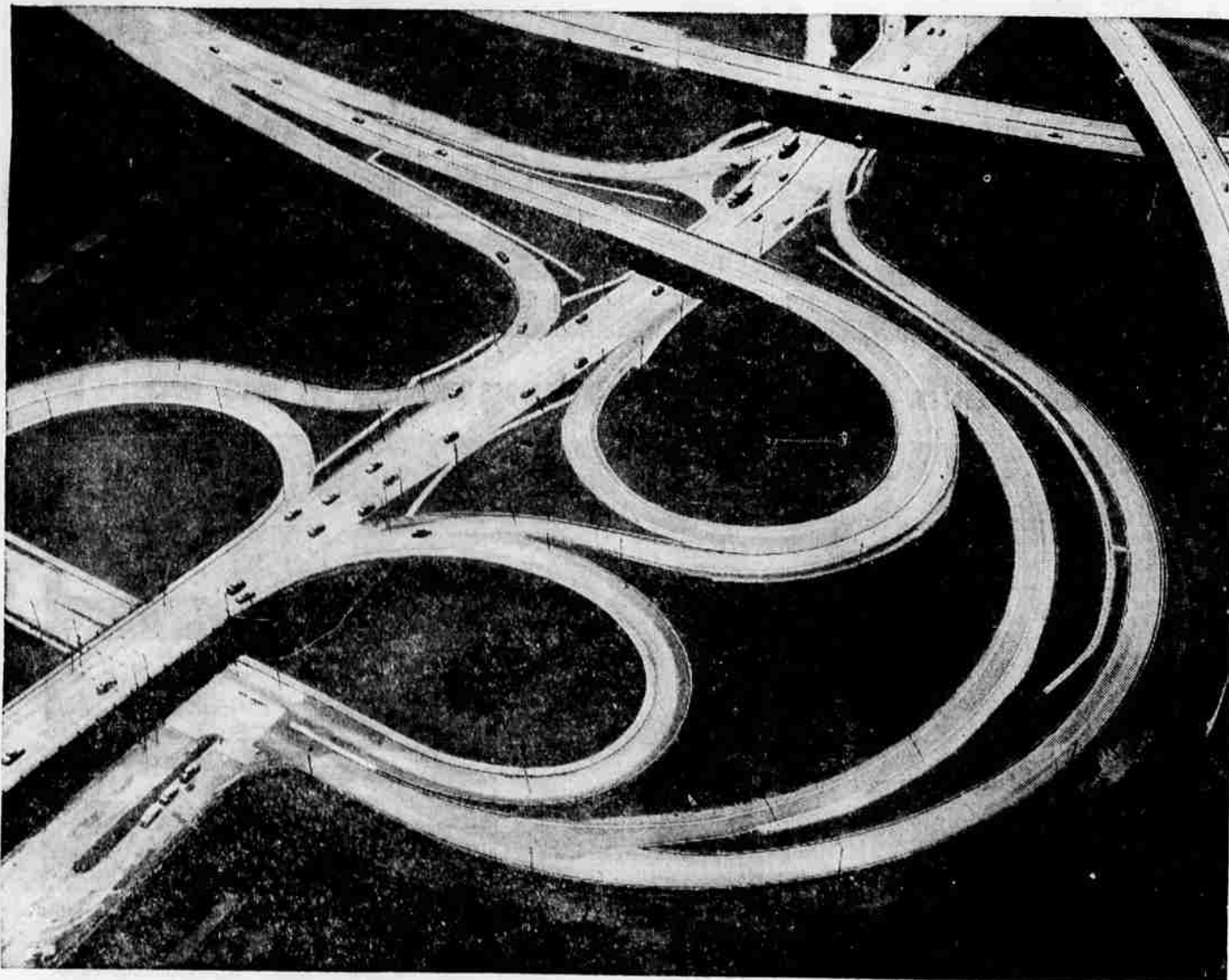
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The New Jersey Turnpike, most heavily traveled toll super-highway in the nation. Photo courtesy Cities Service Company.
