

Cavemen, Tornado Tie For SOC Crown

The line-ups for the Oregon class A-1 and A-2 high school football playoffs are nearly set after a series of decisive games Friday night.

South Salem, Jefferson of Portland, Beaverton, Springfield and McMinnville clinched A-1 playoff berths, joining Milton-Freewater, which had done so the weekend before.

Dallas, Bandon, Seaside and probably Serra Catholic of Salem won their way into the A-2 quarter-finals. Glendale, Willamina, and Elmira previously had secured district titles. A game between Vale and Madras Saturday was to determine the eighth entry.

Springfield, No. 6 in the Associated Press poll, came up with the only surprise of the night by defeating South Eugene, the state's top-ranked team, 27-13.

That gave Springfield the Midwestern League (district 5) title and the right to be host to McMinnville in a playoff opener.

Jefferson, No. 5, overwhelmed Grant, 51-14, thereby just about clinching the Portland League (district 1) championship. It is favored to win its remaining league game next weekend and go into the semi-finals, with a bye

in the first playoff round. Grant, No. 7 and expected to win next week, too, would be Portland league runner-up and district 2 champion, but would not be in the playoffs.

South Salem, ranked second in the state, was extended by Albany but won, 27-19, and nailed down the Valley League (district 8) championship. South Salem will play at Milton-Freewater in a playoff opener next Saturday.

Beaverton, No. 4, secured the Metropolitan League (district 3) title with a 12-0 triumph over Gresham.

McMinnville, No. 9, wrapped up the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League (district 4) crown, turning back Tigard, 25-12.

Only one A-1 title is in serious doubt. That is in the Southern Oregon Conference (district 6), where Grants Pass, No. 8, was held to a 20-20 tie by Medford. The teams went into the game with perfect records in district play.

A conference committee was to meet Saturday to decide how the playoff entry is to be determined. If net yardage is to be the factor, Medford will be chosen because it had a 463-374 advantage Friday night. But Grants Pass rolled up 15 first downs to Medford's 10.

The league choice will play at Beaverton in the first championship round.

Milton-Freewater, No. 10 in the poll, was held to a scoreless tie by Pendleton, but already was in the playoffs.

Marshall, No. 3 but eliminated from the district 5 title race two weeks ago, trampled North Bend in their traditional game, 32-13.

In class A-2, Seaside flattened Reynolds of Troutdale, 55-21, to win the right to be host to Bandon, which dropped Siuslaw of Florence, 24-19. Seaside represents district 1; Bandon, district 2.

Dallas nailed down the district 4 title by whaling Sandy, 34-7. It will go for the playoff opener to Willamina of district 3, which capped a perfect regular season with a 60-6 route of Sheridan.

Serra Catholic of Salem defeated Cascade Union of Turner, 25-13, and Stayton blanked Silverton, 19-0. The winners wound up in a tie for the district 8 championship, but a district committee was expected to name Serra Saturday because the Salem team downed Stayton earlier in the season.

The district representative will meet the winner of the Vale-Madras game in a playoff opener. Elmira, which crushed Pleasant Hill, 53-6, will be at home to Glendale in a battle of two teams with perfect records.

Many sparkling individual performances were turned in on the last big night of regular high school football action in Oregon.

Springfield backs ground out four touchdowns behind a big line that gave South Eugene's passing star, Charlie Warren, lots of trouble.

Fullback Duane Cargill plunged 3 and 5 yards to fourth quarter scores after Warren had pulled Eugene to within one point, 14-13, on touchdown passes of 14 and two yards.

Terry Baker, a slick junior quarterback, was the big man for Jefferson after it had spotted Grant a 7-0 lead at the first quarter mark. He ran to two touchdowns and passed to a third. Jefferson scored three times each in the second and third periods and twice in the last quarter.

Steve Beguin's 27-yard touchdown gallop was a highlight of Beaverton's victory over Gresham.

Jeff Durham, a son of Linfield College's athletic director, scampered 44 yards to a touchdown in McMinnville's triumph and Roy Gill scored twice on short plunges. Curt Gwin of Tigard turned in the longest run, returning a punt 79 yards to a touchdown.

Quarterback Jim Smith, probably the state's outstanding prep passer, accounted for all three Grants Pass touchdowns. Two of his scoring heaves went to his favorite target, and Mike Sparlin, and the third to Jack Dean.

Medford scored 14 points in the final quarter to tie. Johnny Jones returned a punt 88 yards to a touchdown early in the period, and Larry Brown plunged two yards into the end zone with two minutes left, making it a deadlock.

Steve Picard, Seaside's sensational halfback, contributed touchdown runs of 41, 80, 36 and 50 yards in the Troutdale game. He now has 26 touchdowns for the season.

Rodney Franklin pulled Bandon from behind in its game with Florence by running 39 yards to a touchdown in the late minutes.

Bob Wall passed to four touchdowns in Dallas' triumph over Sandy.

Bob Noleby scored three touchdowns, one on a 75-yard scamper, and booted six extra points as Willamina tuned up against Sheridan for the playoffs.

Davey Moore Wants Title Shot After Lacing Cotero

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Davey Moore, after whipping another ranking contender for his fifth victory in a row, said Saturday he's ready to sail the Atlantic if necessary for a shot at featherweight champion Hogan (Kid) Bassey.

Moore aimed for the top of the 128-pound division after blasting out a unanimous and onesided decision over Jose Cotero in a nationally televised bout from Capitol Arena Friday night.

Davey, 24-year-old Springfield, Ohio, puncher, devastated Cotero's TV debut. For 10 rounds Moore unloaded left hooks and right crosses on the grim Mexican from Los Angeles. Jose preserved his record of never hitting the deck, but that was the only thing he could say for his first bout east of the Rockies.

Willie Ketchum, Davey's manager, repeated an offer he said he had made previously to Bassey's strategists, guaranteeing the champion \$25,000 for a bout in London or elsewhere.

"Who else would you have fought Bassey?" Ketchum wanted to know.

Before drubbing Cotero, Moore was rated the No. 4 challenger by the National Boxing Assn. and No. 6 by Ring Magazine. To bring Bassey to terms, Ketchum would have to talk faster than Hymie Wallman, whose sharp-punching like Chestnut ranks second to Cherif Harnia of France on both lists.

Cotero, also ranked among the first 10, had little to anticipate in the immediate future but the long trip home to Los Angeles. He opened the only visible wound of the fight, a cut near Moore's right eye, but could make no other claims.

Several times it appeared Cotero must go down. But he somehow held up under the bombardment.

Moore stated the obvious: "He really can take it."

Cotero was unmarked at the finish, but Manager Manuel Dros said it was "the worst fight he ever fought in his life." Jose fighting outside Los Angeles for only the fourth time, said he was "a little" bothered by the 3,000-mile journey.

Referee Eddie La Fond scored it 99-81 for Moore under the system giving the winner each round 10 points. Judge Ben Alperstein's card showed 100-88 and Judge Julian Whitestone's 100-87. The AP had it 99-83.

For Moore, a 9-5 favorite, the victory was his 27th against five defeats and a draw. Cotero was losing his 13th. He has won 33 and drawn five.

Moore weighed 128, Cotero 127½.

LA Rams Get Favored Role Over 49ers

The National Football League's most successful coaches of recent years resume their personal duel Sunday when Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns entertain Buddy Parker's Pittsburgh Steelers with the Eastern Division lead at stake.

Cleveland (5-1) leads the division by one game and is a seven-point favorite. The Steelers and New York Giants (both 4-2) are tied for second.

Four New York players suffered flu attacks this week but the team is a nine-point favorite to whip the Chicago Cardinals (2-4) at Yankee Stadium. If the Steelers and Giants win, they will join the Browns in a three-way tie for first place.

The San Francisco Forty-Niners (5-1) take a two-game Western Division lead into the first of four straight games and are 2½ point underdogs against the Rams (2-4) at Los Angeles.

In the other games, the Detroit Lions (3-5) are four-point favorites to defeat the Eagles (2-4) at Philadelphia; the Baltimore Colts (3-3) are slim, one-point favorites against the Redskins (2-4) at Washington; and the Bears (2-4) are nine-point favorites to down the Green Bay Packers (2-4) at Chicago. Detroit and Baltimore are tied for second behind San Francisco.

Parker, who guided the Lions to three Western Division and two league titles before switching to Pittsburgh this season, is the only NFL coach who boasts an advantage in competition with Brown. Brown, who has led Cleveland to six Eastern Division and three league crowns since 1950, scored only one victory during that time against the Parker-coached Lions in 12 exhibition, regular season and championship games.

Cleveland had to sweat for a 23-12 victory over Parker's Steelers earlier this season and Sunday's tussle figures to be a rip-roarer.

MARTINEZ FIGHTS DRAW

PCC Schools Meet Sunday

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Heads of Pacific Coast Conference schools meet here Sunday with rumors by the dozens about what will come out of the one-day secret session.

Joe Ruetz, an assistant to the president of Stanford University and a former coach, said Friday he expected "drastic action" by Sunday night.

Ruetz said Stanford would be better off out of the 42-year-old PCC. Stanford president J. Wallace Sterling, however, commented that Ruetz' remarks were solely his own.

Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, University of California president, who called the Sunday meeting said the presidents "can bring up anything they choose." But he said the session was called primarily to discuss California's regents five-point statement of athletic policies.

The program includes higher scholastic eligibility requirements, doing away with the present round robin scheduling system, and basing tuition aid to athletes on need.

Paul Zimmerman, sports editor of the Los Angeles Times wrote that Idaho may be dropped from the conference. He noted that Idaho's president, D.R. Theophilus, was not going to attend and had neglected to give his proxy to another president.

Al F. Barackman, sports editor of the Daily Idahoan wrote that the President was at a "much more important meeting — a gathering of land grant college executives in Denver."

Barackman wrote that D. C. Clement French, president of neighboring Washington State College, will be "listening in" for Theophilus.

Idaho is the only conference school that does not participate in the round robin. It plays only northern schools in football.

Dr. French said WSC likes the round robin. "But... we're willing to enter into discussions."

Southern California as well as UCLA and California oppose the rigid scheduling program. Stanford's athletic director Al Masters said recently his school was "not wedded to" the round robin.

Washington's president, Dr. Henry Schmitz, confirmed Friday his school opposes the round robin as well as the UC regents' plan to limit aid to needy athletes only.

Taylor Nixes Quit Rumors

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — A Palo Alto sports writer says Chuck Taylor is tired of football and will quit his Stanford head coaching job this month. Taylor says there is "absolutely no truth to it."

Walt Gamage, sports editor of the Palo Alto Times, wrote Friday he "wouldn't be surprised" if Taylor, at Stanford since 1951, quit during big game week. California plays Stanford here Nov. 23.

Gamage said Taylor "was just tired of the game" and planned to quit after this season. Stanford has won four games, lost three and has three to play.

Taylor is in Los Angeles where his Indians play Southern California Saturday. An aide said Taylor called his team together Friday night and told the players the story was "poppycock."

Dr. J. Wallace Sterling, Stanford president, said he hadn't heard any resignation talk from Taylor. He added he wouldn't say anything if he had; that it was strictly "an internal matter."

Ex-Kentucky ace Frank Ramsey has come into his own during Bob Cousy's absence to give the Boston Celtics still another super star. And the net result is that the Celtics have stretched their unbeaten skid to eight games Saturday — seven fewer than the all-time National Basketball Association record for the start of a season.

The 6-foot, 4-inch guard supplied the heroics in true Cousy style Friday night when the Celtics beat the Cincinnati Royals, 122-110, in overtime at Cincinnati. He tied the score at 104-104 with two free throws after the final buzzer and then scored two field goals in the first 30 seconds of the overtime to spark an 18-6 "clutch drive" that won the game for Boston.

The victory gave the unbeaten Celtics a three-game first place lead in the Eastern Division over the Minneapolis Lakers, 119-108. The New York Knickerbockers downed the Syracuse Nationals, 104-99, in the other game Friday night and now trail the runaway Celtics by three and a half games.

Bill Voiselle had a 10-21 record with Jersey City in 1943 but in 1944 he won 21 games for the New York Giants.

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Bowling For Fun

Regular Practice Important To Improve Bowling Game

Editors Note: This is the first of four articles on bowling for fun written especially for AP Newsfeatures by Jim Spalding, ABC All-Events champion.

Like the great majority of bowlers, I bowl strictly for fun. Bowling is a game that gives me a refreshing break in my business routine of civil engineering. I enjoy the competition, the fellowship and the exercise. I find myself challenged by the urge for self-improvement that the great game of bowling provides.

I bowl in two leagues a week and that's just about par for anyone really interested in the game. Saturday afternoons, some friends and I usually meet for an

open bowling practice session. This weekly practice session is one of the reasons I've been able to increase my average in recent years.

To people who bowl just for fun but who would like to improve their game the best tip I can give is that practice is imperative. Practice regularly and practice intelligently.

First get your own bowling ball. Obviously, it will fit your grip perfectly and it should "behave" the same way each time you roll it.

First, analyze your faults then set out to correct them, one at a time. If your bowling establishment has an instructor, obtain his help because nothing is tougher than trying to analyze yourself.

Remember, too, that there are some practice sessions where you shouldn't worry about your score. If you're not bending your left knee enough, for example, you're going to have a few miserable scores until you get the hang of it.

One time when you should worry about scores in practice is in picking up spares. Never shrug your shoulders and go after a spare half-heartedly because it's a tough one and it's only practice. The ability to convert spares is one of the simplest — and most important — ways to increase your bowling average.

The Oregon State College Rooks closed out their abbreviated Pacific Coast Conference frosh season Friday by downing the Oregon Frosh 20-0 at Corvallis while the University of Washington Pups collected their second straight victory as they topped the Idaho frosh outfit, 26-0.

The OSC squad wound up with a 3-0 record, the Rooks' first undefeated season since 1950.

Fullback Charles Marshall accounted for most of the Rooks' yardage on drives straight through the middle.

Washington began scoring in the second period against the undermanned Idaho squad.

Quarterback Sil Zial played an iron-man game for the Vandal frosh, handling the squad from the outset until he was pulled out with about six minutes remaining.

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
