

## PCC Commissioner Rule Due For Some Limitation

SAN FRANCISCO, (UP)—Enforcement powers of Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt Monday appear due for curtailment.

The powerful Council of Presidents Sunday approved in principle four points of an operating program while postponing decision on a fifth—the controversial round robin football schedule.

One of the points was institutional responsibility for members to keep their own athletic houses in order. Last year the conference slapped stiff penalties and sanctions against UCLA, Southern California, Washington and California for illegal aid to athletes.

California President Robert Gordon Sproul, council chairman, was asked by newsmen what the expected change would mean in relation to Schmidt's job. He replied:

"That would undoubtedly limit the power of the commissioner as to enforcement. To what extent, I cannot say."

He said there undoubtedly would be changes in responsibilities and duties of the commissioner's office if institutional responsibility goes into effect.

Meeting amid continuing specu-

lation the conference is headed for a bust-up, President Sproul described the seven-hour session as "the most peaceable discussion I've sat in on in a long time on this subject."

He said there was no discussion of any possibility that Idaho might withdraw or be asked to withdraw. He indicated there would be no decision on California or UCLA leaving the conference in the immediate future.

"I can't conceive of the University of California (including UCLA) withdrawing from the conference without further discussion with the presidents," Sproul said.

No date has been set for the next council meeting.

The conference itself holds its winter meeting here Dec. 1-5. It will work on the program approved in principle by the presidents. This covers four points in the doctrine set down by the University of California regents and the governing body at the University of Southern California.

These included higher scholastic requirements, tuition grants-in-aid on basis of need, a work program including subsistence grants-in-aid not to exceed reduction of income due to lost work opportunity during practice and season of play, and the institutional responsibility.

## Machen Meets Jackson At S. F. Wednesday Night

NEW YORK, (UP)—Unbeaten Eddie Machen will make an all-out bid for a heavyweight title shot Wednesday night when he meets Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson in a 12-rounder at the San Francisco Cow Palace.

Machen of San Francisco will be seeking his 24th straight professional victory, and Jackson of St. Albans, N.Y., will be making his first start since his unsuccessful attempt to wrest the title from Floyd Patterson, July 29. Patterson stopped him in the 10th round.

Top contender Machen, 25, will try to dispose of the Hurricane, 26, more quickly and more impressively than Patterson did. Eddie is favored at 4-1 to win and at 8-5 to score a knockout.

Because of his defeat by Patterson and his subsequent inactivity, Jackson is now rated fifth among contenders. Jackson's 29-1 record includes 13 knockouts. Fifteen of Machen's wins were kayos.

Gene Fullmer, former middleweight champion, goes after his third straight victory on the comeback trail Friday night in a 10-rounder with Neal Rivers, California state champion, at Madison Square Garden, Fulmer, 26, is ranked second among contenders; Rivers, 23, is unrated. Their bout will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, is favored at 17-5 over Rivers of Las Vegas, Nev. Gene's 42-4 record includes 29 knockouts. Rivers' 37-52 list shows 21 kayos.

Archer has seven kayos on his 14-10 list. Decola belted out live in his 25-8-1 career.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Oregon State College built up a 21-0 lead in the first half and hung on to win a Pacific Coast Conference football game at Berkeley, Calif., over California, 21-19 on Saturday.

Coach Tommy Prothro of OSU said he doesn't think the Beavers were three touchdowns better than California in the first half, nor that much worse in the second.

The game was featured by passer sophomore Larry Sanchez, who was substituted for OSC's regular tailback, Joe Francis, at the last minute. Francis fell ill with the flu in the morning.

Prothro said his plan of battle wasn't changed because of Francis' illness. The passing attack would have been the same. "With Francis our running might have been different," Prothro said.

Willamette, in contention for the Northwest Conference football championship, took a 40-6 victory over Pacific Saturday.

The Salem team, which has a record of three victories, no losses and one tie, will meet Linfield, undefeated in conference play, for the title next Saturday.

Linfield went outside the conference Saturday and rolled over Portland State of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, 35-12.

Whitman edged Lewis and Clark 34-33 at Walla Walla Saturday. It was a 21-yard pass play in the last two minutes that gave Whitman the victory, in its final game of the season.

College of Idaho also went outside the conference and posted a 46-21 victory over Eastern Oregon.

In addition to the Willamette-Linfield game Saturday, Pacific meets College of Idaho.

Lewis and Clark will play Portland State in a non-conference game.

End Dick Wallen intercepted two passes and recovered a Washington State fumble which launched UCLA on its three touchdowns. Quarterback Bob Newman of the Cougars had a rough day passing, completing only six out of 15 for 59 yards gained. He had gone into the game the second best tosser in the nation.

Oregon State took a 21-0 half-time lead over Cal with substitute tailback Larry Sanchez passing for two touchdowns. But then the Bears, who had not scored via the air all season, tallied twice on passes by quarterback Joe Kapp and scored another when he sneaked over from the one.

Oregon State actually won it on the conversion line, where guard Jim Brackins and center Buzz Randall broke through to block two attempted extra points.

College of the Pacific used two intercepted passes to start a pair of touchdowns drives against San Jose State as the Spartans lost their sixth game of the year. Fullback Tom Green scored twice.

Idaho, having a good football season although regarded as the poor relation in the Coast Conference, exploded for three tallies in the third period while facing Utah State, 35-7.

Fresno State scored twice in the last minutes to down Brigham Young, 27-14, with fullback Dean Philpott's four yard plunge sewing up the rally.

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## Bill McColl Plans Long Grid Career

CHICAGO (UP)—Big Bill McColl, the six foot, four inch, 230-pound end for the Chicago Bears today said he hoped to be around for several more years, but he added, "you never can tell."

"This is my sixth season with the Bears but I must remember there is the future to think about. I'm a resident doctor in Stanford University Hospital and my playing days must be on a year to year basis," he said.

It isn't that McColl is afraid of an injury that might put his future as a doctor in danger. "If I do get hurt," said the former Stanford All-America wingman, "it will be unintentional, not the result of dirty play. A dirty player doesn't last around this National League very long."

McColl admitted he is far off his excellent 1956 season, when he caught 24 passes, four for touchdowns, and gained 322 yards. "But," McColl went on, "we are all having our troubles this season. Our offense hasn't started to click. When it does, we'll start rolling."

McColl shook his close cropped, blond head and went on. "I'm not saying which back in the league the Bears think the best—they are all giving us fits this year. But my personal choice is Frank Gifford of the Giants. There is a guy who
