

Oretech Wallops Humboldt Squad

The OTI Owls had a field day Saturday night as they completely dominated the scoring column against a game but completely outmanned Humboldt State College junior varsity team, 59-13 before a scant 100 fans.

All of the Owl scoring was chalked up by four players, halfback Richard Pekala, halfback Alfonso Everson and halfback Charlie Wilson each tallied twice, while quarterback Allen Leach was high point man for the evening with three touchdowns.

For the first time in four games the OTI passing attack came out on the long side, as they completed eight of 11 attempts, with one pass being intercepted.

But it was again the strong Owl line that crushed the Junior Jacks, stopping all but one sustained drive that carried 70 yards for a Humboldt score.

After the Owls held Humboldt to one series of downs, Richard Pekala took the punt on his own 20-yard line and scooted down the sideline to the Humboldt 15-yard line. Alfonso Everson went for 13 yards on a cross back over left tackle, and Pekala pushed over for the two for the score. Pekala's try for the extra point from placement was good.

The Owls' second score came on the kickoff when a Humboldt player touched the ball but let it roll into the end zone. Halfback Charlie Wilson popped on the ball and another OTI score was recorded. Again Pekala's placement was good.

Charlie Wilson's second score came when Humboldt was kicked to punt after taking the kickoff. Wilson caught the ball on the OTI 33-yard line, but across the field to pick up blockers and went 67 yards for the touchdown. Pekala's placement was true.

Allen Leach intercepted a Humboldt pass on the Junior Jacks' 40 and carried back to the 15 before being pulled down. Pekala picked up his second touchdown on the next play from scrimmage going through the middle of the line.

The Owls were held to two touchdowns in the second quarter and Humboldt pushed across its first score in the second period. Guard Allen Jones intercepted a Humboldt aerial on the Owl 31-yard line to set up the first score in the second quarter. Everson swept his own left end for 21 yards, then halfback Wally Wood added another 23, and Everson raked up the touchdown with a 22-yard end sweep.

With two and a half minutes left in the first half, Allen Leach dived over from the three-yard line, after the Owls had moved 48 yards, seven plays, to end the OTI scoring in the first half.

Humboldt's lone score came when quarterback Reynolds hit Johnson on the end zone for the OTI 15-yard line. Ziegenbier's placement kick was good.

In the third quarter Gander connected to Allen Leach in the end zone for 31 yards and a touchdown and the Owls only score in the third period.

Taking the kickoff after the Owl score the Junior Jacks, on a 70-yard sustained drive, scored their final touchdown of the evening as Reynolds slipped over from the one-yard line.

Bob Dixon tallied from two yards out after a fumble recovery for Pacific's only tally.

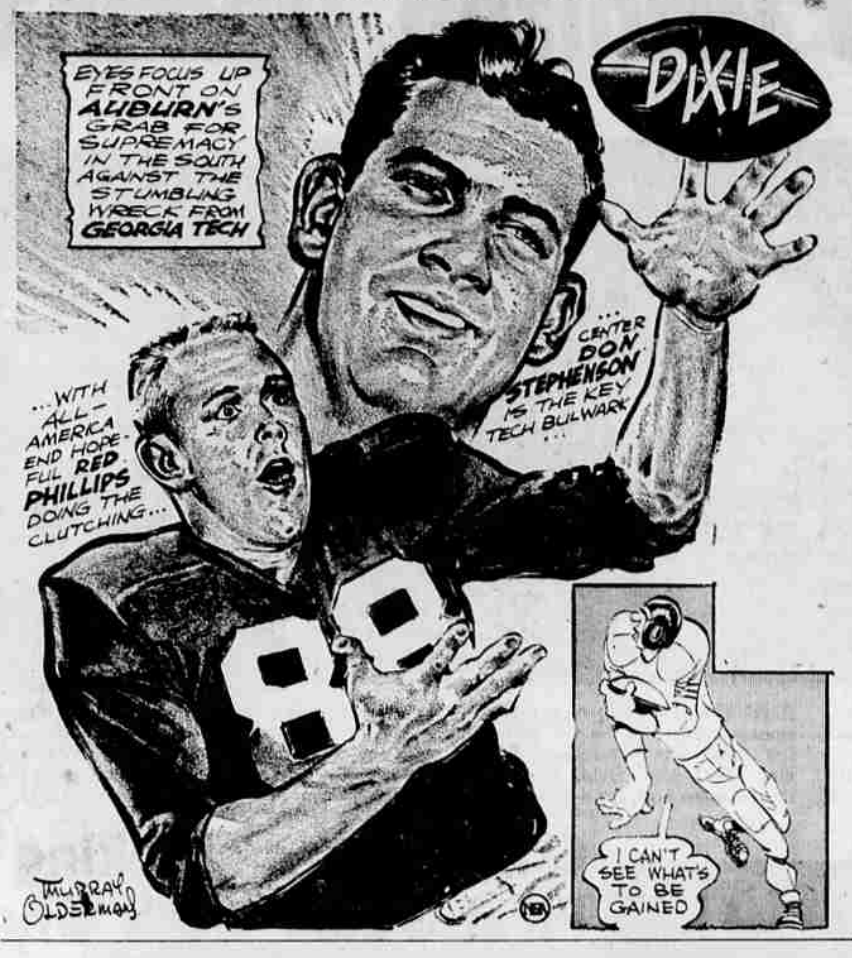
Willamette, which has now won three conference games and tied one, will meet undefeated Linfield next Saturday for the conference title.

Oklahoma Wins 47th Straight, Duke Ties Navy, Army Scared

Mighty Oklahoma, weary of charges that it was getting ready for a tumble, throttled Missouri 34-14 Friday and in the process became the first team in the nation to wrap up a Bowl bid.

The Sooners, who now have won 47 games in a row, will represent the Big 8 in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 against an Atlantic Coast Conference outfit, probably Duke.

Most of the bigwigs of the country came through, although there was a sprinkling of upsets at the top.

The biggest was William and Mary's 7-6 triumph over North Carolina State, the No. 10 team in The Associated Press poll. William and Mary, which had won just two of its first seven games, came

from behind with a touchdown in the fourth quarter to register the shocker of the day.

Then there was the Navy-Duke 6-6 tie. Navy had been favored and was ranked seventh nationally as the class of the East.

Ohio State moved a step closer to the Rose Bowl when the Buckeyes dealt Purdue a 20-7 licking. Ohio State now shows a 4-0 Big 10 record compared to 5-1 by defending champion Iowa, which clubbed Minnesota, 44-20.

Iowa is not eligible for the Rose Bowl, though, since it went last year. Ohio State and Iowa play next week. Illinois, which has become the giant-killer of the league, fashioned another upset by edging Michigan, 20-19, while Michigan State battered Notre Dame, 44-6 in a non-league game.

Auburn, which looks more and more like the Southeastern Conference champion, kept its winning streak alive by beating tough Mississippi State, 13-7. The triumph was No. 7 in a row for Auburn this season and No. 11 over a period of two years.

Tennessee, probably in line for the Sugar Bowl with Auburn ineligible, whipped Georgia Tech 21-6.

In the Pacific Coast Conference, Oregon lost a chance to clinch the Rose Bowl assignment by dropping a 13-6 decision to Washington. Oregon still can do it, but not this week. Stanford which licked Southern California, 35-7, is in a position to get the bid, too.

The two powers of the Ivy League, Princeton and Dartmouth, moved toward their showdown meeting at the end of the season. The Tigers whipped Harvard, 28-20, with two touchdowns in the final quarter, while Dartmouth had an equally tough time fighting off Columbia, 7-0.

Penn won its first game of the season (and fourth in the past four years) by embarrassing Yale, 33-20, and Virginia Military Institute, one of the strong teams of the Southern Conference, dropped Lehigh from the undefeated list, 12-7.

Holy Cross upset Syracuse, 20-19, and West Virginia toppled disappointing Pitt, 7-6. Army had its troubles, but finally downed Utah's aerial circus, 39-33.

Idaho Wins Team Crown

LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 10 (AP)—College of Idaho of the Northwest Conference rolled over Eastern Oregon of the Oregon Collegiate Conference 46-21 in Saturday's football game here.

College of Idaho halfback Richard Maggard scored three touchdowns as he gained 102 yards by rushing.

His EOC counterpart, Dick Quinn, had 100 yards rushing, scored one touchdown and kicked two extra points.

Quarterback Charlie Alvero scored two touchdowns for the winners.

Husky Gridders Submerge Ducks

PORTLAND, Nov. 10 (AP)—A hard-charging Washington line stopped Oregon's drive toward the Rose Bowl with a 13-6 Pacific Coast Conference upset Saturday.

The big Washington line gobbled up an Oregon pass in the second quarter, setting up the first touchdown, and then pushed Oregon back 67 grudging yards for the final score in the final period.

Oregon's potent offense was almost completely smothered by an alert defense. Oregon managed to score on a 78-yard aerial strike.

The pass went 19 yards from quarterback Jack Crabtree to end Pete Welch, who dashed the remaining 57 yards to the end zone.

Washington had to go only 28 yards for its first score after end Bruce Claridge broke through to bustle the throwing arm of Crabtree.

The ball popped straight up. Center Marv Bergmann came sailing through to grab the ball for Washington on the Oregon 26.

It took seven ground plays from there, with quarterback Bobby Dunn plunging the final three yards.

Dunn kicked the extra point, but

when Oregon got its touchdown the Washington line again broke through and blocked Oregon's conversion attempt to preserve a 7-6 lead.

Washington then added to its margin with the last quarter march.

Halfback Mike McCluskey repeatedly charged through left tackle for big gains on this drive. Another quarterback, Al Ferguson, capped the march with a three-yard plunge.

It was the first PCC loss for Oregon. It prevented the Ducks from gaining a certain tie for the title.

Oregon still leads in the conference race, but now must down both Southern California and Oregon State in its remaining games to be certain of gaining the title and the Rose Bowl bid.

Oregon provided plenty of last-half thrills for the crowd of 30,000.

The second half opened with the Oregon touchdown that cut the margin to 7-6. Moments later Oregon came driving back 40 yards.

The Washington line, however, stifled that threat on the Washington 16-yard line.

Then, in the closing minutes, after Washington had taken a 13-6 lead, Crabtree opened a passing attack that seemed about to produce another Oregon touchdown.

He started from his own 8-yard line, completed six passes and reached the Washington 16 before end Duane Lowell of Washington leaped high to intercept a pass with only 15 seconds to go.

Washington also was thrown back in another scoring threat. It came in the second quarter, when end Carl Morgan intercepted a Crabtree pass on the Oregon 32.

Washington punched to the 19, but was thrown back from there. Oregon also threatened in that period, taking advantage of a 40-yard pass from Crabtree to halfback Willie West to drive 74 yards.

But Oregon was thrown back by the stout Washington line after reaching the Washington 6.

Halfback Jim Shanley was outstanding in defeat for Oregon.

He was all over the field, making key blocks, catching passes and cutting through the line with the ball to keep Oregon's offense going.

He wound up with 42 yards gained on the ground. That made him the all-time Oregon rushing leader, with a total of 1,744 yards in his three-year career.

The previous leader at Oregon was halfback George Fell, who compiled 1,729 yards in the 1940s.

Shanley also hauled in three passes Saturday for 38 yards.

Crabtree completed 10 of 18 passes for 195 yards. He also had one pass intercepted.

The interception that stopped Oregon in the last-minute drive, however, was thrown by fullback Marlan Holland.

Wisconsin 41 Northwestern 12

Harry Grayson's SCOREBOARD

NEW YORK (NEA) — No fewer than 33 of the 99 players taken to camp by the National Basketball Association clubs come from independent schools, the majority in the East. Only six are out of the Big Ten.

This must be the answer to where best basketball is played. Several years ago, Pepper Wilson, then beating the drums for Dayton University, took a survey to determine which schools played

the tougher schedules. It developed that, based on weekly ratings, four colleges with no conference ties, Dayton, Duquesne, Philadelphia, La Salle and Villanova, played the roughest schedules through the years.

By necessity, the independents book more diversified and harder schedules. Round robins in major conferences more often than not send a member team against comparatively weak opposition.

With rare exceptions—Kentucky and more recently North Carolina for examples—basketball is overshadowed where high-pressure football is played.

On the other hand, basketball, costing much less to put on, is lush business for the independents, most of which have no football. They work year-round on the round ball game and the good school kid who wants to play it well in college automatically goes to places stressing basketball.

Thus while La Salle, Brooklyn, St. John's, Manhattan, Seton Hall, St. Bonaventure, Niagara, De Paul, St. Francis of Pennsylvania, Duquesne, St. Louis University, San Francisco and Santa Clara, to name schools that come to mind offhand, are not represented in football, they are perennial cage powers.

Generally speaking, professional coaches find athletes coming out of big conferences weak defensively and not diversified enough. If a college coach employs what primarily is a pivot attack, one man handles the ball and shoots constantly. So a specialist comes to the money ranks which require an all-round game.

This is especially true of the Western Conference, so mighty in football but notoriously sloppy defensively in basketball.

In contrast, coaches of independent schools watch the pros, play a diversified game and turn out combatants better rounded in fundamentals who find it much easier to mesh with team play.

Start with the incomparable Boston Celtics, Bob Cousy, the matchless ball handler, and Tom Heinsohn reported from Holy Cross, Bill Russell from San Francisco. Tom Gola, generally considered the greatest active player of the game, attended La Salle. Out of the Army shortly, Gola again will put the Philadelphia Warriors in the thick of things as he did when they won it all in his freshman year. George Mikan, the all-time great, was developed by Ray Meyer at De Paul.

Run through the rosters and you'll find that the lads from the independents get the more important money.

Round Table was the preface choice of the track handicapper, while Gallant Man was the pick of the experts and the 3-2 favorite of the crowd.

Syracuse U. and Boston U. began their football series in 1923.
