Karen Johnson Exchanges Vows With Harry Elmer Hopkins In 4 P.M. Candlelight Rites

YREKA — One of the outstanding weddings of the fall season was solemnized in Yreka First Methodist Church on Sunday, October 27, at 4 p.m., when Karen Adele Johnson was claimed as the bride of Harry Elmer Hopkins. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Johnson. The bridegroom is the son of Mrs. Hopkins and the late Harry E. Hopkins of North Eastham, Massachusetts.

The double-ring candlelight service was read by the Rev. H. C. Coleman. The altar held large bouquets of white chrysanthemums. The pews were marked with large white satin bows, each centered with one red rose and sprays of lily of the valley.

Judy Moore, organist, played several selections prior to the service and accompanied Richard Rust, soloist, who sang "Because of You," and "The Lord's Prayer."

The bride was escorted to the altar and given in marriage by her father. She wore an exquisite gown of white Chantilly lace with tiers of tulle ruffles over bridal satin. The fitted bodice was designed with a sweetheart neckline embroidered in seed pearls and iridescent sequins. The long sleeves were pointed at the wrist. The bouffant skirt had pleated tulle ruffles in front and a Chantilly lace full length cathedral train edged with a tulle ruffle.

The fingertip veil of illusion net, bordered with Chantilly lace matching the gown, was held with a crown of seed pearls. Carrying out an age-old custom, the bride wore a pair of small gold leaf earrings, the bridegroom's first gift to the bride, for "something old," and a matching gold leaf necklace, a wedding gift from the bridegroom as "something new." The "something borrowed" was a pair of rhinestone combs for her hair. Completing her ensemble she wore a blue garter and carried a lace handkerchief, a gift from a close friend, Mrs. Jerome Ullian of Grants Pass. The bridal bouquet was a creation of red roses and white gardenias cascading from a handmade lace fan that the bride had purchased in Belgium.

Mrs. Gordon Foletta, El Cerrito, California, the former Ingrid Johnson, only sister of the bride, was matron of honor. The three bridesmaids were Gayle Bandy, Redding; Marcia Isaacs, Medford; and Mrs. Robert Scharf of Yreka. Two junior bridesmaids were Shirley Renning of Weed, and Cherie Aldrich of Medford.

The matron of honor and three bridesmaids all wore identical sleeveless frocks of red chiffon velvet, cocktail length, with square necklines and flared skirts. They wore red velvet bandeaus studded with pearls and matching red satin slippers. Completing the ensemble they wore pearl earrings and a single strand of pearls, gifts of the bride.

The junior bridesmaids wore frocks identical to those of the senior bridesmaids, with the exception that their dresses had puff sleeves. They wore a single strand of pearls, a gift of the bride, and white ballerina shoes with pearl studded straps. Candlelighter was Lawana Trin-

ca of Hill. Her dress was in the same style as the junior bridesmaids. She wore a wristlet of white carnations.

The tiny flower girl was Marcia Slack of Grants Pass, a cousin of the bride. She wore a red velvet dress and a white lace hat trimmed in red flowers. The basket, in which she carried red rose petals which she scattered in the path of the bride, was of white satin, trimmed with lily of the valley and a single red rose. Her brother Bobby, 3, served as ring bearer. He carried the rings on a heart shaped satin cushion edged with tulle ruffles.

Best man duties were performed by John Spencer, Yreka, and seating the guests were Robert Cope, Big Creek, California; Robert Scharf and John Murray, both of Yreka; Orville Renning, Weed and the bride's brother-in-law, Gordon Foletta of El Cerrito.

Five hundred guests gathered in the Melody Room of the Yreka Inn for the reception following the ceremony. The room was decorated with the bouquets of chrysanthemums from the church, with white satin bows, red roses and lily of the valley on the curtains. The six-tiered wedding cake, each layer separated with small crystal pillars, was topped with white satin bells on a white satin heart edged with seed pearls. Background for the cake was an enormous white satin heart edged with tulle ruffles and decorated with red roses and lily of the valley.

Presiding at the punch bowls

was Mrs. Clifford Aldrich, Medford and Mrs. Orville Renning of Weed, while Mrs. Jerome Ullian, Grants Pass and Mrs. Irene Wilenbrink, Yreka, served the cake. Passing the groom's cake were Sharon Deppen, Etna and Nellie and Nancy Wyatt of Yreka, cousins of the bride. All three little girls wore red taffeta frocks and carried the cake in white satin baskets. Presiding at the guest book was Susan Harris of Yreka.

In the reception line were the new Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins, the bridesmaids, and the bride's mother and father. For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Johnson chose a turquoise blue lace afternoon dress, red velvet hat and black velvet accessories. Her corsage was a gardenia circled with pink roses. The bridegroom's mother was unable to be present.

Following the reception the newlyweds left for a week's honeymoon trip of undisclosed destination, and upon their arrival home will reside at 607 West Miner Street, Yreka. For traveling, the new Mrs. Hopkins wore a suit of black and white pinpoint faille, the material having been purchased by the bride in Paris during her recent European trip. A pink feather hat, pink gloves, black patent shoes and bag completed her ensemble. Her corsage was a white gardenia encircled with pink roses.

The bride is a native of Yreka and graduated from Yreka schools. She also attended Miss Pat's Dance Studio in Medford, San Francisco School of Ballet and McLane's Dance Studio in San Francisco and California and Crockett's Dance Studio in Sacramento. She is a member of Dance Masters of America and National Association of Dancers and Affiliated Artists. Mrs. Hopkins is the owner and teacher of the Karen

YREKA—A golden wedding dinner party was recently given in honor of Superior Judge and Mrs. James M. Allen of Yreka, both prominent residents of Siskiyou County.

The dinner was limited to the immediate family due to the poor health of Mrs. Allen, but the popular couple were the recipients of many cards, gifts and congratulations from their friends. Of the couple's eight children, seven attended the dinner. The eighth, Robert Allen, died in World War II.

Those attending the dinner event were Mrs. Velma Campbell, a daughter, and Mr. and Mrs. James M. Allen Jr. and son, Mike, all of Yreka; Mrs. Gussie Brown, a daughter and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Jack Brown, both of Yreka; Mr. and Mrs. Norman Allen, son and daughter-in-law of San Francisco; Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Martin, son-in-law and daughter, and sons, Eddie and Danny of Etna; Mr. and Mrs. William Byrd, son-in-law and daughter, and their daughter Lois, of Redwood City; Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. The marriage of Judge and Mrs. Allen took place on October 9, 1907 in the Episcopal Church in Yreka, and they have lived in Siskiyou County throughout their entire married life. Mrs. Allen is the former Linnie McBee, a native of Roseburg, Oregon, and she came to Scott Valley with her parents when a small child. Her grandparents were Oregon pioneers who crossed the plains and settled in the Day Creek, Oregon, area.

Judge Allen is a native of Siskiyou County, his birthplace being at Oro Fino, near Fort Jones, and prior to his admittance to the bar, was a school teacher in the Scott Valley area. In 1935, a reunion picnic was held in his honor at Scott Valley, and many of his former students traveled many miles to be present and pay him homage.

During his years of teaching school, Judge Allen devoted his spare time to studying law, and in 1913 was admitted to the bar. From 1915 to 1923 he served as

district attorney for Siskiyou County, and he has held the post of Superior Judge since 1938.

Judge and Mrs. Allen are both very active in civic and fraternal organizations. Mrs. Allen is a member of a number of women's groups, and is a Gold Star mother. Both the judge and his wife are active members of the Siskiyou County Historical Society, the judge having served as president of the group for two years. He is also the author of a book "Wine-Ma," the story of a heroic Indian woman who played a prominent part during the Modoc War.
