It was announced that the board of directors will meet Tuesday evening, November 12, at 7:30 in the Willard Hotel instead of Monday night, November 11.

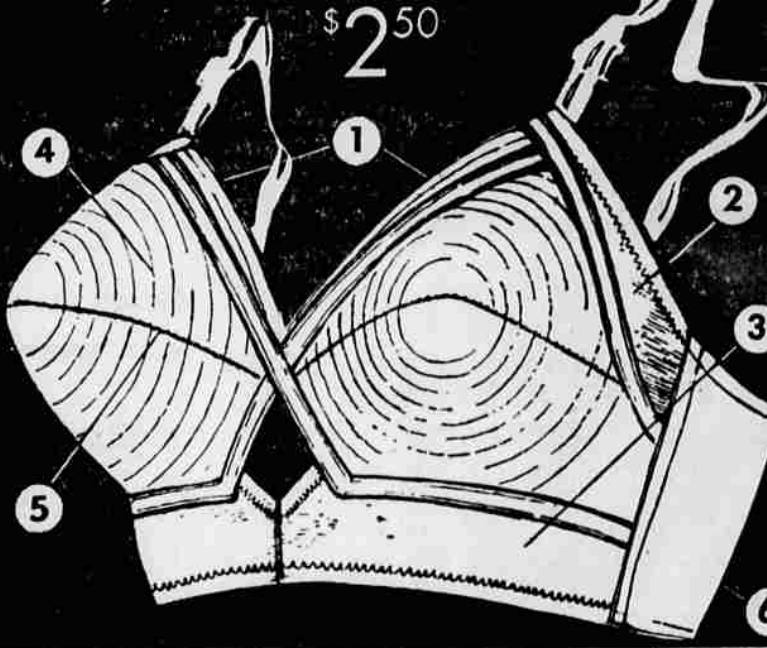
The next meeting will be November 18 with Margaret Strode, Career Advancement Committee chairman in charge of the program.



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
