

## France's Halimi New World Bantam King

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A rugged little French-Algerian named Alphonse Halimi last night out-slugged and outboxed Raul Macias of Mexico for the undisputed world bantamweight championship.

A crowd of 20,000—at least 8,000 of them countrymen of the Mexican fighter—were on hand when the two little scrappers squared off under the dazzling ring candelabra at Wrigley Field.

The night was coolish, but the fighters set a torrid pace over the 15-round bout.

As expected, Halimi, rock-hard one-time Algerian street fighter, tried to turn the nationally televised match into a slugfest.

Macias, renowned for his boxing deftness, played the Frenchman's game. In the early rounds, the little gamecocks battled head-to-head in bruising in-fighting.

"Box him, box him," urged Macias' manager, Pancho Rosales.

"I can't box him," said Macias, bleeding from the nose. "He's on top of me. I can't keep him away."

Nevertheless, Macias fought Halimi on fairly even terms. Both landed some dandy hooks to the body and head. But neither was shaken badly.

"In the sixth I realized I couldn't knock him out, so I knew I'd have to box him," Halimi said later.

Halimi switched from in-fighting to long range jabbing about the 10th round, and proceeded to beat the Mexican at his own game. He held a reach advantage of almost two inches and made the most of it, pulling ahead on all score cards in the last five rounds.

The split decision was greeted with lusty boos by the Mexican's constituents.

Referee Mushy Callahan cast his vote for Macias, 144 to 141, under California's 10-point system. Judges Frankie Van and Dynamite Jackson decided the bout.

## PCL Leader Stays Quiet On Talk Aims

NEW YORK (AP)—Leslie O'Connor, president of the Pacific Coast League, was reluctant to discuss specific aims in fear of "muddying the waters" before today's special meeting with Commissioner Ford Frick to study realignment problems facing baseball's top minor league.

O'Connor, flying in from the West Coast, will tackle the problems arising from the Giants' and Dodgers' shift to San Francisco and Los Angeles in a conference with Frick, George Trautman, president of the National Association (governing body of the minors), and representatives of the two National League clubs.

O'Connor acknowledged that today's meeting was set up to discuss only realignment with no mention of damages to be paid the PCL by the Giants and Dodgers for invasion of its territory. The PCL, however, has voted to consider the questions of realignment and compensation as a single package.

The fact that the amount of compensation is the big stumbling block in the situation was apparent from O'Connor's views on the cities which may be available to replace Los Angeles and San Francisco in the PCL.

"While the cities we have in mind already have baseball," he said, "no two of them by any means are the equal of Los Angeles and San Francisco."

That means the Giants and Dodgers, and perhaps the National League as a whole, will have to fatten the kitty to make up the difference in revenue the PCL can expect to suffer.

Thus far, O'Connor has found the Giants' and Dodgers' offer "too humiliating to discuss."

## Irish Horses Nab Lead In NY Show

NEW YORK (AP)—The Irish army equestrian team, which had promised to do well in American horse show international jumping once its horses were accustomed to the short courses, was making good on the promise today, leading the seven nations in the national show.

The Irish won Wednesday night's event, the first part of the three-day low score competition, to give them their second victory in the three events jumped so far. Two more events were scheduled for today, one in the afternoon session and the other tonight.

In overall team scoring, Ireland led with 25 points, the United States had 20, Britain 19, Mexico 8, Argentina 2, and Chile and Canada both were scoreless.

## Logart In Line For Title Shot Early AP Recommendations For All-Americans Listed

NEW YORK (UP)—Isaac Logart of Cuba, top-ranked contender, has agreed to fight some worthy rival for the vacant world welterweight title at Denver, Colo., in January if the Denver promoters can get title recognition from the National Boxing Association.

"Logart has agreed to the fight if the NBA will recognize the winner as world champion," the Cuban's manager, Eddie Mafuz, said today. "The opponent and the date have not been picked yet, but we hope the opponent will be Virgil Atkins of St. Louis."

The welter title was left vacant on Sept. 23 when champion Carmen Basilio won the middleweight crown from Sugar Ray Robinson. No champion can wear two crowns simultaneously.

At Denver, Eddie Bohn of the Colorado State Boxing Commission said his organization and the NBA had agreed to championship status for a Logart bout in January.

## Hunting Report

Elk hunting is fair and waterfowl hunting is improving in Oregon, the state Game Commission said Thursday in its weekly report.

Storms would improve hunting, the report said, helping to drive elk into the open and giving waterfowl hunters more shots.

The report by area:

**Northwest**  
Fog and low water have hampered hunters at the Sauve's Island area. Upwards of 100,000 birds are there, but hunting will not improve until weather conditions change.

**Southwest**  
Elk hunting fair in Coos and Douglas counties. Waterfowl hunting poor. Change in weather conditions will improve both.

**Central**  
Birds increasing and hunting fair at Upper Klamath Lake. Lower Klamath Lake is good when the weather is right for the birds to fly. Thousands of birds are feeding at night on the Klamath management area public shooting grounds. Hunting generally is only fair. Goose hunting is poor.

**Northeast**  
Snow needed to improve elk hunting. In meanwhile the best Grant County areas are Desolation Meadows, Granite Creek, Crane Creek, Trout Meadows and Putney Mountain. The Sled Springs area in Wallawa County is excellent, and the Chemsimus area good. Waterfowl hunting is very good in Baker County. Large flights of Canadian honkers are along the Snake River. Unmilled County also is good for ducks and geese, and Wallawa County good for ducks. Waterfowl hunting has been slow in Grant County, fair in Morrow County.

**Southwest**  
Hunting is poor to fair at Summer Lake, where there are 200,000 white geese and 10,000 ducks. Ducks and geese have left the Warner Valley, where the water is beginning to freeze. Still quite a few birds in the Malheur shooting area, but they are not moving. Hunting is fair there, better in afternoon than in the morning. Boat hunting is best.

**Celtics Make It Seven In A Row**

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NEW YORK (UP)—Eight players from the Midwest, South and Far West head a list of backfield stars in a preliminary report Thursday from 12 Associated Press regional boards upon whose recommendation the 1957 All-America football team will be selected.

The All-America will be announced Dec. 5, and with many teams still having three or more games remaining, there could be major changes. There were 34 names in the list from all sections of the country.

As of now, John Crow of Texas A. & M., currently the nation's No. 1 team, Clendon Thomas of Oklahoma, Jimmy Jones of the University of Washington, Ray Brown of Mississippi, Donald Clark of Ohio State, Bobby Gordon of Tennessee, Jim Pace of Michigan, and Bob Stranksy of Colorado top the list.

High up are Don Allard of Boston College, Tom Forrestal of Navy, James Ninowski of Michigan State, Frank Kremblas of Ohio State, Jimmy Taylor of Louisiana State, Roddy Osborne of Texas A. & M., Gerald Nesbitt of Arkansas, Mike Sommer of

George Washington, Dick Christy of North Carolina State, Wray Carlton of Duke, Bob Mulgado of Arizona State (Tempe), Lee Grosscup of Utah and Don Ellingsen of Washington State, who plays safety on defense and end on offense.

Others recommended by the regional boards, composed of sports writers and sportscasters representing every major conference and all sections of the country, included Bob Newman, Washington State; Jim Shanley, Oregon State; and Joe Francis, Oregon State.

Several of the candidates were among leaders in the NCAA Service Bureau offense departments this week, although names of many stars do not appear in the individual ratings because of their tough schedules.

Newman is the total offense leader with 1,001 yards in 180 plays, while Stranksy is tops in rushing with 764 yards in 128 carries.

In forward passing, Newman is second with 912 yards, having completed 69 of 125 attempts. Grosscup is fifth with 762 yards on 59 completions out of 82 attempts. His .720 per cent of completions tops the nation.

They're getting signatures on petitions calling for a vote of the people on the plan to turn 300 acres of city-owned land over to the Dodgers for a ball park. If they get enough, it could prove very embarrassing to Dodger President Walter O'Malley and the Los Angeles city officials who invited him here.

The move for a referendum started when the city council approved by a 10-4 vote an ordinance transferring the Chavez Ravine property to the Dodgers. Councilman John Holland, leader of the four-man opposition, vowed that the fight wasn't over, and so far, at least, he's making good on that promise.

A citizens committee called Save Chavez Ravine was formed to push the referendum. Holland is its guiding light, visiting the office every day and directing the strategy, which is simply to get 51,767 valid signatures on the petitions.

Committee officials are reluctant to say how many signatures they have acquired in the three weeks they've been at it, but talk enthusiastically of the "hundreds" of volunteers now gathering names and express satisfaction they will have the required number next Thursday's deadline.

The city clerk's office, which will have the job of counting the signatures and checking their validity, estimates that at least 75,000 signatures will be needed to assure 51,767 good ones.

If there are enough names, the ordinance approving the Dodger deal is automatically held up until settled by a city-wide vote.

And if the matter is going to be put to a vote, the chances are it won't be until next June, since no municipal elections are scheduled before then and the cost of a special election would be high.

So there is a distinct possibility O'Malley will have to mark time until the middle of next summer before he can even start on his dream park. Which means his Dodgers may have to play two seasons in tiny Wrigley Field, which seats 22,000 fans and can't measure up as a major league park in any category.

The other National League owners will have to approve the use of Wrigley Field—and the prospect of traipsing across the country for two years to play before 22,000 people might not win their support.

There is talk the 100,000-seat Coliseum may be adapted to baseball, but it would be a makeshift operation at best.

## Newman Top PCC Passer; Shea Rusher

A transplanted Oregonian and three players from Oregon schools head the rushing statistics list in the Pacific Coast Conference.

Chuck Shea, former Beaverton High player now at fullback for Stanford, is the rushing leader with 564 yards gained in 117 carries, an average of five yards.

Right behind him come Jim Shanley of Oregon, Nub Beamer and Joe Francis of Oregon State. Earnel Durden of OSC is seventh and Jack Morris of Oregon.

Shanley has 539 yards in 126 carries, an average of 4.3. Beamer has 520 yards in 108 carries, an average of 4.8. Francis has 412 yards in 77 carries, an average of 5.4. Durden has 367 yards in 61 carries, an average of 6.0. Morris has 336 yards in 69 carries, an average of 4.9.

In passing Jack Crabtree of Oregon ranks fourth in the conference, Bob Newman of WSC heads the list with 912 yards on 69 completions in 125 tries. Behind him come Jack Douglas of Stanford and Howard Willis of Idaho.

Crabtree has 315 yards on 31 completions in 58 attempts. Francis of OSC is seventh in passing with 321 yards on 22 completions in 42 tries.

In total offense Newman of WSC leads with 1,001 yards. Francis of OSC is fourth with 733 yards. Beamer is fifth with 572 yards. Shea is sixth at 564. Shanley seventh at 539. Durden 13th at 393. Charley Tourville of Oregon 15th at 343 yards and Morris 16th at 336.

Beamer and Shanley are tied for the scoring lead at 42 points each. Francis has 36 points, Morris 32 and Crabtree 26.

Don Ellingsen of WSC leads the pass receivers with 31 catches for 410 yards. Next is Ron Stover of Oregon with 19 catches for 196 yards. Bob Detraunt of OSC is 10th with 10 catches for 131 yards.

Ted Seale of OSC ranks fourth in punting, averaging 37.1 yards on 17 kicks. Morris is sixth, averaging 36.2 on 22 kicks.

Sterling Hammack of OSC is the return leader. He has run back 18 punts for 233 yards, an average of 12.9. Shanley is third with 92 yards returned on seven kicks, an average of 13.1. Shanley is second in kickoff returns, 254 yards on eight kicks, an average of 31.8. Jim Jones of Washington is the leader on 280 yards on nine kicks, an average of 31.1.

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
