### New Time Set For Tax Roll

One of the new state laws provides that county assessors must have their assessment rolls completed not later than May 1 of each year and that any taxpayer may receive a certified copy of his assessments on or after that date.

County Judge Charley Mack, who is also a member of the county board of equalization, explained that the purpose of the law is to provide ample time for taxpayers to study the assessments and file petitions with the equalization board if they wish to do so.

Judge Mack and equalization member Lee McMullin recently attended the service training sessions for county boards of equalization held in Salem.

Mack explained that all phases of the equalization programs were discussed, and it was learned that some counties are working with the county and city realtors when studying assessed values as related to true cash values.

The judges aid the system has proved highly valuable in those counties where it is employed, and that the Klamath Equalization Board is going to discuss with the Klamath realtors the possibility of launching such a cooperative system in Klamath County.
