All in the show are busy persons—taking time from crowded schedules to do their bit toward achieving a civic-improvement goal.

In the picture top left, Kristian Gippo, director of the play, and Peggy Thomas, prompter, are working out technical details during one of the night rehearsals. He's a music instructor in the elementary schools, and Peggy (Mrs. Stafford) Thomas teaches at Mills.

The picture, top right, was also taken during one of the "cool" evening rehearsals — when the only heat in the building was from the peppy dialogue. From the left, Faith Brock, as "Minnetonka Small Flower" in the comedy, is a real-life housewife and part-time bookkeeper at Don's Mens and Boys Wear.

Minnie Surles — "Honey Wainright" in the cast, leads a varied life off stage. She appears on radio and TV programs, works at Bon Bazaar as fashion coordinator and occasionally is a substitute teacher at KUHS. Garry Robertson, the leading character, "Milo Alcott," in the forthcoming production, is actually assistant superintendent of schools.
