More than 100 names were submitted in a contest announced in the March issue. The current issue, due in the mails on November 11, is the first to appear under the new name and the format has been changed to magazine style layout with a full page cover photograph. Distribution is made to 11,000 farm and rural acreage owners who are co-operators in the Oregon Soil Conservation District program.

The winning name was submitted by Mrs. Murray Dobbins of Redmond. Darlene Clemence Dobbins moved to Redmond when she was in the third grade and she was graduated from Redmond High School in the class of 1953. The boys were charged with violation of the alcoholics beverage control act for possession of alcoholic beverages while under the age of 21 years.



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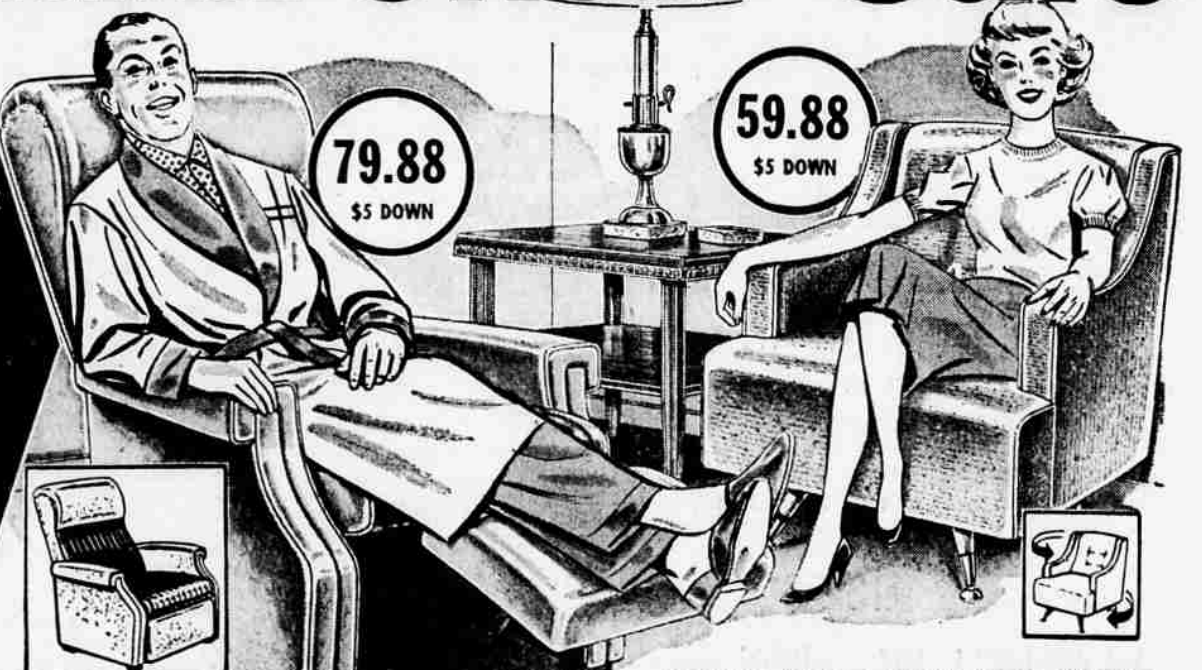
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
