The Kiwanis Park project is definitely designed as a community undertaking. The club has outlined the projects and from then on they were completed or continued through the enthusiastic support of local dealers in heavy equipment, lumber firms, manufacturing companies, seed farmers, clubs, individual citizens, the city of Klamath Falls and the Oregon State Highway Department. Without their help, these goals could not be achieved in five-times-five years.

Kiwanians and their supporters are almost 100 per cent employed. John R. Holzgang, district accountant for Copco, has been club secretary for eight years. Jim Maguire, property manager of Maguire real estate holdings, works at Drew's Manstore, and is a member of the Kiwanis Ways and Means Committee.

Gus Vlahos owns and operates the Unique Grocery, and is a director of the ways and means committee; Greer Drew, Klamath Falls Kiwanis president, is a partner in Drew's Manstore and The Gun Store; and Bert Thomas, club treasurer, has been an active member for 30 years. He is U.S. commissioner and a local attorney.

The group is checking the program for the forthcoming Kiwanis-produced stage production "Lo and Behold!" a three-act comedy slated for November 14-15-16 at Mills Auditorium. The play, written by John Patrick, was first presented by the Theater Guild in 1951.

The local performance will feature town-talent as did last year's successful fund-raising stage show, which realized over \$2,000 for the park fund. Tickets are now on sale and may be purchased from any member of Kiwanis Club for the modest sum of ninety cents. Curtain time each night is 8 o'clock.
