Voting Heavy In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW — A total of 820 votes was cast in Tuesday's city election here, one of the largest turnouts in many years.

Mayor Howard Goodnough was reelected to his second term, defeating Ernest Freeman. The vote was 478 to 334.

Jack Pendleton, incumbent treasurer, was unopposed on the ballot and polled 733 votes.

The recorder's seat was vacant and three candidates had filed. Voting showed Les Pardue, 376; Ed Calderwood, 295 and Mildred Jarrett, 147.

Two councilmen were elected from a slate of five. Ernest Gerber polled 404 votes; Lane Thornton, 365; Ross Colahan, 349; Vic Hauer (incumbent), 327 and Cliff Partin, 128.

Stolen Auto Found In LA

DUNSMUIR — A red and white 1955 station wagon, stolen from Dr. E. V. Anderson's residence last week, has been recovered in Los Angeles. Dunsmuir police were notified this week.

KF Residents Form Chapter

Parents of children who are victims of cystic fibrosis, one of the least understood diseases of childhood, have formed the Klamath Falls Chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation to further study and understanding of the often fatal ailment, and to plan for a campaign to raise funds to further assist research.

The local chapter is the only one in the state of Oregon.

Elected to offices were Mrs. James Hopkins, president; Mrs. Frank Fleet, vice president; Mrs. D. H. Dickinson, secretary and Mrs. Donald Derminer, publicity chairman. Other members of the group are Mrs. Frank Boggs and husbands of all the women members.

Six children in these families have been stricken by cystic fibrosis, the disease that doctors knew little about until recently, although it heads the list in cause of death from disease among American children.

First recognition of the disease was in 1938 and not until December of 1955 was a nationwide effort made to light it, with the establishment of the national foundation.

Children suffering from cystic fibrosis in the past, have usually been doomed to die before reaching their teens. Now with recognition of early symptoms and expensive medical care, hope is given to parents that their ailing children may live a nearly normal life.

The local chapter plans a research fund drive in cooperation with the federal campaign, from January 25 to February 1. Mothers will have food sales and other projects and all money will go into research funds.
