

Ashland Snaps KU Gridiron Domination, 13-12

Ashland Snares First Win Over KUHS In 21 Seasons

The Ashland Grizzlies broke the Klamath Falls 20-year gridiron domination Friday night on Modoc Field by nipping the Pelicans, 13-12 in a game which the Pels dominated every department but the score.

It looked as though the Pels would cop their first Southern Oregon Conference win this season as they trotted off the field sporting a 15-7 lead at halftime, but the Grizzlies' quarterback Don Simpson broke the ice in the fourth quarter on a 28-yard touchdown aerial to give the Ashlanders their first victory over Klamath Falls in 21 years.

The KUHS defense did not let the Grizzlies penetrate into Pel territory, with the exception of Simpson's first scoring pass which went 70 yards, until the opening minutes of the fourth quarter when Ashland took possession of the ball when Richard Humphrey's quick kick was downed on the Klamath 40-yard line.

Tom Ankeny, who shifted from quarterback to halfback for the game, turned in the sparkling offensive performance of the evening as he knifed through the Ashland defense to chalk up the individual rushing honors for the Pels with 60 yards on 12 carries, and grabbed Frank Ballard's pass with one hand to set up the first KU touchdown.

The first half was the big one for the Pels defensive line as they completely bottled up the Ashland ground attack holding them to a net eight yards on the ground, while the KU pass defense was caught napping twice, the Grizzlies completing only two passes, but both going for touchdowns.

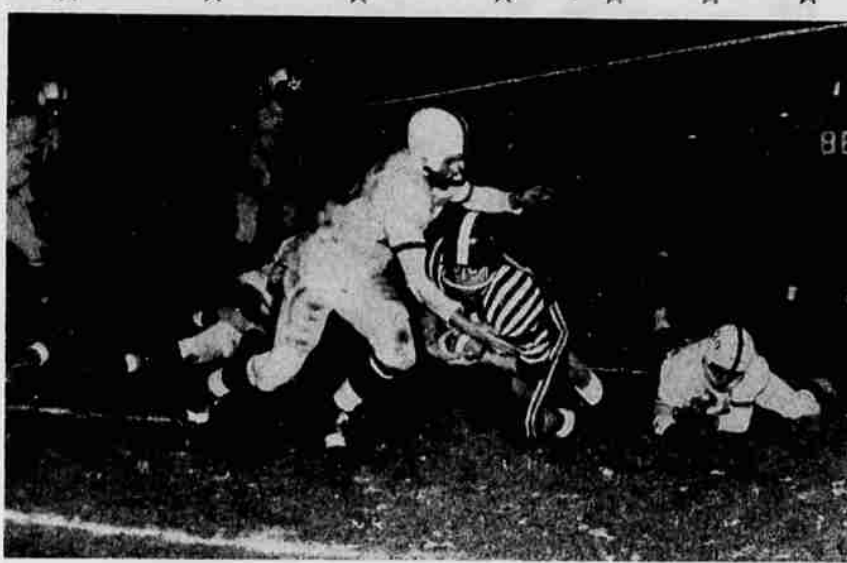
Coach Andy Knudsen said he was very well satisfied with the team's performance and in the locker room commended the seniors and told the returning grid-ders, "next year will be better."

Playing before a sparse 1,500 fans the Pelicans tried desperately to pull the game out of the fire in the final quarter as they took to the air moving from their own 30-yard line to the Ashland 34-yard line. With two seconds remaining, Ballard fired a long pass to Rich Humphrey on the Grizzly three, but three Ashland defenders went high into the air to bat the ball to the ground and end the game.

Ashland jumped off to a fast 7-0 lead in the first quarter after holding the Pels on downs on the Ashland 25-yard line, after the Pels had taken the kickoff and moved downfield, sparked by a 33-yard pass play from Ballard to end Jan Cox.

Halfback Jerry Stubblefield moved the ball up to the 36-yard line for a first down, but the Pelican defensive line dug in and held him for no gain and a minus six on his next two attempts.

With third down and still ten

UCLA Bruins Come From Behind To Top Washington State 19-13

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 10 (AP) — End Dick Wallen ruined the Washington State Cougars Saturday as an alert defender and a great pass catcher to bring UCLA from behind for a 19-13 Pacific Coast Conference football victory in 36-degree weather.

Wallen intercepted two Cougar passes to set up touchdowns and then pounced on a Don Ellingsen fumble in the fourth quarter that started the Bruins on a victory.

Ray Smith capped a 40-yard drive with a plunge from the one with 40 seconds left in the game to give the favored Bruins their sixth victory of the season.

Quarterback Bobby Newman, the nation's total offense leader, had a rough afternoon and seemed to find Wallen in the way at key moments.

He intercepted Newman's first pitch of the afternoon on the Cougar 26 and returned it to the 10. Don Long promptly scored from

the Bruins, a fumbling ball club most of the afternoon, were tied in the second period as Newman took the Cougars 56 yards for a touchdown. Bunny Aldrich missed the conversion.

But Aldrich, the 28-year-old father of three children, led the Cougars 77 yards to send WSC ahead. Dick Windham, a third string fullback who was outstanding for WSC, picked up 24 yards in the march. Aldrich passed 36 yards to end Jack Fanning. And then Fanning made a great go-ahead catch of a 6-yard Aldrich pitch to give the Cougars a 13-6 halftime lead.

The Bruins' Smith fumbled away a UCLA threat to tie in the third quarter, dropping the ball on the WSC four. The Cougars kicked out and got possession again when John Davis fumbled the punt.

It was that kind of ball game but it was a thriller for a near-capacity crowd of 27,000.

OTI Cagers Working Out Daily, First Game With Olympic Five

The Oregon Tech Owls, defending Oregon Collegiate Conference champions, are drilling nightly under coach Wally Palmberg's direction. The Owls started their workouts last Friday night and will continue until their opening game against Olympic Junior College here December 6.

Besides their regular conference schedule the Owls will meet several non-conference opponents. One of their big games will be against the Presidio of California here January 6. The Army team last year was runner-up in the all service tournament. And is always loaded with high powered hoop talent. Last year's team included such stars as Tom Gola, and Shiguo Green both All-Americans.

Palmberg has four returning lettermen who will form the nucleus of this year's squad. The returning players are three year lettermen John McCutcheon, all-conference center last year, Jerry Pastern, all-conference guard, Truman Williams, all-conference second team forward and John Rhine, all-conference honorable mention guard.

Palmberg expressed confidence that this year's club would be a good one and hopes to win the conference crown again this year. "It all depends on how our new boys work out, if they give us added power we will have a strong club," he said.

He singled out Virgil Merrill, freshman from Drain High School, and Dick Weiser, freshman from

Madras, as looking very impressive in early drills. Weiser is 6 feet 5 inches tall and weighs 220 pounds. And Palmberg is

counting on him to add backboard strength to the Owl attack. Another big boy is Charles Bogla who stands 6 feet 9 inches and is returning to school after a two-year absence.

The Owls use a multiple defense which is a combination of man to man and the zone. Last year Oregon Tech led the league in defense and Palmberg is stressing this point to the club in workouts. "This kind of defense takes a lot of practice, but if the boys get it working right I think they will be a tough ball club. The multiple defense is highly adaptable to meet almost any kind of offense and we try to use it to throw our defense at the other team's power. We may start with a zone and then man to man, or a combination of the two if they have some particularly strong offensive threats," Palmberg continued.

Besides the four returning lettermen and Weiser and Merrill, the Owl coach has several new boys. They are Virgil Rick, Malin; Terry Timmons, Gold Beach; Darrell Reef, Astoria; Paul Stine, Madras; Bob Powell, Seaposs; Dell Francis, Baker; and Rod Alessio, Walla Walla.

Palmberg said that the Owls have scheduled Westminster College of Salt Lake City here for two games January 17 and 18 to fill in an open date. The Owls will open their conference play in Portland January 3 against Portland State College.

It's another step in a career which finds Frick passing out more muzzles than an Army ordnance sergeant.

Last May 10, when there was a great deal of discussion as to whether Brooklyn and New York would move west, Frick ordered the clubs not to talk about possible shifts any more on the grounds that it was "detrimental to baseball." He didn't elaborate on whether the most feared detriment was the one to the box office.

Then, when the National League prepared to meet at Chicago on May 27, it was explained that the session was "a very routine mid-season meeting."

Only a United Press exclusive revealed, just before the meeting, that the New York clubs were going to be given permission to move West. Which they were, despite protestations right up to the time of the meeting that this matter wasn't even on the agenda.

Cal Bears Upended By Bevos

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 10 (AP) — Diminutive Larry Sanchez, taking over for flu-stricken star Joe Francis, threw two touchdowns passes Saturday in leading Oregon State to a 21-19 victory over California.

A crowd of 50,000 saw the Beavers build a 21-0 margin in the first 20 minutes and hang on for the victory in the Pacific Coast Conference football game.

Sanchez, a 158-pound sophomore threw a 16-yard scoring pass to end Bob Degrant for the first tally. He hooked up with the wingback Earnel Durden on another covering 46.

Minutes before that long pass, Durden had scored his team's second touchdown with a 6-yard run on a reverse. Quarterback Ted Searle, the Beaver captain, place kicked the three conversions.

The first half lead proved just enough for Oregon State to rack up its sixth victory in eight outings as the Bears staged their determined comeback trying to avoid a seventh setback against a single victory.

California, completely outplayed in the first two periods, finally scored in the third on a 33-yard pass from quarterback Joe Kapp to end Mike White. Darrell Roberts' conversion attempt was partially blocked by guard Jim Brackens.

The Bears drove 48 yards in six fourth period plays for their second touchdown with Kapp sneaking over from the one and Roberts converting.

Passes of 32 yards from Gabe Aprillaga to Tom Roger and 12 from Kapp to White highlighted that drive. With only 43 seconds remaining, Kapp passed 22 yards to halfback Jack Hart for the final score. Kapp's conversion attempt failed.

Iowa Batters Minnesota

IOWA CITY, Iowa, Nov. 10 (AP) — Aroused, massive Iowa, tossing in brilliant versatility to go with its power, fired a record-breaking scoring salvo at Minnesota Saturday for a 44-20 Big Ten football victory.

Undeclared Iowa, nursing a slow burn all week over criticism that it "quit" in settling for a 21-21 tie with Michigan, burst into full flame against the Gophers with 23 points in the second quarter for a 30-7 lead.

Iowa's pace slowed in the late stages against the never-give-up Gophers, who wanted to avenge a 7-0 loss of last year that probably cost a Rose Bowl trip, but the game was sacked away in the first half.

Minnesota, battling all the way, went 62 yards for a touchdown after the opening second half kickoff. Bobby Cox smashing over from the one, Bob Blakely, who led the Gophers with 98 yards, scored the first Minnesota touchdown on a punch from the 3 in the opening period and also made the last with another blast from the 3 in the final quarter.

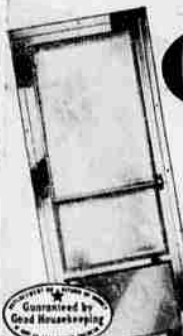
