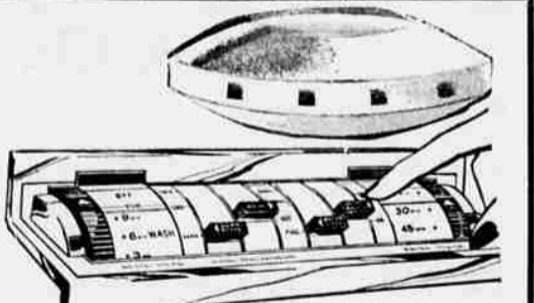

### Romance Leads To Double Slaying Of Ohio Girls

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—Police said a married man involved in a romantic quadrangle has admitted killing his two teen-age sweethearts because he was afraid his wife would find out about them.

The bodies of Miss Beverly Ann Aldred, 17, and Mrs. Deanna Jean Fauch, 16, both of Dayton, were found by a motorist alongside a county road about five miles south of here yesterday. They had been shot.

Detective L. R. C. Beckett of the sheriff's office said Robert Crites, 31-year-old father of four, admitted in a signed statement that he killed the girls.

In the statement, Crites was quoted as saying he didn't want the girls to do to others what he had done to him. He said he had spent much time and money on them.

Beckett said the statement also admitted that Crites intended to take the girls' bodies to Colorado and, while there, kill his wife's sister because "she's just like the other two." But he abandoned that idea after the slaying.

Beckett said he will ask the prosecutor today to file first-degree murder charges against Crites.

Beckett said Crites told of taking both girls for a drive in his car yesterday. He stopped on some pretext, got out, then fired six bullets through a window one girl had opened, his statement related.

The girls' bodies fell out when Crites opened the door. He said he left them there and drove to his mother's home in suburban Kettering. From there he called Kettering authorities and gave up.

Beckett said Crites told of first meeting the girls in a beer and wine carryout store two months ago.

Crites said he fell in love with Deanna but had promised to marry Beverly. Deanna was separated or about to be separated from her husband, authorities said.

Caught in a predicament he apparently couldn't solve and afraid his wife would find out about it, Crites said he began making plans 11 days ago to kill his girl friends.

Crites, an ex-Navy man and Korea veteran, was admitted to the Veterans Administration hospital here in September. He stayed 10 days during which time he was treated for "anxiety," a hospital spokesman said.

He worked at the Frigidaire Division plant of General Motors at nearby Moraine City.

### Farm Program Tussle Looms

WASHINGTON (AP)—Administration farm officials are telling farmers that the years 1957 and 1958 may see what they call a turning point in government farm price policies.

They foresee a farm program struggle that may determine whether future policies lead in the direction of lower government price supports and less government control over farming operations or in the direction of higher supports and greater government control.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson himself is leading a fight for the lower supports.

But he faces strong opposition from farm leaders in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Asst. Secretary of Agriculture Don Paarlberg emphasized this struggle before the Oregon State Farm Bureau Federation convention at Eugene, Ore., last Friday. He also was to appear before the California Farm Bureau Federation convention at Fresno Monday.

"To farm people, the years 1957 and 1958 are likely to have special meaning," he said in both speeches. "It is my belief that we are at one of those major turning points in farm history—turning points so infrequent that their numbers can be tallied on the fingers of one hand."

Paarlberg said farmers stand between "two policies, one aged and weakening, and the other waiting to be born."

### Hoover Has Faith In US

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover expressed confidence Monday in this country's ability to develop any "horrible weapon" necessary to avert a military attack.

"Our country has had a great warning," he said. "It is on the alert. I have no doubt of our ability to invent any other horrible weapon necessary to deter our enemy."

Hoover made the comments in an address entitled "The Strengths of America" prepared for delivery at the 49th annual meeting of the Grocery Manufacturers of America.

A filmed transcription is to be telecast over the NBC network from 8:15 to 8:30 p.m. (PST).

The ex-president did not directly refer to the Russian satellites, but said "we can well respect the accomplishments of Russian technicians."

Hoover then added: "We need not forget that they got the telegraph, the telephone, the electric lamp, the speaking sound, the radio broadcasting tube, the airplane, the atom and nuclear bombs from us. They secured the guided missile from the defeated Germans."

"They got their method of metal treatment and their radar from us and the British. They got their pain killers either from us or from the Germans, the British and the French."
